ONE THING THAT we have attempted to do this fall in our football contest, by having extra games for the fans to pick, is to expand on the number of pro games on the contest slate.

In the past, we usually had one or two NFL games. This fall, as a general rule, we have attempted to pick out the top three NFL games each week for our contest.

For the most part, the games we have chosen have truly turned out to be among the best games of the week, and this past weekend was no exception.

Those of you who follow the contest will recall that of the three pro games on the slate last weekend, Houston came from behind in the fading minutes to edge Miami, 20-19; the Philadelphia Eagles edged the New York Giants, 13-10 on a last-minute field goal, and the St. Louis Cardinals pulled the rug out from under the Washington Redskins, 20-17 in the hectic "sudden death" finish seen on television.

It's always gratifying when our contest games turn out to be the cliff-hanging variety such as these three we mention, although we realize that it may at the same time be giving the contest leaders a case of ulcers, especially when they see a game they thought they had wrapped up be "snatched away" such as the St. Louis-Washington game might have been for some.

In addition to the three pro games last week, three of the six college games on the contest were decided by a touchdown or less, and two of the five high school games were by three points or less. One of the college games that wasn't so close was still a big upset--Pittsburgh's 34-20 win over Notre Dame.

We just wanted you to know that we work at making the games hard, so if they seem that way when you fill out your form each week, we at the Blade office can utter a fiendish laugh.

++++ SPEAKING OF THE contest, we note that next week's issue of the Blade will come out on the Thanksgiving week. Since some contestants may be leaving town early due to the long holiday weekend, we want you to know that we will have the contest games picked out by Monday noon, if you want to call or come by for the list.,

That way, those of you who plan to leave early may get a list of the games and have a chance to study it a little before picking the games. We plan to possibly have the Blade out earlier than usual, but we'll be happy to have you come by to get a list of the games if you wish.

Also, on that last week of the contest, we're planning to have an earier than usual deadline for the contest--Friday noon. It's all because of the Texas-Texas A&M battle, which will be for all the marbles in the Southwest Conference. The Longhorn-Aggie game will be at 1:30 that Friday afternoon, and will be on national television.

We think it's a natural to lead our final week's contest off with that game, so be prepared to get your entries in earlier than usual. And if you mail your entries, you'll have to make sure they bear a November 28 "A.M." postmark.

DICUFFA DROPS BEHIND

A.M. Wilson Holds 2-Point Lead In Cotton Bowl Race

A.M. Wilson has emerged as the man to beat in the 1975 Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest. Wilson survived a weekend of several upsets in the high school, college and pro football ranks to take over a solid two point lead in the total point standings with only this week and next remaining in this year's contest.

Wilson, with 12 correct predictions last week, has 120 points in the contest, followed by Mary Jane Wilson (his wife) with 118 points, Wilson DiCuffa with 115 points and Tommy DeLeon with 114 points. DiCuffa had been tied with Wilson for the previous two weeks, but only came up with seven correct predictions last week to fall five points behind.

Maria Telles won first place prize money last week. Mrs. Telles also had 12 correct predictions, but beat Wilson out on her tiebreaker

prediction. Mrs. Telles missed the Colorado win over Kansas and the Pittsburgh upset over Notre Dame. She picked Hart to win over Bovina, 37-6, 14 points off the actual 51-6

Wilson missed the Sudan upset over Sundown and the Pittsburgh win over Notre Dame and picked Hart, 28-7, 24 points off. Nick Telles took third place money on his tiebreaker prediction over five other contestants with 11 correct predictions. Telles missed the Colorado win over Kansas, the Pittsburgh-Notre Dame game and the McNeese win over West Texas State University. He predicted a 38-6 Hart win, 13 points off the game score.

Of the 117 entries last week, 16 had 10 right, 27 had nine, 27 had eight, 25 had seven, six had six, seven had five and one contestant had four correct predictions.

Other contestants with 11 correct predictions were Johnny Curtis, Mrs. Wilson and Dorothy Harris, each of whom missed the Sudan-Sundown, Pitt-Notre Dame and Houston-Miami games. Curtis picked Hart, 38-12, 19 points off; Mrs. Wilson picked Hart, 30-7, 22 points off; and Mrs. Harris picked Hart, 29-16, 32 points off. Also with 11 correct predictions were Furne Harris, who missed the Friona win over Morton, the Pitt win over Notre Dame and the St. Louis win over Washington; and Sandy Ware, who missed the Levelland win over Canyon, the Pitt-Notre Dame and St. Louis-Washington games. Mrs. Harris picked Bovina, 20-19, 46 points off the score, and Mrs. Ware picked Bovina, 14-13, 46 points off the

Only two weeks remain in the 1975 contest with the leader in total points at the end of the event winning two tickets to the Cotton Bowl in Dallas on New Years Day along with \$30 expense money. The runner-up will receive two tickets to the Sun Bowl game in El Paso along with \$20 cash. In the event of a tie for first or second place at the end of the contest, the contestants' tiebreaker scores will be used to determine the

Lions Slate Annual Decorations Contest

PAUL CRUME

Cancer Claims Big D' Writer

Paul Crume, front page columnist for the Dallas Morning News and former resident of the Oklahoma Lane-Lariat community, died Sunday at Dallas. Services were held Monday afternoon at the Cochran Chapel United Methodist Church with burial in Hillcrest Memorial

Mr. Crume, 63, joined the staff of the Dallas newspaper in 1936. He had known of his terminal cancer for almost a year, but continued writing his "Big D" column until four days before his death.

His final column appeared Thursday and he wrote of death with his typical Crume humor.

"The courts continue their gradual enslavement of the people. The judge who has been trying the Karen Quinlan case up in New Jersey has now declared that nobody has a constitutional right to

"The question of the constitutionality of dying raises some interesting questions about basic law. We have searched the

Constitution diligently and can find in it no constitutional right to be born. We are talking about the United States Constitution. Nobody can find anything in the Texas Constitution.

Mr. Crume was born in Alpena Pass, Ark. He moved with his family to Parmer County when he was 11. At the age of 12, he went to work part-time as a printer's devil, sweeper-outer and staff reporter for the State Line Tribune at Farwell.

He was graduated from the University of Texas at Austin in 1936 and joined the News staff in June of that same year. Except for four years as a U.S. Navy officer in World War II, Mr. Crume has worked for the News since that time.

Many of his columns concerned his boyhood in Parmer County and had the flavor of the Panhandle. In the early 1960s, he wrote of Lariat: "..it is about to progress me out of anything to write about. Lariat has matured. It has a population of two hundred. It has a tree, which gives it (Continued on Page 2)

Sales Tax Check Sent To Bovina

Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$14.5 million to 670 cities and towns Friday, rebating their October city sales tax.

Bullock said his office has rebated a total of \$223.7 million to cities collecting the sales tax so far in calendar 1975. During all of calendar 1974, he said, a total of \$233.7 million was rebated.

With a normal November and December, Bullock predicted city budgets will enjoy \$25 million to \$30 million more revenue from the sales tax this year over 1974.

The Comptroller said 154 of the total 824 cities collecting the sales tax will not receive their rebate until the end of the December quarter. because they fell below the \$500 cutoff for monthly rebates.

The City of Bovina received a check for \$2,605.02 while the City of Friona received a check for \$6,259.03.

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

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
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
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Horns Bomb Mustangs In Final Game Of Year

The Longhorns weren't through, make the score 37-6, Hart, with 1:46


