**Birthstone Origin Is** Traced to 4000 B. C. Recent findings of historians lead science to believe the custom of de

signing birthstones according to the month in which a person was born had its origin 6,000 years ago. Their beginnings are traced to certain Egyptian hieroglyphics linked with ancient beliefs in magic. The story of their origin is traced back to about 4000 B. C., according to an article in the Field Museum News. In that period the high priest of Memphis wore a breastplate made up of twelve small objects representing Egyptian hieroglyphics. The custom was adopted later by ancient Hebrews who had been prisoners in Egypt. They made similar breastplates for Aaron, their own high priest. The Hebrew version was composed of twelve large gems, each representing one of the tribes of Israel.

As time went on the twelve stones, originally associated with the twelve tribes of Israel, became associated with the twelve angles of Paradise; the twelve foundations of heaven, the twelve apostles, and finally the twelve months of the year. From the last developed the birthstone idea.

Wearing of birthstones originated in Poland some time during the Seventeenth or Eighteenth century. Birthstones for the various months are: January, garnet; February, amethyst; March, bloodstone or aquamarine; April. diamond; May, emerald; June, pearl; July, ruby; August sardonyx or peridot; September, sapphire; October, opal; November, topaz, and December, turquoise.
