The upshot of the situation is that not only those on made-work who are paid by the government but those who are on legitimate payrolls of industry are becoming thoroughly dissatisfied. They are demanding more money. I do not believe anyone can forecast what will happen. One thing is certain; if industry must increase wages. consumers will have to pay the price. There will be further in creases in the things we all buy in event higher wages are obtained from commerce and industry. And, if the government raises wages to those on made-work, the drain on the treasury will be correspondingly faster. The taxpayer has to pay this.

Few of us ever stop to think what a job it is to maintain the supply of money It's Some in circulation. Omitting any con-Big Job

sideration of the paper currency which keeps the gigantic bureau of printing and engraving operating 24 hours each day and considering only the coins that lingle, it requires the operation of two or three great plants to mint our money.

The bureau of the mint in the treasury gave out some figures the other day that seem to me to be most interesting. They are interesting because of their size. On the basis of these figures, it is calculated that there are actually in the pockets of the American people the following number of coins, each fig ure being an approximation: 1,000. 000,000 dimes, 1,400,000,000 nickels 5,500,000,000 pennies, 400,000,000 quarters, 200,000,000 half dollars and approximately 33,000,000 silver dollars.

These figures furnish an inter esting commentary as well on our present modes c living. They sup ply a sidelight on our system of taxation which calls for pennies, nick els and dimes here, there and every where as a result of sales taxes. Be sides, transportation systems like the street cars call for an exceptionally large quantity of the minor coins like nickels and dimes. One could enumerate a score of factors n modern life that compel each of us to carry and use these smal

The mint bureau is authority alsfor the information that even this stupendous sum of minor coins seems insufficient. The mints, ac cordingly, have been speeded up and they are now working at a rate almost double that of 1934.

### MOTHER'S COOK BO

DISHES THAT ARE DIFFERENT

A CREAM puff pastry is very simple to make, but the baking is the test of its perfection.

Bagdad Cream Puffs.

Heat together one cupful of boiling water and one-third cupful of corn oil. When boiling add altogether three-fourths of a cupful of flour mixed with one and one-half tablespoonfuls of cornstarch and one-half teaspoonful of salt, all well sifted together. Stir and mix vigorously until the mixture leaves the sides of the pan. Cool and add one at a time three eggs, beating well after the addition of each; now add one teaspoonful of baking powder and beat well and drop by spoonfuls on a baking sheet, shaping into circular form. Bake from 35 to 45 minutes, depending upon the size of the puff. Cool, cut with a sharp knife near the bottom of the puff remove any doughy center and fill with the following:

### Dairy Outlook Is THE CHURCHES Brighter For 1936

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no marked change in the number of milk cows is in prospect for the next two years. By January 1, 1936, the number will probably be decreased by about 600,000 head below the number on hand January 1, 1935. The decreases in number 1934 and 1935 bring the number of cows per capita down to about the average for the last ten years. Total milk production in 1935 will probably be slightly higher than the low production in 1934, and with average weather and feed production during the coming year, milk production in 1936 may be expected to be about four to five percent greater than in 1935. Stocks of dairy products are larger than a year ago, and with prospects for higher production during the late winter than a year previous, total supplies of dairy products during the winter of 1935-36 will be larger than in the winter of 1934-35.

Farm prices of butterfat are higher in relation to feed grains than a year ago and during 1936 will probably average considerably higher in relation to feeds than in 1935. Foreign prices of butter are now decidedly higher than in 1934, and imports of butter during 1936 will probably be very small. Receipts of milk and cream in-

dicate that the decline in city consumption of fresh milk and cream is probably past, and with further improvement in business and in consumer incomes, city consumption will probably show an increase over the low level reached during the depression. With further business improvement, butter prices will probably rise in relation to other commodities.

Loans and redits for the Italian government, public bodies, corporations and individuals are forbidden.

Should this momentous action acceed, it would seem that the end of Benito Mussolini and the Fascist gime in Italy is in sight. Should fail, the League of Nations fails, the British communications in the Mediterranean would be threatened, and the peace of the world would be menaced.

Standing steadfast against the nctions, Premier Mussolini proclaimed the day on which they were established "a day of ignominy and iniquity," as had been declared by the Fascist grand council. The day was made a holiday, flags flew from all buildings and there were numerous angry demonstrations against member nations of the league. were closed to goods of those nans except for certain necessities. Restrictions of food, fuel and light ere put in force.

It was announced in Rome that 00,000 of the recently mobilized diers would be given a furlough three months to ald industrial and agricultural production.

There were new negotiations for eace, fostered by the British and for re-election to the senate. A NOTHER prominent figure of the World war passed with the Improved death of Earl Jellicoe, who commanded the united British fleet in the great battle of Jutland and was severely criticized because he did not succeed in completely defeating the German fleet. Jellicoe, who entered the navy as a cadet at thirteen years of age, had a colorful career on British ships and in administrative positions throughout the world until at the end of four years as governor general of New Zealand in 1924 he practically retired from official public life.

A MERICAN business generally is pleased with the terms of the new trade treaty with Canada, made public simultaneously in Washington and Ottawa. Farmers and the lumber men of the northwest will not like it. High tariff advocates in congress are sure to attack the pact, but its terms cannot be affected for three years, even were congress to repeal the reciprocal trade act under which President Roosevelt acted in negotiating the agreement. It is considered a trade agreement rather than formal treaty, and goes into effect Janu-
