HIDDEN TAX LURKS IN INSURANCE PLAN

WASHINGTON-A brand new 'hidden tax" will be levied upon American consumers if the pro-posed unemployment insurance bill is passed by congress, according to views expressed by opponents of the measure who appeared before the house ways and means

In addition to reaching into consumers' pockets for another subtle tax toll, the bill would drive industry faster and faster toward mechanization, declared John C. Gall, associate counsel of the National Association of Manufacturers, in a formal statement before the ways and means com-

Pointing out that "employers pay men, not machines,' Mr. Gall stressed that under operation of the unemployment insurance bill "the one who has better machinery pays less tax because his payroll is less." Then he asked:

"Can there be any question that the normal tendency of the bill will be to depress wages, since The increase registered among the higher the payroll, the greater

Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins admitted that funds raised by the bill would be levied upon consumers. She told the committee that the "passing along" process would be done "painlessly by a very minute rise in prices.'
