CONGRATULATIONS TO President Reagan on getting his economic package through Congress. The president called upon all of his "moxy" and used a little arm-twisting where it counted, to get his program passed.

Area Gets Good Rain

The Bovina area received excellent rain early this week, with anywhere from 1.5 inches to four inches reported in the area.

Sunday evening, the area to the west of town received the most moisture. Tom Ware and Tommy Williams each reported 3.5 inches from that rain.

To the south and southeast, the measurement was lighter. In Bovina proper, the Sunday night rain was from 1.5 to 2.0 inches.

Keith Garner said he received two inches of rain in two nights.

The Rhea area had reportedly received up to four inches of rain.

Although part of the rain may have fallen too fast, the moisture was more than welcome, especially with farmers trying to stay up with their irrigation program on row crops.

Rabies Case Found Here In Pet Badger

One confirmed case of rabies in a badger in Bovina has been announced by the Texas Department of Health recently.

The badger was in the care of a local veterinarian when he died, and its carcass was sent to Austin for examination. It was then that the state found the animal to be rabid.

A family of four will undergo the series of rabies shots, which will be taken intramuscularly, instead of through the stomach.

According to John Detten, Chief of Police and animal control coordinator, the family said the animal was not feeling well, and this prompted them to take it to the vet for an examination. Then, the animal died.

The family resides in the city and any animals which might have come in contact with the badger must be confined and observed for at least six months.

According to Detten, the city will be cracking down on straying animals, especially stray cats. He said that any stray cats found by the Animal Control Dept. will be picked up and destroyed.

All warm-blooded animals can contract rabies, and it is the assumption that the badger inherited the disease from his mother. The family had raised the animal from a baby, and there had never been any indication before that it had the disease.

Police officials have said they will be making periodical checks on owners of animals and may, at any time, ask to see the rabies tag or receipt of vaccination for any animals in the city. The den from which this badger came is in this area, and there were probably more affected animals.

There is a City Ordinance which states that any animal kept within the city must be in a fence, on a chain or leash, or somehow confined to the owner's yard.

And, according to Detten, any animal found not in a yard, or on a leash or chain, without a tag, will be picked up, no questions asked, and destroyed if not reclaimed by the owner within 72 hours. Any animal suspected of being sick will be destroyed immediately.

If any resident sees a suspicious looking animal or a stray animal which they have not seen before, they

need to contact Detten, day or night, at the City Police Department. Do not attempt to handle the animal yourself. It only takes a bite hard enough to break the skin for a human or animal to contract rabies.

Any animals which are picked up on a bite case will be held for ten days observation, and then destroyed.

Rabies, if untreated is always fatal to both animals and humans.

All area animals which have not been vaccinated should be vaccinated, and this includes livestock. A bite on a cow, horse, sheep, etc., from a rabid animal is just as fatal as it is for a dog or cat to be bitten.

Detten said that any straying

animal which cannot be caught will be destroyed.

This presents a very real, and dangerous problem to area pets and livestock alike and should be taken very seriously, the animal control specialist said.

All necessary safety precautions are being taken to safeguard the lives of all city residents. But, in order to make sure there is no problem presented by stray animals, the animal control officers will destroy any animal not wearing a collar and they will pick up any animal which is not confined in the owner's yard.

The number to call to report a stray or unfamiliar animal is 238-1133.

Wheat Harvest Nears Conclusion

Wheat harvest has been continuing in the Bovina area, and some farmers have had almost unbelievable results with the harvest of their irrigated wheat.

On the Pat Ware place, located seven miles west of the city, Pat made a record wheat crop this year. On a 30-acre block, he harvested 106 bushels per acre. Normally this land would yield 65-70 bushels per acre.

Ware also has about 280 acres of corn planted and it is also looking good at the present time.

This farm was one of the few that received no hail in the last storm.

The wheat was brought in last week to Bovina after the farmer finished his harvest.

According to Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain, most of the wheat that has been brought in has been above average in yield for this time of the year. Most of the irrigated wheat, with the exception of Ware's, has been yielding around 70 bushels per acre.

There have been other yields which amounted to over 100 bushels per acre on wheat.

Johnson said that there is still some barley left, and the yield on the barley has been around 70 bushels per acre.

According to the sources at the

elevator, the bulk of the harvest has passed and their peak day for the harvest season was last Monday.

Johnson also indicated that the corn average has seen a slight decrease this year. About 15 per cent less corn, according to estimates, is being raised.

