"Ties" Continue To Baffle Contestants

MOST PEOPLE WATCH Monday Night Football, at least once in a while. And, although not all sports fans agree on rooting for the same team, most fans of Monday night football agree on one thing—they don't like Howard Cosell.

One writer we read this week brought up a point which we hadn't considered.

Some people may concede that Cosell is intelligent, but even these same people may not like him as a sportscaster.

But, in spite of Cosell's irritating mannerisms, there is a chance that Howard may be doing a real therapeutic service for the American public, says writer Glenn Rea.

"Think about it a minute. Monday is simply one of those black days. Nothing goes right at work, and the frustrations are building. The husband goes home, eats a charred dinner and then settles in for an evening of Monday night football.

"Now, he can take out his anguish and frustrations on Howard rather than the wife or kids," Rea says.

In fact, Rea tells about a guy in Colorado who is capitalizing on this very theory. The man runs a bar somewhere in the Golden State that includes one of those giant-size screens for the benefit of patrons who want to sip and watch football at the same time.

Each week he buys an old television set and sits it up. He sells \$1 chances for the right to really take out frustrations on Howard Cosell.

The winner of the drawing gets a rifle and one bullet. He then gets the pleasure of shooting out the picture during a closeup on Howard Cosell. Now, that's the American free enterprise system!

AT LEAST PRIOR to the cold snap on Tuesday, the weather for the first eight days of the month of October almost looked like a re-run of July.

Unbelievably, the thermometer had reached a high point of 90 degrees or above on four of the eight days, and the average maximum during that span was 84 degrees, which had one day where the mercury reached only 69, or the average really would have been high.

According to statistics reported to the U.S. Weather Service, Parmer County's average maximum for the month of September was 85 degrees, and the average minimum was 55. That made for a monthly average temperature of 70 degrees, which should do something to save on home heating or cooling bills for the month.

For October, Parmer County (using temperatures kept at the official recording station at Friona) has an average maximum of 73.9, and an average minimum of 42.9.

So, the average maximum for the first eight days of October was a full ten degrees above the regular average for the month, although some cooler temperatures now through the latter portion of the month could pull this average down to normal.

But the farmers in the area have really been "making hay" while all of this sun has been shining. Farmers have been about as busy as one-armed paper hangers, and are likely to remain this way until all the crops are in.

The hot, dry weather has really helped the corn crop mature, and the harvest has picked up steam in recent days, and was heading toward a peak, at least until the cool spell, which might bring some moisture.

Although the new wheat crop could use some moisture, most farmers would just as soon pass on any rain at the present until the harvest is completed.

For the fourth straight week, one of the games listed on the contest ended in a tie. This week it was the WTSU-Lamar college game.

QUESTIONS OFTEN ASKED ABOUT YOUR EYES

Q: Do you do any charity work? By
that I mean, do you take care of
people who need your services but
can not afford to pay?

A: Yes. Our policy is the same as it
has been for many years. If a person
needs our services and has been
certified by the School Nurse, the
Welfare Department, the Lion's Club
Sight Conservation Committee, or
some other authorized agency and
funds are not available from any
Governmental Agency, we will
provide our services at no charge. We
will supply a frame at no charge and
bill the school or Lion's Club (or
other organization making the
referral) for only the cost of the
lenses.

Q: If I knew someone, maybe a
school child, who needs visual care,
how do I help? What is the first step?

A: Contact the school nurse or a
member of the local Lion's Club in
your area. They then certify that the
person is needy and refer them to us.

Q: Since the weather has had such a
devastating effect on crops this year,
and with the local economy in a
slump, have you given any thought as
to how you might help others needing
your services?

A: Yes, we have. We realize that this
has been an unusually bad year for
our crops and that people we serve
continue to need good visual care. So
we have decided upon the following
course of action to help our patients.
From October 1, 1979 through
December 31, 1979, the following
policies will be in effect:

1. We will make available to our
patients new, but discontinued,
frames at a savings of 50 per cent. We
have many current styles to choose
from.

2. On second pairs of eyeglasses
only, if the frame selected sells for
\$20.00 or less, we will give our
patients the second frame at no
charge (free).

3. If the frame selected for a
second pair sells for more than
\$20.00, we will make the second
frame available at a savings of 50 per
cent. Many of our patients need a
second pair as a "spare" or in
prescription sunglasses.

4. We will make every effort to cut
costs where we can without curtailing
the high quality of professional visual
care we continue to provide for our
patients.

NOTE: If you have had your eyes
examined anytime during the past
year (at our office or elsewhere) and
would like to have a "spare" pair of
glasses or prescription sunglasses,
you can take advantage of these
savings.

