



### Depression and Sickness

> Yet it is so hard to believe that the depression with its associated unemployment and poverty has had no ill effect on health that search is still being made to find some hitherto unobserved results.

What about sickness? Statisticians of the U.S. Public Health Service have just published a study of sickness records made among 11,330 individuals in 2,566 families. They show that whereas only ten per cent of these families had less than \$150 per capita income in 1929, no less than forty five per cent were in this low income class last year. They show
