Health Column The Public Health Nurse


> What is a public health nurse? What does she do and how is she

prepared for her duties? Above all she is a teacher. She teaches mothers how to dress and feed their babies so that the babies will not fall ill, how to protect the home from flies, the water supply from contamination. She teaches the older girls so that when they become mothers they will know what to do: how to prepare for the coming of children and how to care for them as they grow up. She teaches sometimes in groups which is more economical, sometimes in the home which is most effectual. She has not time to teach classes in all the schools but she tries to find time to see all the school children and to consult with school teachers about their school health programs, the lighting, ventilation and sanitary facilities of the school, and the health problems of individual children.

A public health nurse is not a public nurse. She cannot possibly find time to nurse all the sick. But dered a blanket bath?
