A NEW VALLEY CROP

Diversification of farming has been the salvation for the Pecos valley, and rotation of crops, the only answer to the preservation of productivity.

Further variations of products would be gladly welcomed by most farmers. In view of this fact, considerable interest attaches to the recent trip of two prominent Colorado sugar beet industry executives who inspected the lands of the Pecos valley with a view toward the raising of sugar beets here to meet the growing market of the nation.

G. M. Drummond of Colorado Springs, president, and T. E. Gardner, manager of the southern division of the Holly Sugar Beet Company have expressed the belief that sugar beets can be grown the year round and would be valuable in supplying seed for Colorado farmers.

If Messrs. Drummond and Gardner are correct in their surmises, local farmers may find that the sugar beet crop would be the answer to an old maid's prayer.

HEALTH COLUMN

Conducted by Dr. J. R. Earp, Director, New Mexico Bureau of Public Health.

SLEEPPING SICKNESS

This unfortunate name seems to have struck and we have therefore taken it for our title as the popular name for what the doctors call encephalitis lethargica or epidemic encephalitis.

This sleeping sickness now prevalent in the middle west has noth ing to do with African sleeping sickness due to the bite of the tsetse fly. The patient with encephalitis is not necessarily steepy though stupor is the most common symptom. Sometimes he shows what is called sleep reversal, being drowsy in the day time and wakeful at night. The patient often has strange hallucinations—he sees creatures and hears noises that are not really there. These hallucinations get mixed up with his dreams. Dreams, after all, are a kind of hallucination.

Often an early sign of encephalitis is great weakness. There may also be dizziness. In the present epidemic headache has been often the first symptom and there has been naseau, vomiting and diarrhea or constipation. Later all kinds of nerve disorders may develop-jerking of the mscres, double vision, droping of the eyelids, ringing in the ears, rigidity of the neck, profuse sweating and

This disease was first recognized in Vienna in the winter of 1916-1917. Either it spread very rapidly over the world or else it had been occuring all the time but had not been recognized. INTERNATION WHEAT IN THE ARTESIA AREA other governors of western states, Governor Arthur Seligmon Tues-

The four leading wheat exporting countries definitely approved the international wheat agreement on August 30, so this completes the agrement among representatives of both exporting and importing countries. Drafting of technical data in the supplement will be placed in the hands of the advisory committee meeting September 18th.

The approval of this agreement strengthens the plan that is now being put into effect in New Mexico and other wheat growing states to adjust their production to meet world consumption needs. The agreement among the exporting countries provides export quotas for the current marketing season up to July 31, 1934, as follows: The close of the annual pack Canada, 200 million bushels; Ar-

Export quotas for the 1934-35 season are based upon (a) 15 girls from widely separated parts per cent cut in acreage in each of the four countries, (b) average their leader, Miss Mary L. White yields, (c) normal domestic reof Roswell, national Girl Scout quirements. The balance remaining is the permitted export. This gives the United States a mtnfmum export quota of 90 million bushels for 1934 and Canada a minimum quota of 263 million bushels. If, by reason of smaller European crops or improved demand, more wheat can be exported next season than these quotas provide, the increased exports will be shared equally between Canada and the United States, until their accumulated surpluses of old wheat are disposed of.
