House Committee That Has Important Duties

The committee on ways and means in the house of representatives is the most powerful and important of all the standing committees of congress. The Constitution provides that all bills raising revenue and imposing taxes must originate in the house, and all such bills are considered and approved by the ways and means committee before they are taken up by the house as a whole. This means that all tariff legislation must go through this committee. It considered and approved all the Liberty loan acts to finance the World War and it dealt with the refunding of all the debts of the various countries owed the United States at the close of the war. Formerly the speaker of the house appointed the members of the house to the various committees. When the Democrats organized the house in 1931, they placed this responsibility in the hands of the Democratic members of the ways and means committee.—Pathfinder Magazine.

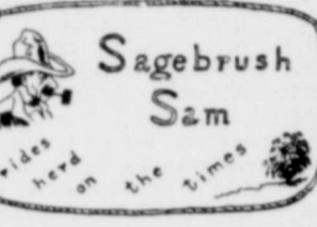

STANOLIND TO TREAT THIRTY HOBBS WELLS

An acid treatment tank of the Stanolind Oil & Gas Company arrived in Hobbs last week from Tulsa, Oklahoma. The outfit will be here around 90 days, under orders to give the treatment to from 25 to 30 of the Stanolind wells in the Hobbs field.

For the acid test program of the Stanolind carload lots of the acid will be shipped into Hobbs. The charge for a test is 1,000 fluid gallons, composed of 500 gallons of pure acid, diluted with an equal amount of water.

The object of these acid treatments is to increase the potential output of a well; following the treatment the well is temporarily shut in, and then given an oil run test. Increase of the potential capacity increases the comparative allowable, for a particular producer, theoretically always, and practically if other wells do not show a like potential capacity increase.

There have been some very radical changes in potential production in the Hobbs field by use of the acid test. About six weeks ago one well, Continental No. 1, was given the acid treatment when it had a potential capacity of 1,700 barrels. We are reliably told that the treatment increased the potential capacity to 17,000 barrels.—Hobbs News.

INCOME TAX REVENUE IS NOT PROMISING

WASHINGTON—The federal government is getting down to the grim business of collecting taxes on a shrunken 1933 income, with the prospect that collections this year will amount to less than the \$720,458,000 of last year which were the smallest in 16 years.

Because of indications that taxable income, both personal and corporate, was lower during and after the bank crisis last spring, income for the taxable year of \$5,000 or over, regardless of the amount on his net income.

Last year some 1,864,000 of the returns filed were taxable and about 1,895,000 were non-taxable. Internal revenue officials point out that returns must be filed by those who fall within the three classes listed above regardless of the fact that the exemption of \$2,500 allowed the head of a family, plus the credit of \$400 for each dependant, may render the returns non-taxable.

The tax rates are the same as last year—4 per cent on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of personal exemption, credit for dependants, etc., and 8 per cent on the remainder of such excess amount. The sur-tax rates apply to net incomes in excess of \$6,000. A 10 per cent deduction for earned income has been proposed in congress, no earned income credit is allowed by the current revenue act and therefore cannot be taken for 1933.

SOUTHERN UNION TO BE SUED FOR BACK TAXES

Information from the state tax commission says a tax suit will be instituted against the Southern Union Gas Co., to collect delinquent taxes in six counties where this company operates. Delinquencies go back as far as 1931 at which date a partial payment was made.

Amount of delinquency in various counties as shown by the records in the tax commission office is given:

Roosevelt, 1932 and 1933, \$1,325; San Juan county, 1931 to 1933 inclusive, \$22,000; McKinley county, 1931 to 1933, \$3,147; Sandoval county, 1931 to 1933, \$3,519; Eddy county, 1931 to 1933, \$9,449; Rio Arriba county, 1932 and 1933, \$1,349; Curry county, 1932 and 1933, \$8,865. Total, \$88,885.

The above figures do not include interest and penalty which would bring the total to above \$100,000, commission officials said.

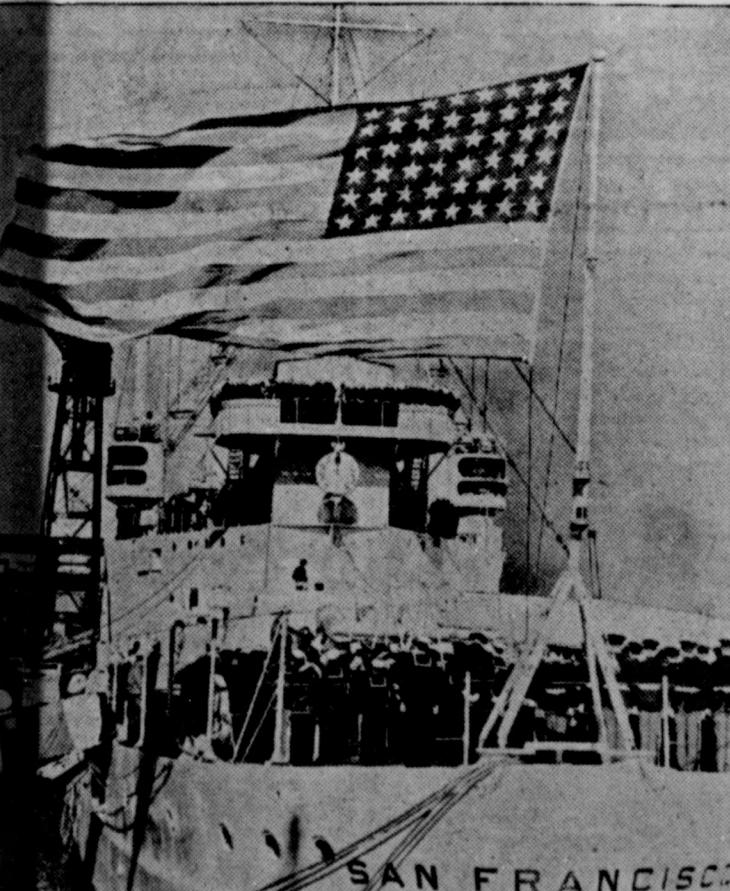

Two-Way Police Radio System

Cruiser San Francisco Commissioned



The 10,000 ton cruiser San Francisco, sporting nine 8-inch guns and four 5-inch guns, was commissioned at Mare Island navy yard, California, the keel of the cruiser was laid in September, 1931, and it was launched March, last year. Capt. Royal E. Ingersoll took command of the craft N. M. After the Navy department commissioning order was read, with the crew of 500 and several hundred guests at attention.
