



# Tax Regimentation Suggested By Oil Men At Dallas Meeting

Barrel In Taxes, While Earnings Were Only One-Fifth of This Total

Last year the petroleum in-dustry paid \$1.11 in taxes on each barrel of crude oil and its derivatives. Its total tax bill amounted to \$1,004,824,028, while earnings were only one-fifth of that amount, \$204,000,000. These figures were brought be

fore the American Petroleum Institute at its annual meeting in Dallas, Texas, recently by Baird H. Markham, director of the American Petroleum Industries Committee, to illustrate the serious tax situation faced by producers, refiners, and marketers of oil and its products. He pointed out that from 1931 to 1933, inclusive, the average market price of a barrel of crude was 72 cents, and the cost of production was 80.6 cents, to show the oil business is not as profitable as many people believe. Sales taxes upon gasoline aver-
