WASHINGTON—A cotton crop IS Approved of 9,443,000 bales was reported Monday by the Department of Agriculture as being indicated by conditions October 1.

Indications a month ago were for a crop of 9,252,000 bales, while wo months ago a crop of 9,195,000 bales was indicated. Production Construction Expected to field yesterday afternoon, at which time F. A. Coffee of State last year was 13,047,262 bales, while two years ago it was 13,-002,000 bales and in 1931 it was 17,095,000 bales.

The condition of the crop on October 1 was 55.9 per cent of normal, compared with 53.8 per cent a month ago, 66.7 per cent a year ago, and 56.2 per cent, the 1923-32 average on October 1.

An estimate that 16,846,322 persons were either unemployed or United States the first three months of 1934 was announced at San Francisco Sunday by a Boston delegate to the American Federation of Labor convention on the basis of a governmentsponsored survey in Massachusetts. The total of actually unemployed was placed at 9,326,514 by Robert J. Watt, representing the Labor, who made public the report he will submit to the AGOL convention probably today.

The result of the survey, he said, indicates previous estimates of the total unemployed or working only part time are "far too conservative."

Canvass in Massachusetts disclosed, Watt announced, that of 1,808,840 persons able and willing to work, 34.5 per cent or 624,526 were "either unemployed or working only temporarily on a parttime basis" the first quarter of 1934.

TWO KINDS OF TAX REDUCTION

There are two kinds of tax reduction.

One may be termed "political" tax reduction. This, the most common type, is characterized by financial slight-of-hand which attempts to persuade the public that it is possible to lower taxes and at the same time spend more money. Its usual method is to give the citizen back one dollar to put in his pocket-while smoothly taking two dollars out of another pocket. To provide a concrete example, it will lower taxes on real estate a bit, and at the same time boost on income on investments, or on commodities.

Then there is "real" tax reduction-a very rare type in these times. It appreciates the fact that there is one, and only one way by which government can reduce costs-spending less money. When government retrenches, eliminates waste, duplication of activity and unnecessary bureaus, the citizen

That is what the country needs now-and nothing could contribute more to the furtherance of recovery. Millions of dollars are going to the tax collector which, if released to private industry, would be used to provide jobs, to raise wages, to pay interest on and directors of the association. securities, to provide industrial development. Industry is stagnant today. And the size of its tax bill, which is still growing, is as much to blame as any other item.

'The average man," concludes the author of this little statistical study, "is a capitalist. He has no patience with socialism or communism as he understands these philosophies, though recently he has been taking doses of both under misleading labels."

It might be well . . . to keep these simple facts in mind . The average man cannot be very confident if he does not know that he is going to keep his job. He cannot be confident if he cannot count on the maintenance of the purchasing power of his income. He cannot be confident if he cannot look forward to a measure of security for himself and his family in his later years as a reward for hard work and thrift. And he cannot be confident unless he is assured that business is on the mend.-New York Herald Tribune.
