



WASHINGTON-A new threat to American cattle herds, an aftermath of the drought that may extend its ill effects far into the future, is outlined in a warning to farmers by the Department of Agriculture. The threat lies in a shortage

of vitamin A.

Vitamin A is destroyed when pastures turn dry and brown under the searing heat of weeks of sunshine. It is hidden in the green color of grass. When the grass loses its green, the vitamin A mysteriously melts away. Without plentiful vitamin

suffer serious consequences. The preventive for these evils is feeding the cattle green fodder as much as possible before the winter, so that they can store up a woman who already had dis-

But because of the drought, green fodder is scarce this year. vitamin A is alfalfa hay.

SEVEN TEACHERS IN INDIAN SCHOOLS SUSPENDED

Secretary of the Interior, Harold L. Ickes, has ordered the suspension of seven teachers of Indian children in the southwest section, pending a searching investigation into charges that these teachers have resorted to medieval forms of discipline.

Corporal punishment in Indian schools was forbidden by regulation four years ago. That regulation has been reinforced by explanation and otherwise at superintendents' conferences for the last three years, according to a report to Secretary Ickes by Mr. John Collier, Commissioner of Indian Affairs. The report includes instonces of beatings by teachers, compulsions to kneel for many hours on concrete floors and other forms of humiliating punishment of boys and girls. Such methods of discipline "will not be tolerated," Mr. Ickes said.

Commenting on the report, Mr. Collier stated that it is the purmost enlightened and modern methods of education."

"Indian parents are, for the most part," he said, "retiring and quite defenseless, and it is up to the Indian Service to see that the Artesian Basin to the extent of children are handled properly."







COTTON CROP OF 9,634,000 BALES IS FORECAST BY GOVT.


