





#### Motherhood Tax

American mothers pay an annual tax of approximately six In New Mexico the tax is omewhat higher-in excess of eight mills. It is paid not in money but in life. In New Mexico eight mothers die for every 1,000 babies that are born alive.

The tax is too high. "Wherever urveys have been conducted," says the Maternity Center Association, the same conclusion has been drawn-that two-thirds of the

women who die, die needlessly." In fifteen states, the Children's Bureau investigated a total of ,380 deaths from causes connected with maternity. Interviews with attendants were conducted by physicians on the staffs of the State Boards of Health or the Children's Bureau.