Johnson said that most people are watering their corn a fourth and fifth time already, and the reason for the decrease in corn is so that the farmers can afford to water the crops they have.

There seems to be more milo being planted in the area this year. This is probably due to the fact that it takes less water to grow grain sorghum than it does for wheat, corn, or barley.

The four months of really dry weather hurt the dryland wheat considerably, and it did not help the condition of the barley. That is the main reason the barley crop was so small in yieldage.

And, of course the hail which so many of the area farmers received did not help matters much.

But, as Harry Johnson so aptly put it: "What we all really need is two inches of rain."

Well, some of us got one of those inches this past Sunday evening.

Burial was in the Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home in Olton.

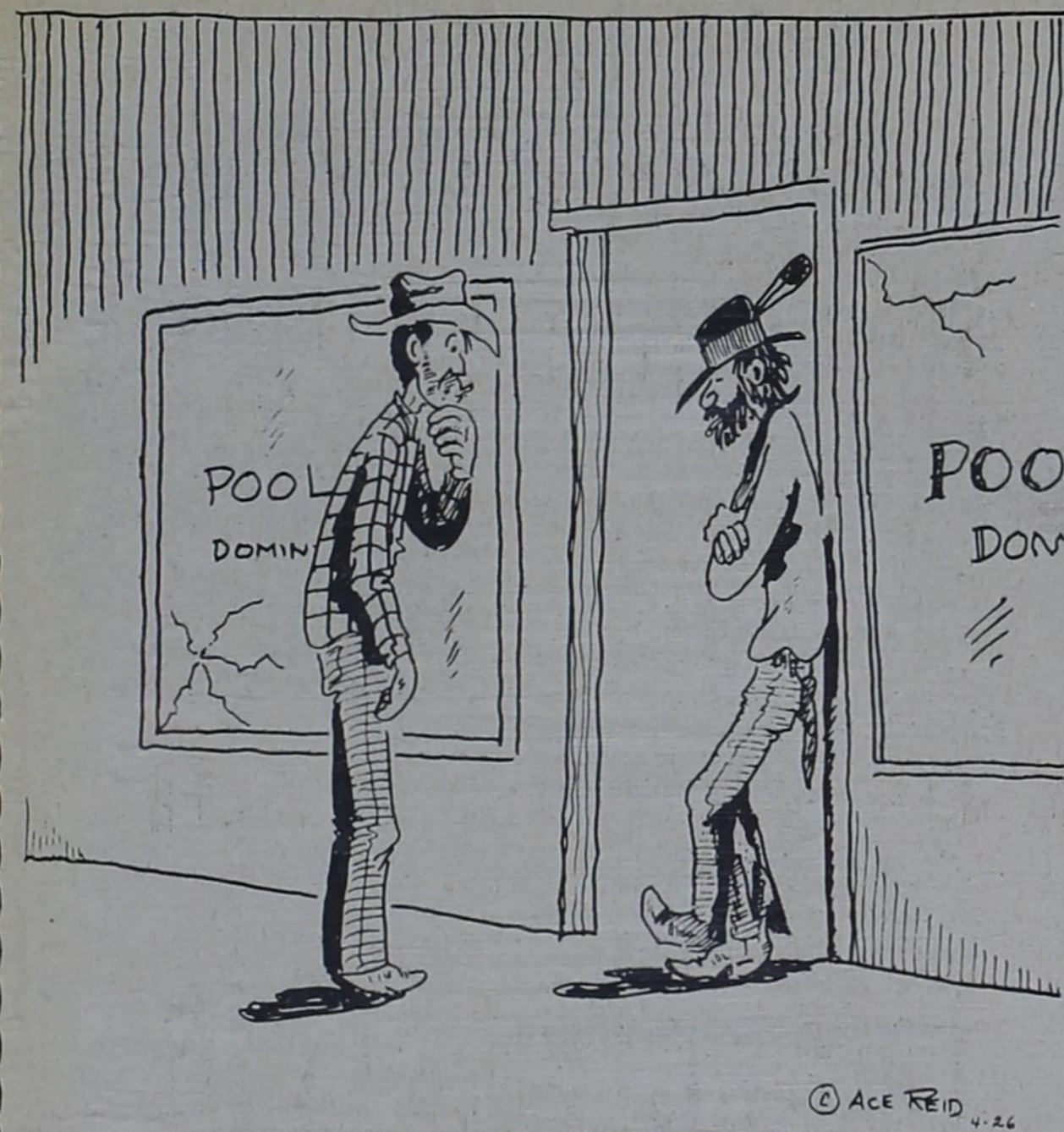

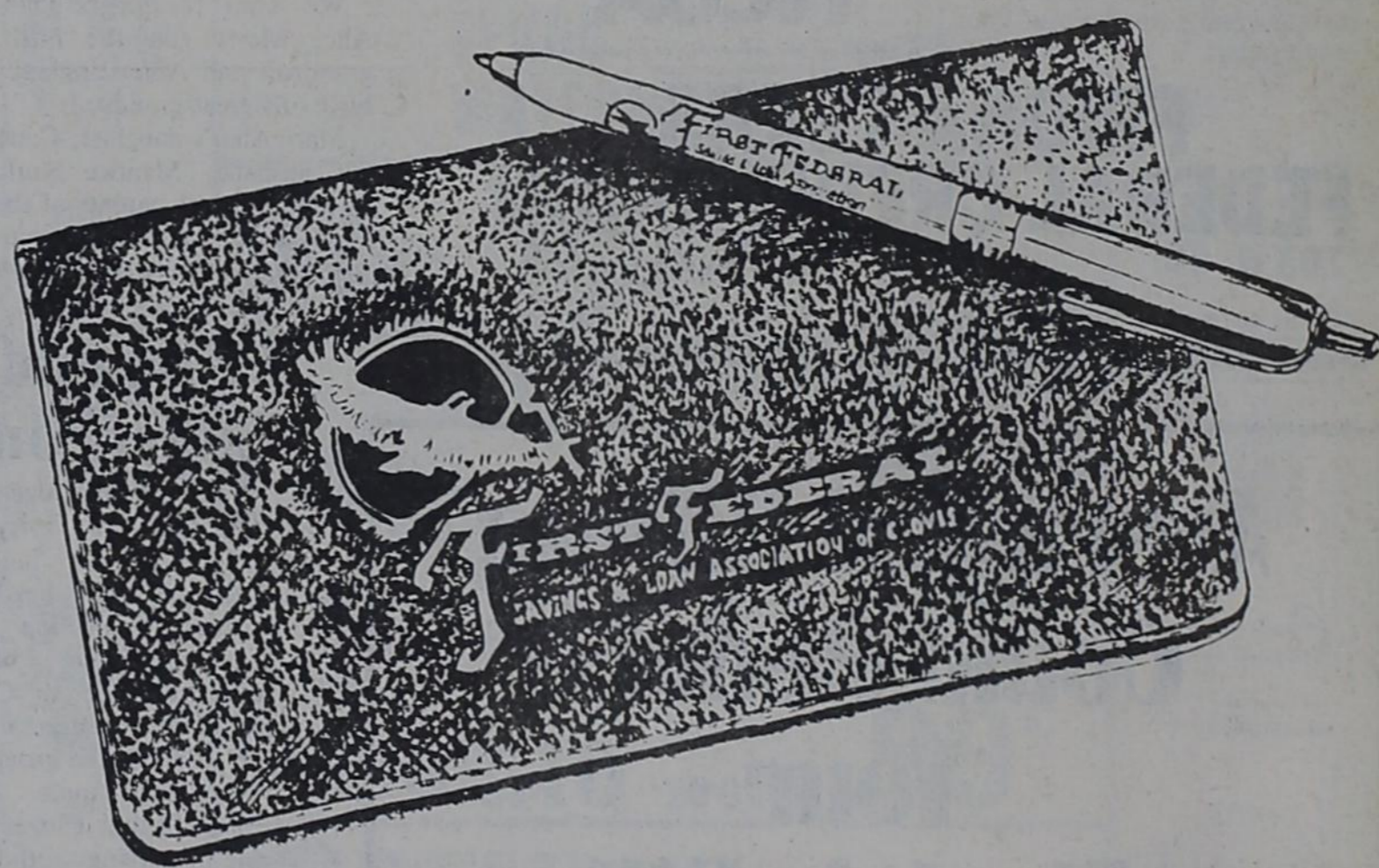
Robby Dyer, Keri Mitchell, and Christopher Wilson all received pins for six month's perfect attendance at church school. Keri actually has

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Bovinians Work With Handicapped Adults

Bob and Sarah Owen are not only two important persons in the Bovina area, they are also two very special people to the mentally handicapped adults who are campers at Camp New Dawn located at Ceta Canyon, outside of Happy.

Bob and Sarah have been a counselor and nurse for the past few years and they spend one week each summer devoting their time and talents to these very deserving adults.

