Contest for Long Term Senate Seat Appears Likely; Near Finals on Other Races Show Big Pluralities for Demos.

The United States senate, being election of the members, probable will have the question of New Mexico's senior senator to decide, it was reported at Santa

Fe yesterday. There appeared to be little oubt that Congressman Dennis Chavez, democrat, would contest he apparent election of Senator Bronson Cutting, republican, who, on the basis of Associated Press election bureau figures yesterday. official from 26 of the state's 31 counties, was leading by 1,-183 votes. Three other counties were complete and two lacked only 170 absentee votes if all were cast that were mailed out. That did not happen in any other

SANTA FE-Democrats continued yesterday to claim election republican, who had a lead in Associated Press election bureau figures of 1,186 with the state complete, 23 of the 31 counties official, five complete but unofficial and three lacking a few absentee votes.

In the state's 761 precincts complete, the vote was Cutting 76,986, Chavez 74,900.

Revisions from complete figures by Harding and Union counties reduced Cutting's lead by 200 in the day, but he picked up in some other counties, nearly offsetting this loss. The three counties not offic-

ially reported were Mora, Rio Arriba and Guadalupe. In the latter county the count was delayed by refusal of the republican chairman to go to the postoffice for the absentee ballots. No reason was given.

Overwhelming of the national and state candidates were shown in nearly complete reports compiled by the Associated Press.





Chief Function of a Bank

One of the most important duties within a bank is planning the use of the bank's funds available for loans. If money is not loaned the bank cannot stay in business. On the other hand, the bank must look to the future and make loans based on the borrower's ability to pay—other-wise it will not be in business long.

Borrowers should remember that a bank wants proof of ability to repay the money borrowed. Sufficient collateral alone does not always prompt a banker to say "yes" regarding a loan, because the basis of loans is not how much collateral one can pledge but whether one can show a definite, reliable source of repayment with which to liquidate


