HAS THIS BEEN A GOOD year for cotton, or what??? Sunday before last, Ye Editor was driving home from Lubbock, and as a lark, decided to count the number of cotton modules along the way.

Counted a whopping 422 modules along the way, not including those on the gin yards, and of this number, some 100 were just off Highway 214 in Parmer County.

Made another trip this week, and didn't have the time or inclination to count, but would venture to guess that the number of modules had doubled in the week's time. Since a module contains approximately nine bales, you can see how much cotton this represents, and it's just a narrow strip along the highway.

This sort of set Ye Editor to thinking about how the growing and harvesting of cotton has changed since he was a kid growing up in the cotton fields in Bailey County--particularly the harvest method.

I attended small country schools throughout my grade school years, and the three-room (eight grade) school where I began (Baileyboro) would turn out each fall for the cotton harvest season.

This was back before the days of strict regulation from the Texas Education Agency. Can't recall just how long the school "recess" lasted. May have been until most of the cotton had been hand-pulled. Perhaps the school board members (who themselves were undoubtedly cotton farmers--or ginners) made a tour and decided it was time to go back to classwork.

In those days of course, 100 per cent of the cotton was harvested by hand. And, while there were cases where a harvest crew might come out to work for the farmers (usually in a tarpaulin-covered pickup, out of Clovis, N.M.), most of the cotton pulling was accomplished by the farmer and members of his family.

Ye Editor recalls the first crude "cotton stripper" that our family used. It was basically just a long, low wooden wagon with a set of "teeth" in front. The trouble with this first model of stripper was that it got everything--stalk and all.

Later on, we graduated to the type of stripper which was in use for a number of years--the type that threw the cotton up into the trailer. Someone had to pitchfork the cotton back and tramp it down while the stripper was being pulled.

Believe it or not, we thought we had progressed from the days of being down on your knees, or bending your back while pulling a cotton sack down the rows of cotton, and having the cotton burs stick your fingers after holes developed in the old cotton gloves.

For a number of years, farmers still preferred to have the "first pulling" done by hand, when about half of the cotton was open, and then use the stripper to finish up when the rest of the bolls were open.

These days, everything is machine-stripped, and the strippers have come a long way, baby. Today's basket-type strippers separate out the green bolls and even the leaves to some extent. You can even harvest during high winds, which used to be impossible.

Through the building of modules, all of a field can now be harvested, and this gets around the old bug-a-boo of the cotton harvest--having to wait on trailers from the gin.

It used to be that unless you had a large fleet of trailers you had to put off the cotton stripping, sometimes when the weather was favorable, and take the risk of wet weather causing a delay, which it usually did.

Yes, the methods have changed considerably in the past 40-50 years--about as much as they did after Eli Whitney's invention. Wonder if they will find ways of changing the procedure that much during the next half-century?

Hospital Reminds Of Survey Forms

The Parmer County Community Hospital Board of Directors is reminding the residents of Friona, Bovina and the surrounding areas to complete and return the survey form mailed recently.

The survey form, page 2 of a 4 page letter is requesting input from the local residents concerning funding for the local community owned facility.

Additional outside funding is needed for the facility to upgrade and replace equipment and services, recruit and retain health care professionals, and help recruit and retain physicians within the community.

The methods of obtaining needed capital is explained in the letter. While exact amounts are not known at this time, methods of

raising capital are available through the formation of a hospital district which has taxing authority, a local tax, private contributions, or a combination of the above.

"Your input by responding to the survey questions will be used by the Board of Directors in making the important decisions affecting your hospital and the future of health care in Parmer County," said a spokesman for the hospital.

The survey may be returned by dropping the postage-paid self-addressed survey form into the mail.

If you failed to receive your survey form, one may be picked up at the clinic front desk during regular clinic hours or by calling 247-2754 and the survey form will be mailed to you.

Temps Drop To Lowest Of Season

The temperature in the local area dropped to a reading of 17 degrees here Wednesday morning.

Any agricultural producer who plans to use any restricted-use pesticide is required to be licensed to purchase or apply restricted-use chemicals.