Camp New Dawn has been in existence the past ten years and is located on the Methodist Encampment in Ceta Canyon. While it is on the Methodist grounds, it is really an interdenominational camp, with persons from every faith welcome.

The camp has retarded adults from ages 18-68 and these persons only have to pay a \$5.00 fee to get in. The rest of the fees are most usually taken care of by sponsoring organizations or churches who will pay the remaining amount which comes out to \$38.00.

There are 19 counselors at the

camp, and five auxiliary workers and there are also those persons who do the kitchen work, lifeguards, etc.

Most of the campers come from the Panhandle and usually no farther south than Lubbock.

Bob and Sarah Owen became involved when Kathryn Goddard of Friona called them and invited them to share in the experience. Mrs. Goddard is the director of the camp.

Bob worked at the camp one year before Sarah started, and then, three years ago, she became involved too.

Sarah had worked with retarded children before this and she indicated that working with retarded adults is different, but working with retarded was a challenge.

"My views about working with the adults changed over the course of one week, and I began to realize that these people did not feel that they had been short-changed at all. Most of them are very happy, loving people," Sarah added.

Many of the campers hold down regular jobs and those that don't most usually work in sheltered

workshops, places where they may work doing simple, piece work and receive a salary for their efforts.

The camp provides for their care and feeding, and it also provides for them to share a different side of their lives with the staff.

They have fun and share a very loving experience with each other; and they are able to express themselves in their own way, without being reprimanded or inhibited.

It also provided time for the parents to have time to themselves. Camp New Dawn runs from Monday noon to Friday noon early in June.

"Sometimes it is frightening, and we have to watch their medication closely. It is much tougher on the counselors, because they are with the campers all the time. Some of the campers really need a lot of help, but once you get there, there is so much you need to get done, you don't really think about anything else."

Maybe it is the fact that Bob and Sarah don't concern themselves with anything else except the care and well-being of the handicapped adults at

Camp New Dawn that makes their work here so special. It must hold true that, if they can find the time to devote their efforts to the welfare of the retarded, then they must be very "special" with the normal people with which they deal.

Law Enforcement, Emergency Reports

Citizens of Bovina still need to be aware of the fact that the Animal Control workers will be persistently working to rid the city of stray animals, and, as John Detten put it, "If you want your animals, then you should keep them where we can't get them."

All strays will be picked up and any which are not claimed within 72 hours of being picked up will be destroyed.

Also, Detten wanted to remind all citizens of Bovina that fireworks are illegal if used in town, and are dangerous if used in the area fields. Due to the dry conditions, shooting fireworks in area fields is very dangerous, and a family could really be hurt if a crop was burned up due to fireworks.

Another word of advice from the Police Department...if you have young children who will be playing with fireworks, be very watchful of them. It only takes one accident to

lose an eye. Animal Control workers will really be hitting the streets this week so keep your dogs and cats rounded up.

We received the following information from DPS officers Art Lopez and Steve Talkington of Friona:

Arrested for criminal apprehension was David Philip Perry, who was wanted in Florida and Louisiana for kidnapping. He was arrested after a high speed chase by DPS officers, who clocked his vehicle at 106 miles per hour, and it took the officers six and one-half miles to catch the car. 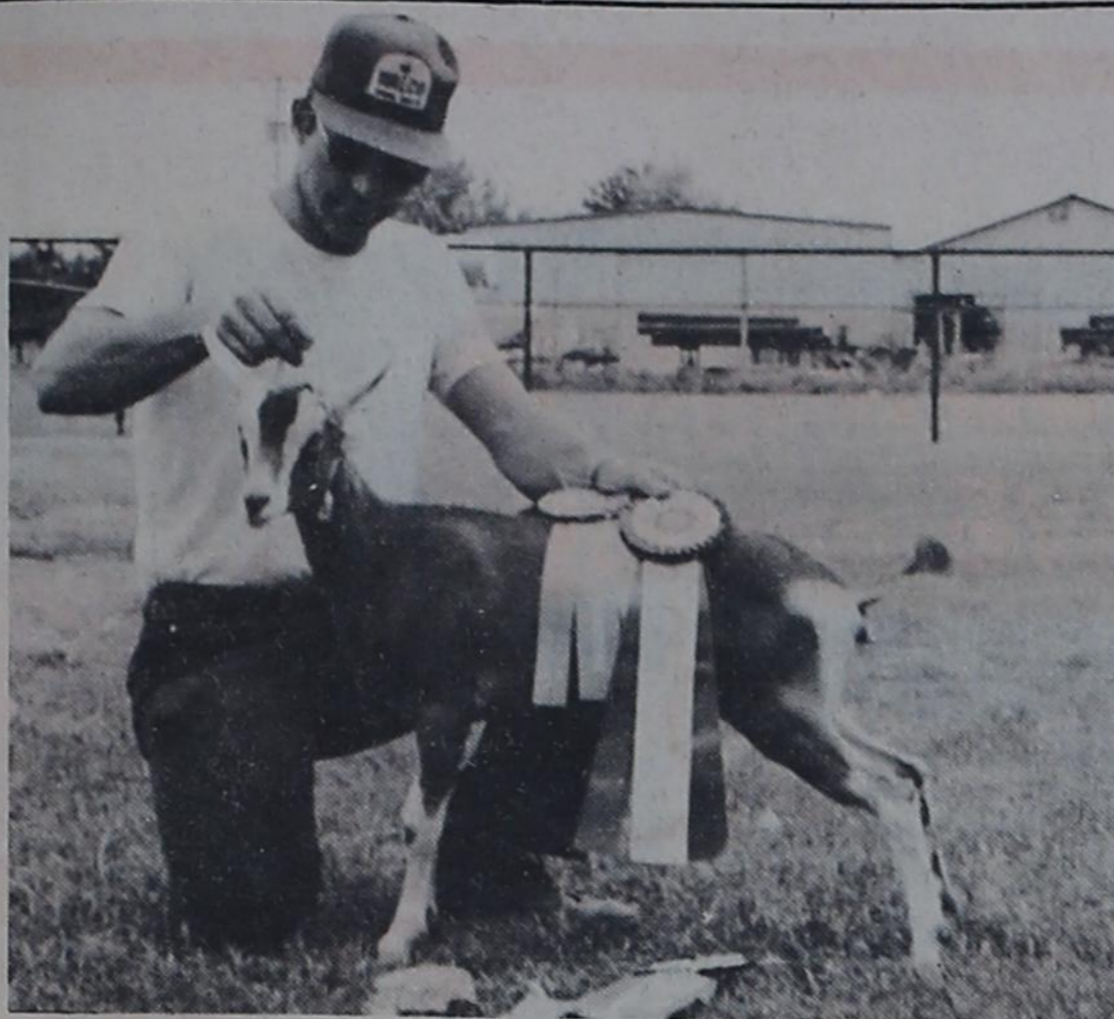
Sr. Citizens Set Meeting

