



Sandwich Spread No. 1 Grind 14 medium sized cucumbers, 1 quart onions (after they are ground), 3 red peppers and green peppers. through fine knife of vegetabls grinder. Add % cup salt. Let stand over night. Drain off brine. Cover with weakened vinegar and 4 well beaten eggs. Cook these ingredients until smooth and thick, then add 1 cup sweet cream and 1 teaspoon each of celery and mustard seed. Pour the dressing over the vege-

tables, mix well, pack in fars and seal. (If cucumbers are gone, substitute chopped pickles, adding

Sandwich Spread No. 2

Mix together 1 quart ground green tomatoes, 1 quart ground cucumbers, 1 quart ground sweet peppers. Soak overnight in salt water made by adding 4 tablespoons of salt to 1 gallon of water. Courtney, aviation editor of Col-Drain off salt water. The next lier's Weekly. Mr. Courtney spent morning, grind or chop, 1 bunch ten weeks in Europe, flying over of celery and 2 onions and add to first mixture. Mix together 2 cups of sugar and 1 cup flour. Add 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup prepared mustard, 1 quart of mild vinegar and 1/2 teaspoon of celery seed and mix thoroughly. Add vegetables and cook for 30 minutes, stirring to prevent burning. Push to back of stove and simmer for 30 to 50 minutes longer. Pack boiling hot and seal.

Sandwich Spread No. 3

Cook meat until it comes off the bones readily. Run through a food chopper. To each gallon of ground meat add the following: 1 quart of soup stock, 2 medium sized onions (ground), 1 cup prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 tablespoon celery salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons salt, 4 tablespoons vinegar and 1 teaspoon chile powder. Mix well, put in can and process quart jars 55 min-





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