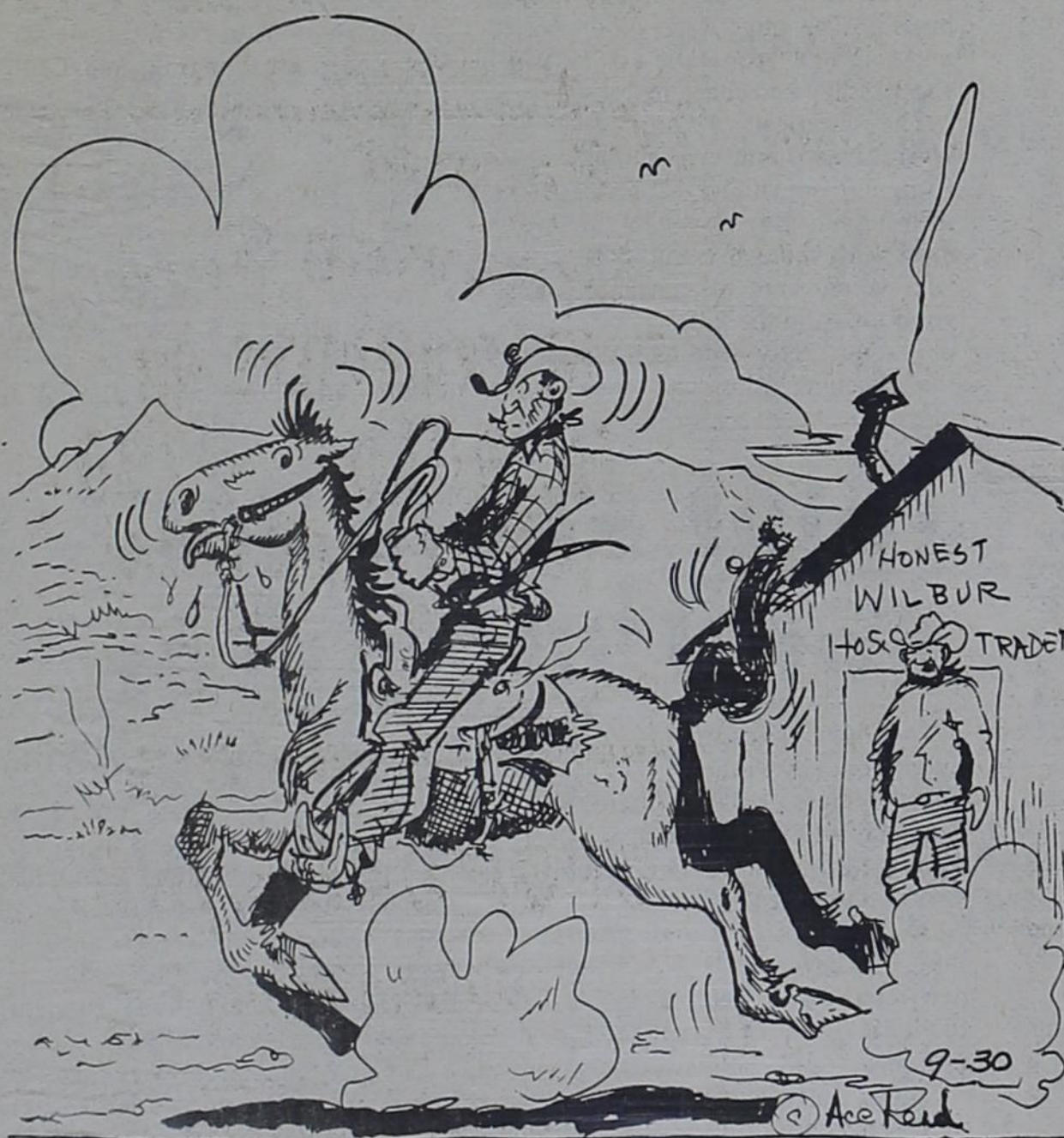

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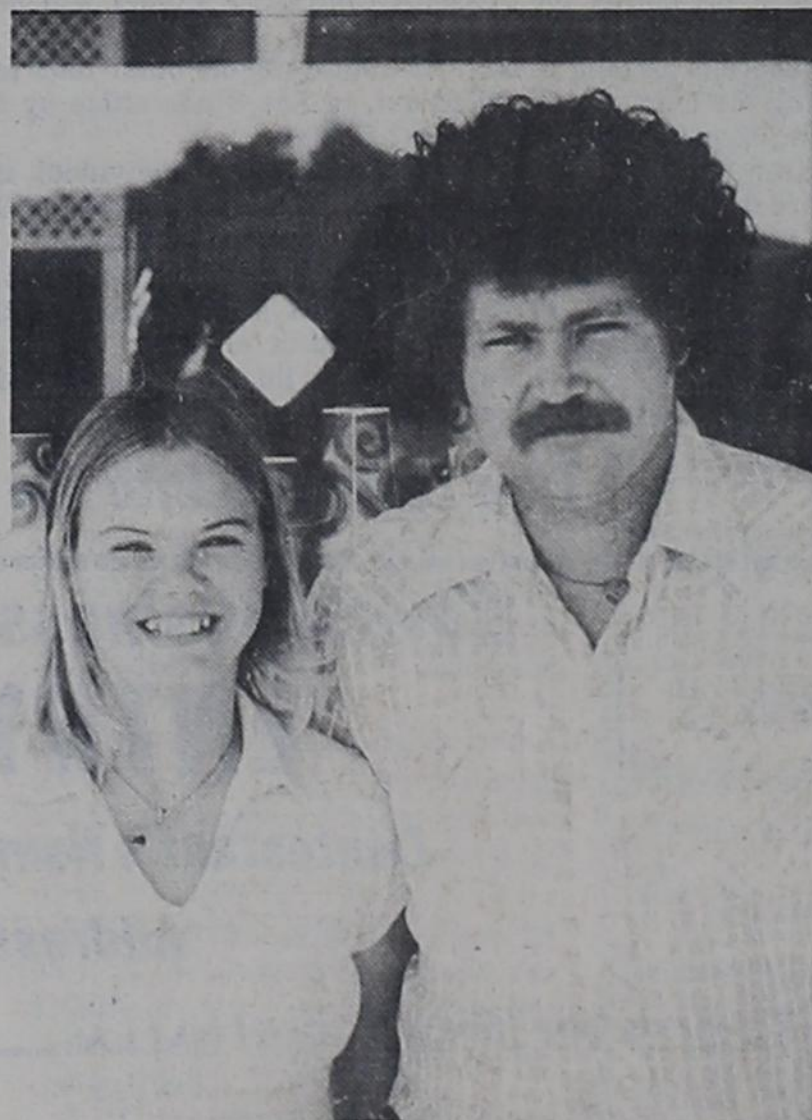

Neil Hess, WTSU dance instructor, will present a disco scene