in Southwestern France

Loudres is a town of southwestern France in the department of Hautes-Pyrenees, at the foot of the Pyranees. It is divided into an old and new town. The old quarter is united with the new town by a bridge that is continued in an esplanade leading to the basilica, the church of the Rosary and the Grotto, with its spring of healing water.

The origin of the Lourdes is uncertain. 