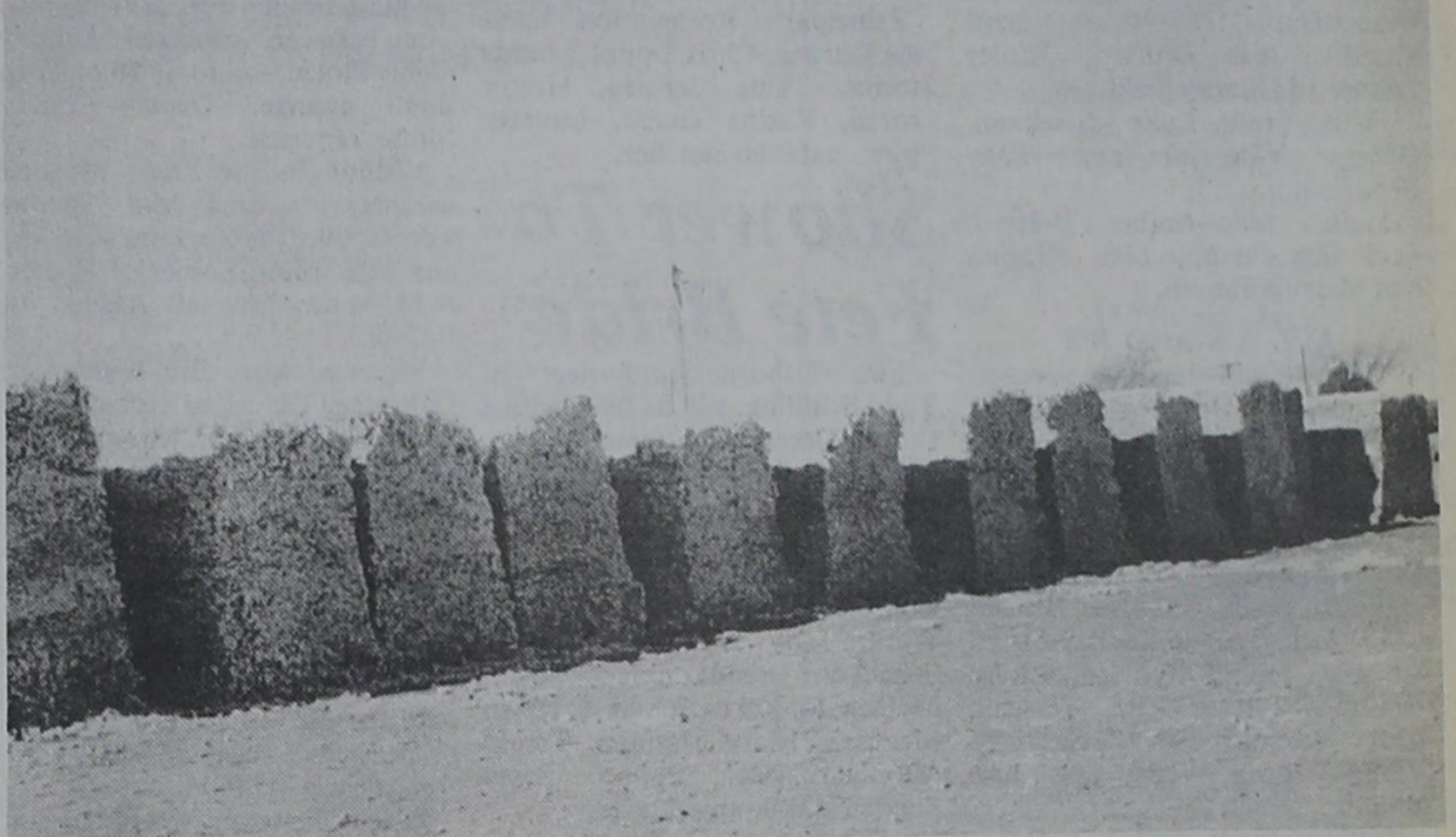

Their next regular meeting will be held on January 8, 1991.



