

A saving of the cost of a county election will be made for the taxis held at the same time as the special state election, September by act of congress. 19, sponsors of the petition have stated



Twenty-eight members of the Hagerman Men's club heard W. J. McInnes, general of the N. R. A. forces of Roswell in an address on the principles of the program at their regular Tuesday night meeting.

Mr. McInnes outlined the necesity for such an advancement, giving the scope of its operation. and predicted some results of the successful carrying out of the idea. He proposed t call it a "Truce on Selfishness" in the business of the future instead of the uncompromising individualism of the past. He stated, "It offers the American busines man an emblem of enlightened self interest to replace the badge of independence, artifice and subtlety heretofore more or less in vogue.


The speaker pictured the various business codes designed to eliminate unfair competition, and suggested that by the co-operation of the consumers of the nation with the dealers abiding by the spirit of the N. R. A. economic stability might be brought about.






