Parmer Co. Crimestoppers Sets Logo Contest For Students

Logos, ID cards and cookbooks were among the major topics at the February meeting of Parmer County Crimestoppers.

The meeting was held at the County Court room in Farwell, attended by board members Joe and Sonia Majia, Jack and Ona Patterson, Frances Kube, Chad Stevick, Murlene Smith, and guest Rose Hatch.

One discussion topic centered on the upcoming contest for an identifying Parmer County Crimestoppers logo.

The contest is open to all Parmer County high school students. Contest dates are March 1 through March 19. The student with the winning entry will win \$100 cash.

Work must be original, on 8 1/2" X 11" paper, with the name of the school and the student's name on the back. Entries should be submitted prior to March 19 to the high school principal's office.

According to Sheriff Walt Yerger, the ultimate goal is to obtain a logo that will be permanently used on all Crimestoppers stationery, business cards, posters, etc. All high school students are urged to participate in this logo search.

WTRT Now Accepting Scholarship Applications

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is now accepting applications for scholarships that will be awarded in May, 1999.

Scholarships are open only to students whose parents or guardians are WTRT members or to students who are WTRT members themselves. Applicants must also be either high school seniors who are candidates for graduation this spring, have completed high school, or have received their GED.

The 1999 scholarships are open only to eligible, qualified applicants from the Hereford, Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Dimmitt, Adrian, and Vega school districts. Scholarship monies will be disbursed in increments per semester.

An official application form, accompanied by two letters of recommendation, must be submitted. One of the letters of recommendation must be from a teacher, principal, or counselor from the high school that the applicant is currently attending or attended.

Applications and rules may be picked up at the high school counselor's office at the high schools.

To be considered, applications must be fully completed, have no attachments other than the two required letters of

Another project, ID cards for all Parmer County children age 14 and under, was a major agenda item and plans to accomplish this will be announced in the near future.

At the end of each semester, recipients are requested to send a report of their grades to WTRT in Hereford.

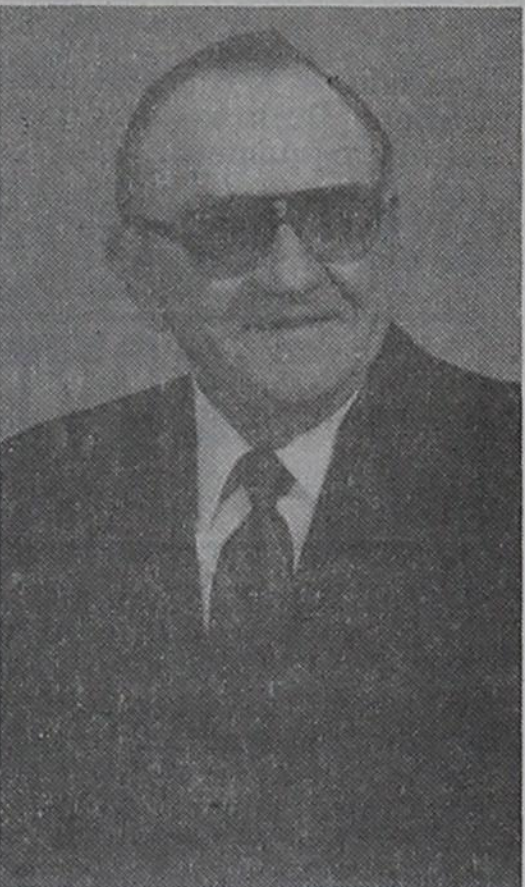

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County Has Most Sprinkler Systems

Local Farmers Invest \$60 Million For Water

Approximately 1,719 center pivot sprinkler systems are currently in operation within Parmer County, according to a recent High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 inventory.

This represents an additional 155 center pivot sprinkler systems installed in the county since the 1995 inventory.

Parmer County leads the HPUW District with its total number of center pivots. Lamb County is second with 1709 systems; Hale County third with 1,298; Castro fourth, 1,261 and Hockley County, 884.

Also, Bailey County, 877; Deaf Smith, 781; Lubbock, 778; Cochran, 590; Crosby, 509; Lynn, 493; Floyd, 303; Randall, 80; Potter, three and Armstrong, two.

