Yung Is Tabbed For Banquet

The annual Athletic Banquet honoring athletic students of Bovina High School will be held Friday, May 15, at 7:30 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. Tickets will be \$6 and may be purchased from any athletic student. Only 300 tickets will be sold, so persons wishing to attend are urged to purchase tickets early.

Bill Yung, head football coach at West Texas State University, will be the guest speaker at the banquet.

In Yung's four years on the WTSU campus, he and his staff have fashioned the school's only two outright Missouri Valley Conference Championships in WT's history. The first title came in 1977 when most pre-season prognosticators placed the Buffs near the cellar.

Yung is in almost constant demand to speak at luncheons, banquets, and civic meetings. He is one of the most recognizable figures in the entire Texas Panhandle. His undying optimism and infectious style mark him as a wanted man on the speaker circuit.

A strong believer in and active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Yung tempers the stereotyped image of many collegiate coaches with his total commitment to the Christian way of life.

A deacon with the First Baptist Church in Canyon, he says his first move when he was offered the WTSU job "was to get down on my knees and thank the Lord."

Yung and his wife Esther have two children, Martin, a senior at Carson-Newman College, and Cindy, a freshman at Texas Tech.

Aycock Named County Attorney

Appointment of Charles Aycock, Farwell attorney, as County Attorney, highlighted the regular session of the Parmer County Commissioners meeting Monday, April 27, in Farwell.

A letter of resignation was accepted by the court from former County Attorney Johnny Actkinson, due to his appointment as the new District Attorney for the new civil district for Parmer and Bailey counties.

After considerable discussion with the appointee, the court voted unanimously for Aycock to fill the vacancy.

Upon suggestion by County Treasurer Benna Felts, a motion was passed to invest \$100,000 in Farm to Market road funds in a certificate of deposit to mature July 31, 1981.

The court voted to pay the expenses of County Judge Porter Roberts to an education session for non-lawyer judges in Austin May 4-5-6.

A motion was also passed to advertise for the purchase of a shredder for a Case 910 tractor for Precinct 1, with bids to be opened on May 22, at 11 a.m.

A letter was received from County Judge Glen Williams of Bailey County, stating that the bookmobile vehicle had been sold to Ector County for \$5,000.

The following farmers have been billed for conservation work,

performed on their property by county equipment: Ben Mesman, \$192.50; Troy Christian, \$245; Bob Jones, \$26.25; and Gerald Curtis, \$35.00.

Letters of appreciation were noted from Tom Jarboe, superintendent of Friona Schools, for the school's share of books from the Bookmobile program, and from Weldon Moody, for the radio purchased for his state car.

A bill was approved from court reporter Georganna Robinett for \$216.00.

County Extension Agent Seth Ralston reported that eight 4-H Club boys in the rifle club have qualified for the district contest. Twelve 4-H members went to Lubbock for a district 4-H judging contest. County 4-H'ers won first place in beef cattle judging and a second place in swine judging.

Both Ralston and agent Laura Jacobs were out of their offices the last of the week for meetings in Lubbock and Big Spring. In addition, Miss Jacobs was to judge a method demonstration contest at Tulia.

Due to the commissioners court needing to be in District Court May 11, and the Memorial Holiday on May 25, a motion was passed that the May meetings of the Commissioners be held May 8 and 22, on Fridays rather than Mondays.



Cakes, pies and other baked goods will be for sale. Residents are urged to take advantage of this occasion, and let the Woman's Club do your Sunday baking this week.

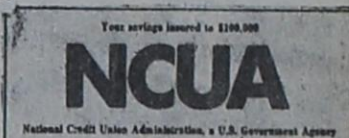

TORNADOS
 If one struck, would you know what to do?

Tornados respect no geographic boundaries. Over the last five years 4,245 tornados have touched down in 46 different states. While they can occur anytime, March through August are considered the "danger" months. State Farm Fire and Casualty, a major home insurer, offers the following suggestions to help you get ready for the coming tornado season.

GETTING PREPARED

- Know how to get emergency weather information in your community and know what it means.
- A National Weather Service "tornado watch" means conditions are right for tornados to form.
- A "tornado warning" means a tornado has been sighted, take cover.
- Most communities use sirens or horns to warn of a tornado sighting; know what your system is and what it means.
- Plan and practice what your family will do in case of a tornado.
- Have a prearranged place in your home (basement if you have one or interior room or under stairway if you don't) to go for shelter.
- If you're in a mobile home, get out. If a shelter is available, go to it. If not, lie in a ditch or other depression.
- If you're in a car, get out. Lie in a ditch or other low area.
- Be sure you have the right kind of insurance and enough of it to cover all damage a tornado could do.
- Make an inventory of everything in your house and keep it in a safe place away from home (like a safe deposit box). It will be a great help in speeding payment for your losses.

IF IT HAPPENS

- Cooperate fully with law enforcement and disaster service officials. Check your local news media for instructions and information on emergency services available.
- Notify your insurance agent of your loss as soon as possible. He can advise you what to do next.
- Stay with your property to guard against vandalism or looting until law enforcement agencies organize protection.
- Protect against additional damage, board up broken windows or holes in the walls or roof, cover or otherwise protect furnishings from further damage by rain or wind. If necessary, have utilities turned off to prevent damage from explosion or fire.
- Don't be rushed into signing repair contracts. Fly-by-night repairmen often prey on tornado victims. Be sure you know with whom you're dealing. Your insurance agent or adjuster should be able to help, or ask your Better Business Bureau or friends or relatives to recommend someone.
- Keep receipts for all repairs and additional living expenses. Most homeowners insurance contracts will reimburse these costs; casualty losses exceeding \$100 that aren't reimbursed are generally tax deductible.

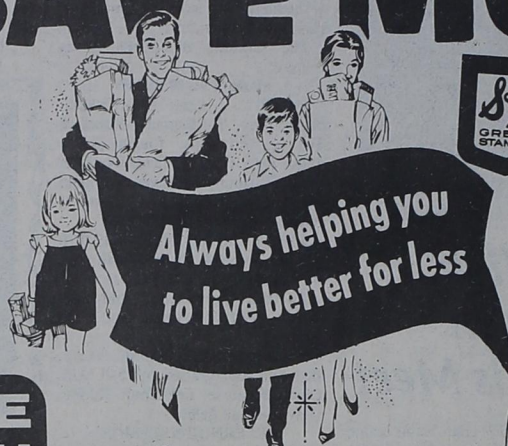