Gals Win Golf Meet

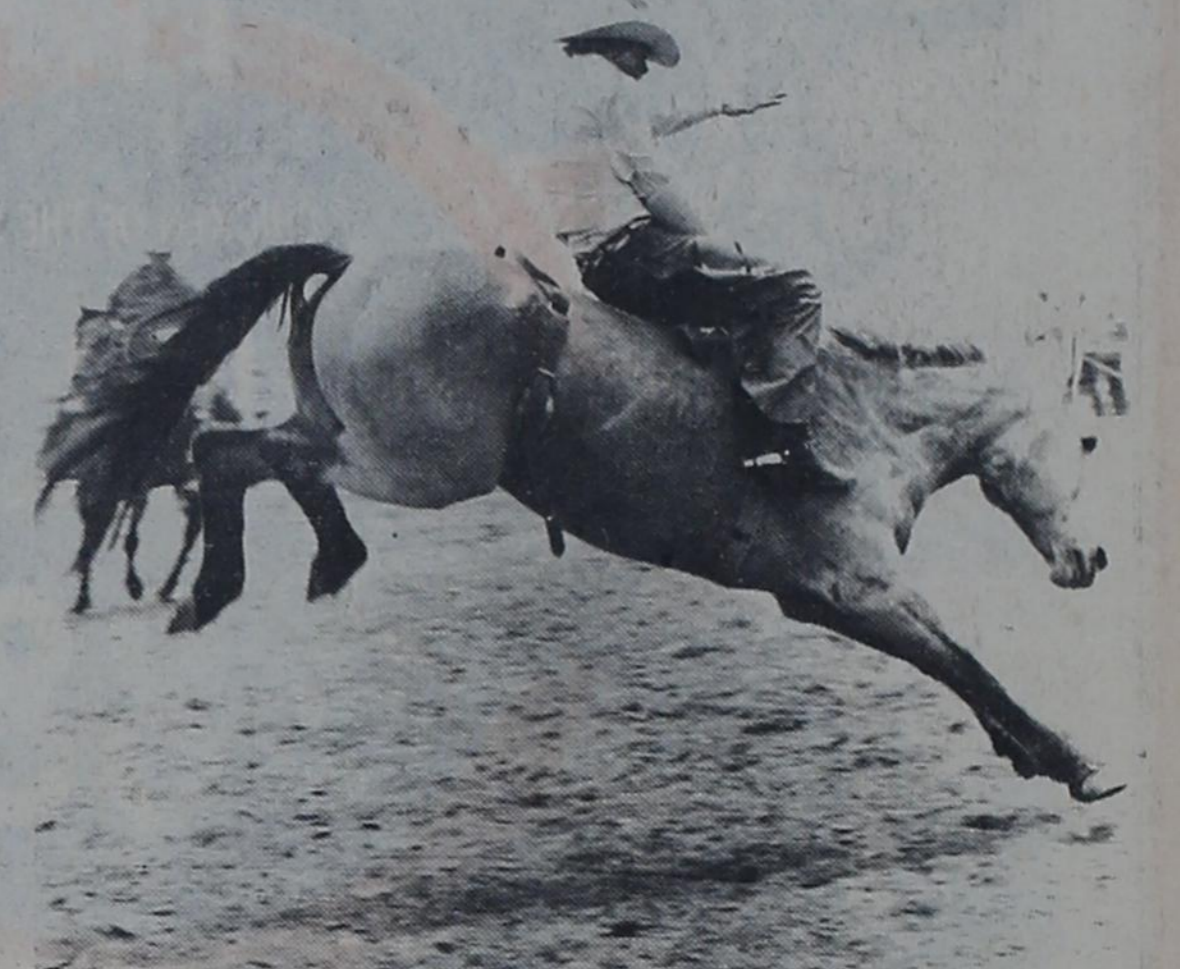

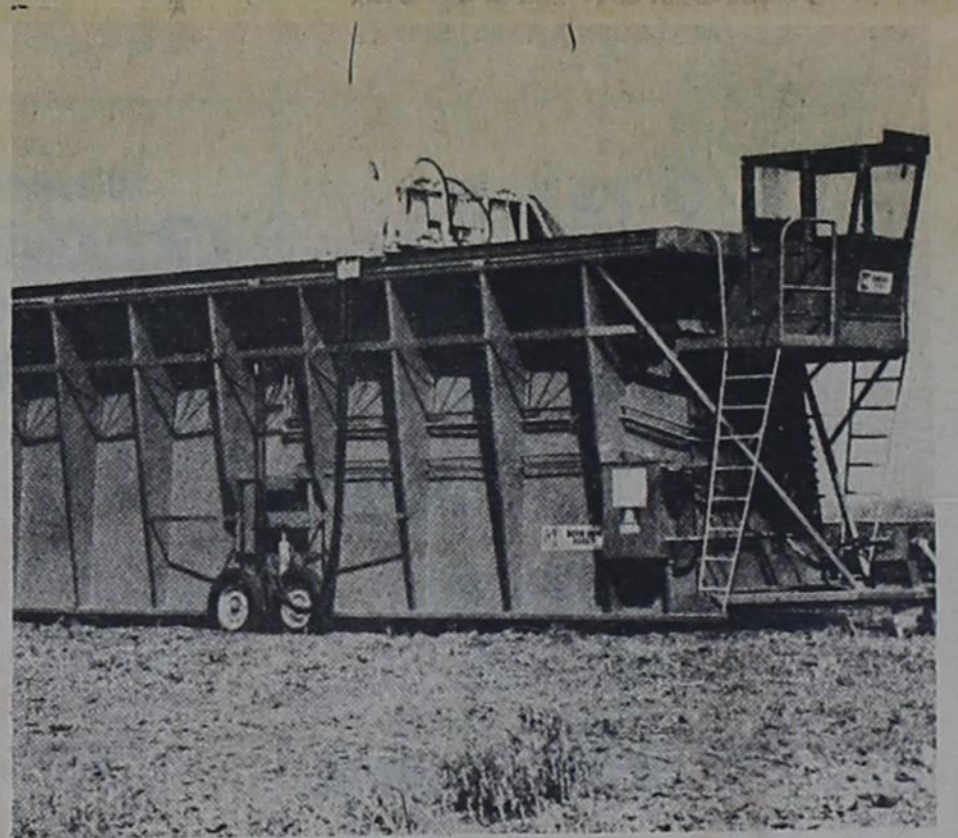