Hale County led the district in largest increase since the 1995 "census" with 308 pivots added. Other increases included Castro, 258; Lamb, 250; Lubbock, 239; Lynn, 185; Crosby, 173; Deaf Smith, 157; Parmer 155; Hockley, 153; Cochran, 97; Floyd, 93; Bailey 83 and Randall 19.

Given an average cost of \$35,000 per center pivot sprinkler, the 1,719 pivots in operation within Parmer County represent a \$60,165,000 investment in water conservation by local agricultural producers.

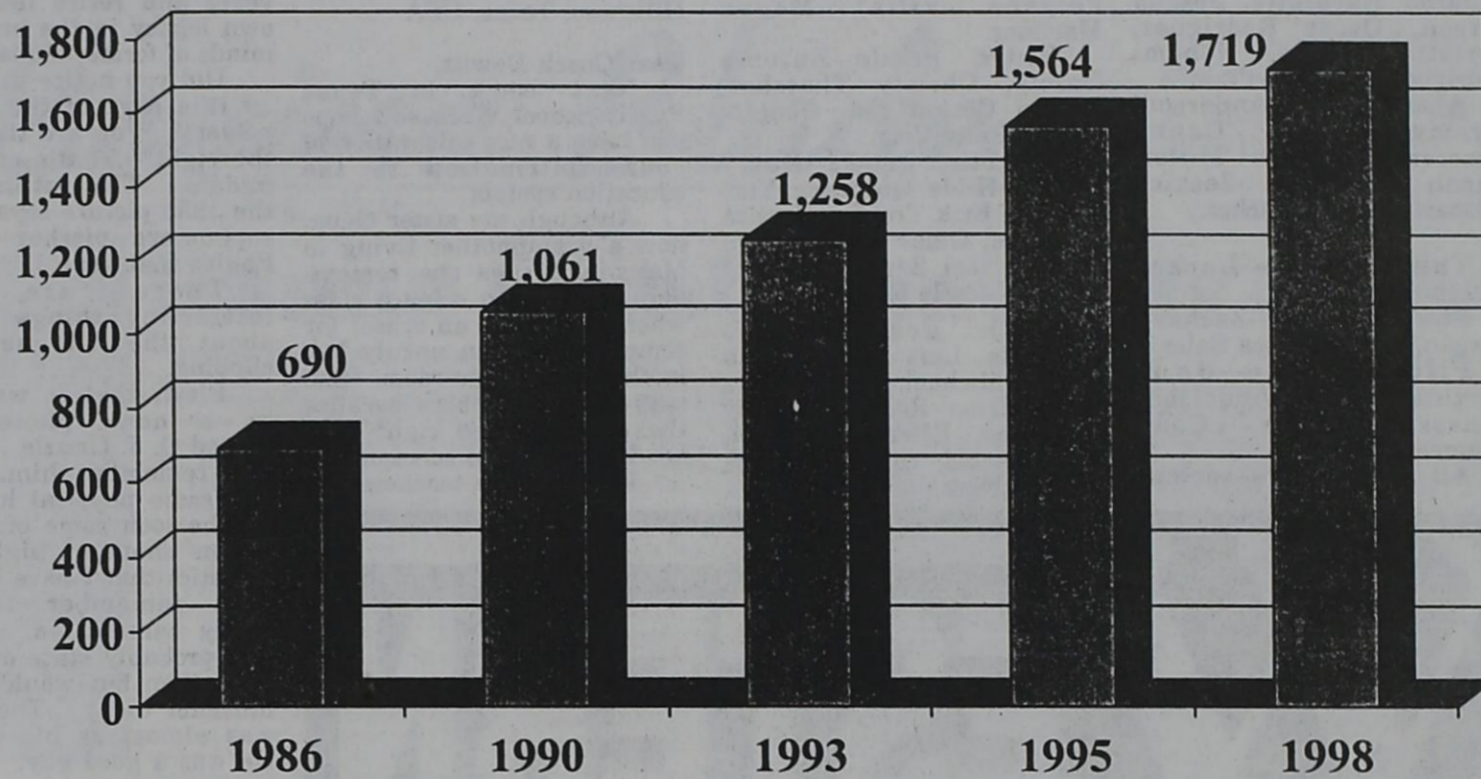
"This inventory shows that farmers are making huge investments to be more efficient in applying ground water for irrigation," said Ken Carver, High Plains Water District Assistant Manager. "The center pivot sprinkler systems provide more flexibility in irrigating and help maintain crop yields with less water."

Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler systems can achieve irrigation application efficiencies of up to 98 percent. Since the ground water is applied at low pressure directly into the furrow, water losses associated with evaporation and wind drift are almost eliminated.

LEPA systems also help reduce labor and fuel costs and save 20 to 40 percent of the water pumped for irrigation as compared to conventional furrow irrigation.

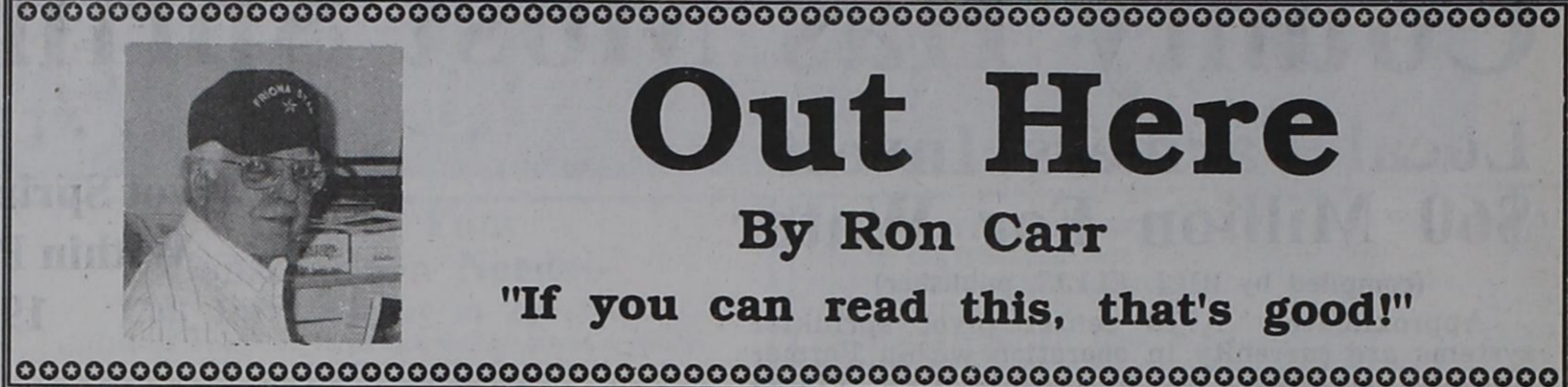

Dear Coach Dewitt, Next week is Texas Public School Week so I hope you have a nice celebration of your contribution to the education system.

Although my sister Gena, now a grandmother living in Mansfield, says she remembers the day in science class when you threw an eraser (or something) at an unruly boy in the back of the room. She says she remembers because the eraser sailed right over her head and she screamed. Well, I guess teachers and

coaches that serve for many years and retire leave their own legacy in the hearts and minds of former students.

Did you notice the picture on this page of the baseball players? You are the one on the right. That's me in the middle. The cutline under the 1955 picture says I was a sophomore pitcher for the Eagles that year.

There are some interesting things to note about the old newspaper clipping.

First, that it was taken by a news photographer named O. J. Grizzle. I'm sure you remember him. O. J. had some physical handicaps but he took some of the best action shots of high school athletics that I have seen.

And now we know. The "big" question has been answered. No longer must we live in ignorance concerning the amount of sway there is to the Empire State Building in New York City.

The pamphlet that O'Leta had Publicity Consultants Incorporated send The Blade says, "Most asked is the question: 'Does the Empire State Building really sway? Actually it doesn't! Thorough scientific tests have shown, however, that the building will lean in the direction an unusually heavy wind is blowing. For instance, the Empire State Building structural engineers advise that the movement at the top of the TV mast is approximately two inches under a wind of 100 miles per hour."

The pamphlet contains many, many other facts and figures about the building.

