If all cotton farmers participate and actually restrict planting next So at the feet of this little DISTRICT ATTORNEY scattually restrict planting next year to twenty-five million acres, there is a definite prospect of a more nearly balanced cotton situation at the beginning of the crop year next August 1.

"There is a vast improvement in conditions in the south as compared with those of last year. We know that the cotton program of this past summer was one of the major contributing factors to this improvement. The south has already experienced to a considerable degree the beneficial results of a production control program. and we in Washington recognize the adjustment administration was successful because of the immediate and intelligent cooperation of the cotton farmers. The administration is confident that the same spirit will characterize this second step in the adjustment of cotton production."

The organization, under the direction of the extension forces. will be developed around the 22,000 volunteer workers who participated in the emergency adjustment campaign of 1933.

The cotton acreage reduction campaign will be conducted in twelve counties of New Mexico where cotton is grown to considerable extent.

It will call for a \$2 a gallon levy on spirits, \$5 a barrel on beer, retain present import duties on wines. spirits and brew, all the revenue from these sources, estimated at more than \$500,000,000, to go

into the federal treasury. The president's budget message will be received by congress on the second day of the session. Indications are that the president, under the authority granted him in the economy act, may restore percent of the federal pay cut effective January 1, in view of increased living costs. The budget for the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, provides for restora-

tion of the full 15 percent. The general revenue revision measure, designed to raise about \$270,000,000 through tightening up of the administrative provisions of the income tax law, is scheduled for passage before March 15, the day returns are to be filed by individuals and corporations.