from the recent production of "Stars In Palo Duro Canyon."

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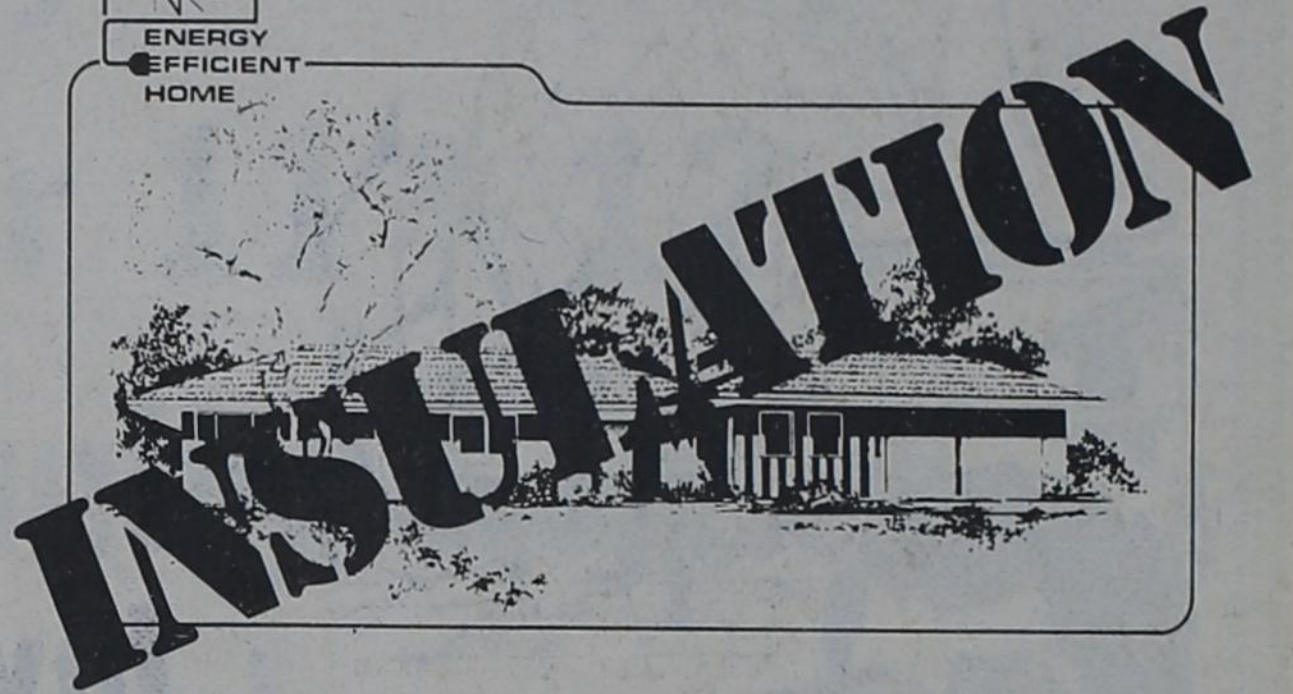
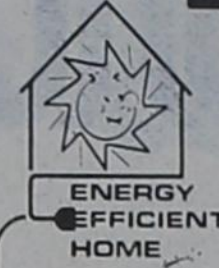