The Grolier Information Service in New York City, to which Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Cumpton belong, sent several type written pages on the building. Included in the pages was this paragraph: "If the Empire State Building 'swayed' as is popularly thought to be the case, it would long since have broken in half. Scientists have estimated that the maximum deviation of the tip of the building from the vertical would be a radius of 1.45 inches if a 100 mile per hour gale buffeted the tower for two hours or longer."

Hanna Crash Lands; Is Jailed

Leonard L. Hanna, a 25-year-old former resident of Bovina who is wanted in some six Texas counties on bad or "cold" check charges, crash landed a Cessna 190 airplane at Bengier Air Park in Friona Saturday afternoon.

The landing knocked Hanna unconscious but he was not injured seriously. He was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona following the crash and was placed in the Parmer County jail in Farwell by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace after he was released from the hospital.

Prior to the landing, Hanna radioed to an Amarillo air field, advised the radio operator of mechanical difficulties, and asked the radio operator to telephone the Friona field and ask the people there to prepare for a crash landing. These precautions were made by the Friona field officials.

E. T. Jennings, owner of Bengier Air Park, said that an examination of the plane after the crash did not show that there was anything wrong with it. He said, however, there was a possibility that something could have been wrong with the plane when it was in flight. Jennings also said the Amarillo field radio operator did not tell him who was in the plane. Stories contrary to these statements have been in circulation.

Hanna had been working at Jennings' air field in the past. Warrants for Hanna's arrest were out from Dallas, Muleshoe, Pampa, Plainview, Lamb County, and Parmer County, Lovelace said. An estimated total of \$14,000 worth of bad and forged checks are against Hanna in

these places. The amount of Hanna's bond will be set by Justice of the Peace B. N. Graham of Farwell sometime soon. Then if an individual signs the bond for Hanna, he will face similar circumstances in the other five places.

Grand juries have already indicted him at Dallas and Plainview and officials from these places have been looking for him for about three weeks.

He will appear before the Parmer County grand jury February 1 and before a grand jury in Muleshoe January 25.

Acquaintances of Hanna say that he is a "likeable" sort of individual. He was raised in Parmer County and is a graduate of Farwell High School.

It is not known when he will be able to return to school.

Bovina Kids Can Have Pictures Made

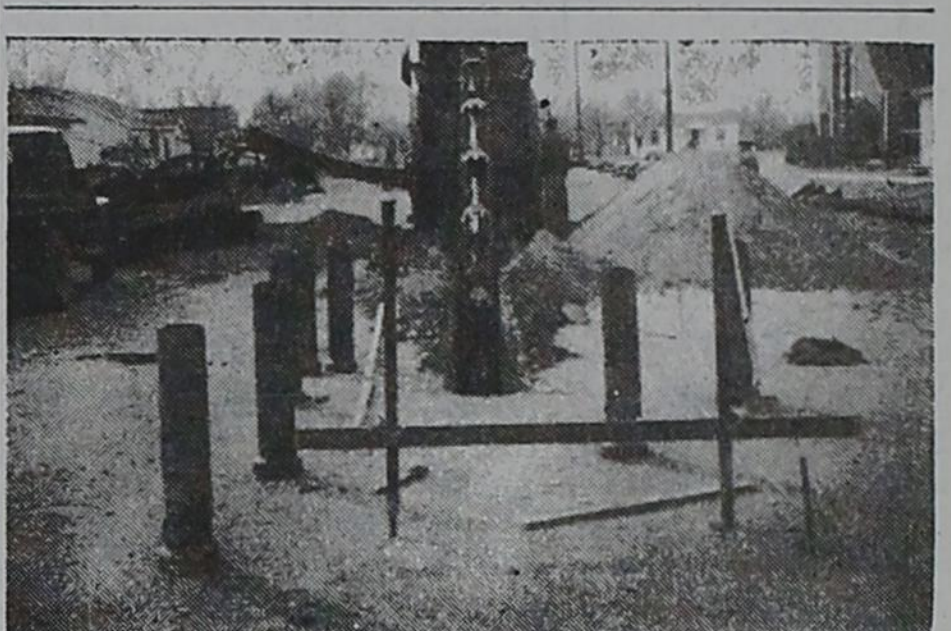