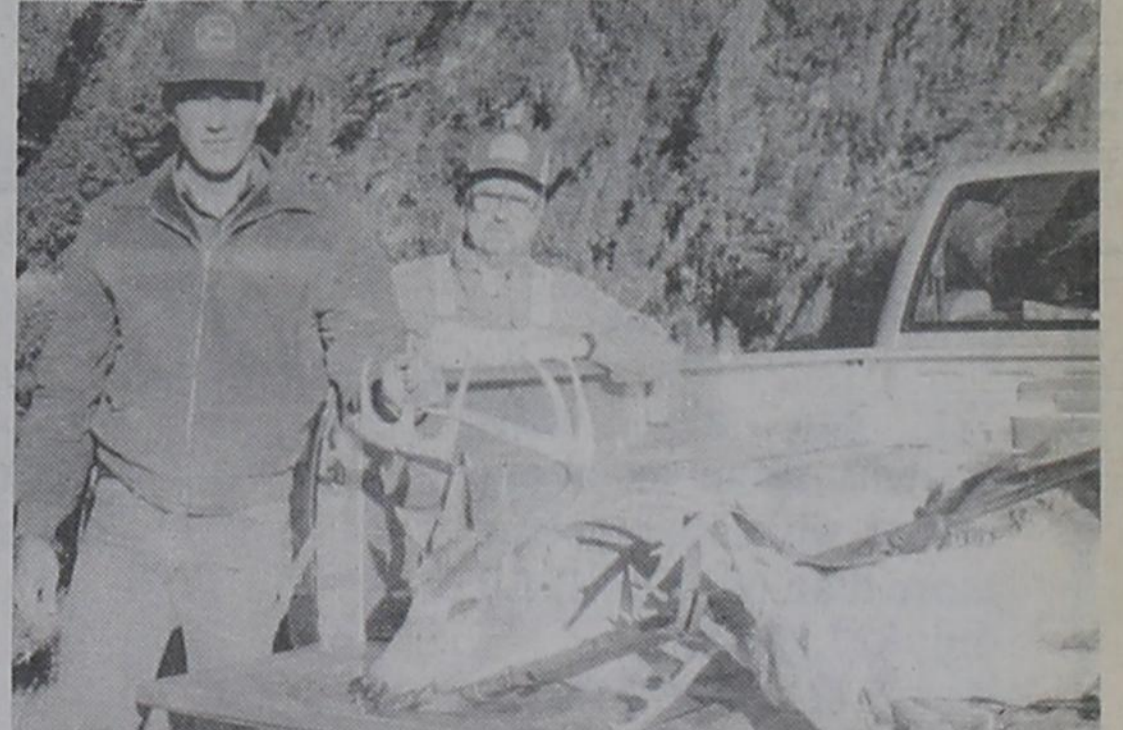

FmHA Supports Farm Safety For "Just Kids"

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture, has selected the Farm Safety for "Just Kids" program as its public service project for 1990-91, through its Wellness Program's Public Safety Campaign, according to Bobby H. Murphy, FmHA County Supervisor for Parmer County.

Farm Safety for "Just Kids" is a non-profit organization dedicated to educating parents and children about farm injury prevention. This organization stresses raising awareness levels regarding on-farm hazards. Each year, farm accidents result in the death of 300 young people and 5,000 serious injuries. The primary age group effected is 5-14 years old.

Murphy stated, "FmHA's involvement in the program will enable Farm Safety for 'Just Kids' to reach a national audience for the first time."

Educational material including a film, safety fact sheet, warning decals and children's workbooks will be distributed by FmHA personnel throughout Texas. Over 13,000 FmHA employees, nationwide, will help spread the farm safety message to schools and the general public.

A Cornell University study reveals that children bear the brunt of farm accidents when the injury rate is adjusted to account for the time each worker is in the work

place. In 1988, 35.6 per cent of farm accident victims were children ranging in age from 5-14 years.

There are three factors today which may be aggravating the dangers for children: (1) Increased mechanization; (2) New safety hazards--50 per cent of the ATV accidents (900 deaths over five years) have involved children; and (3) Stressful economic conditions.

"We believe Farmers Home Administration in Texas can make a tremendous contribution to this organization in reaching thousands of children and young adults in rural areas that would have otherwise been missed," Murphy concluded.

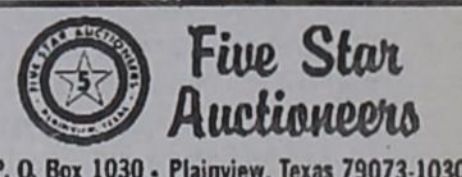

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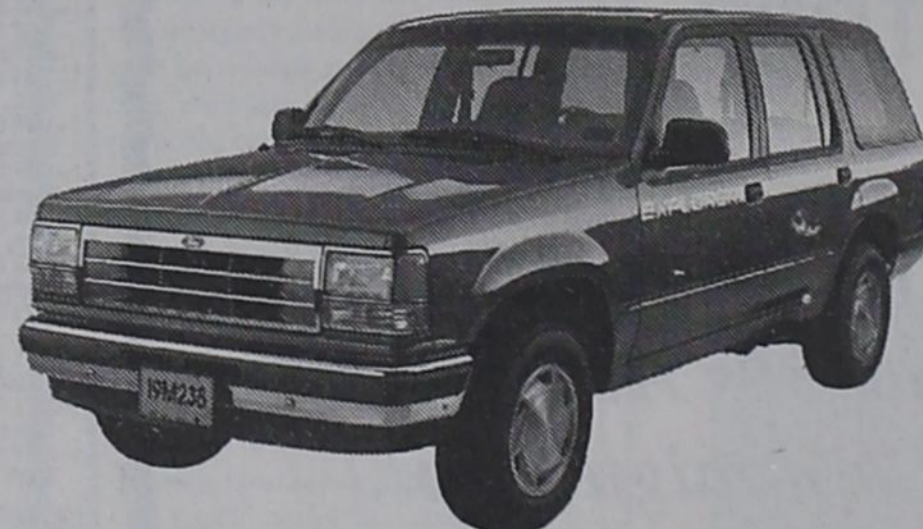
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
