





This stunt is like almost every other athletic feat-you have to know how to do it before you can succeed. Then, when you know how, you have to practice. Here's the way to break an apple:

Grasp the apple with both hands, closing your palms over it, so that the fingers of one hand are pointing in the opposite direction from the fingers of the other. 


#### TINGLEY RBCALL MOVE IS DEFEATED BY A 6 TO 1 VOTE

ALBUQUERQUE-Clyde Tingley, chairman of the Albuquerque city commission, was victor Tuesday night when he defeated a move to recall him by a majority of slightly less than six to one in a special city election held at Albuquerque Tuesday.

Tingley carried every voting place and the vote late Tuesday night stood 5,627 against recall and 946 for recall. The vote cast was slightly more than cast in the regular city election last April when Tingley was re-elected by a three to one majority.

His recall was demanded re-cently by a group of citizens who obtained over 1,000 signatures to the recall petition. No charges were ever preferred in the petition which made the election mandatory as long as it contained the proper number of signatures. The recall election aroused little interest although several meetings were held by organizations for both sides in the issue.


