Government To Purchase 1,000,000 Head Cattle In The Drought Area of grazing district meetings will be held at Alamogordo, February 16.

DENVER—One million head of cattle starving or dying of thirst in the eastern drouth areas, will be purchased by the federal government, Harry L. Petrie, head of the cattle and sheep section of the AAA announced Tuesday.

The government already has purchased approximately 7,500,000 cats.

The 1,000,000 quota will be allotted to the various states soon by this office, Petrie said. The cattle will be purchased from about 100,000 cattle growers who will receive between \$140 and \$150 each. They will be processed and the meat distributed to needy families.

The nuts are roasted, blanched to remove the skins, and the "heart" or germ is taken out, to prevent the butter from becoming rancid too easily. The chosen varieties are automatically blended in the desired proportion, usually about half and half, as they go into the grinder, and about three per cent of salt is added as they go thru the mill. That is the only ingredient, other than the nuts themselves, in peanut butter.

The nuts are roasted, blanched to remove the skins, and the "heart" or germ is taken out, to prevent the butter from becoming rancid too easily. The chosen varieties are automatically blended in the desired proportion, usually about half and half, as they go into the grinder, and about three per cent of salt is added as they go thru the mill. That is the only ingredient, other than the nuts themselves, in peanut butter.


