Maybe Peace. After All Building in a Big Way A Level-Headed King One Strike Method

The real war news from Europe sounds like peace news—is that England has refused France's request for immediate assistance in forcing Germany's armies from the Rhineland.

France appeals to all members of the League of Nations "in a fight for peace."

The United States is doing and spending in a big way. The Public Works Administration says more than \$1,000,000,000 worth of projects have been completed.

A level-headed young man is the new English king. After seeing the new giant Cunarder named for his mother, walking seven miles up and down it, he visited the slums of Glasgow, called the worst and "leftiest" in England.

There are different ways of handling strikes, depending on public officials. At Akron, Ohio, a strike of milk drivers disturbs consuming families and producing farmers.

How many millions would be killed, gassed, bombed, ripped to pieces by shrapnel and machine-gun fire before Hitler or the nation back of him could be persuaded that he is not a reincarnation of Frederick the Great, or Napoleon?

The Department of Commerce cannot explain the Arkansas air crash, on January 14, that killed 27. It says some passenger "may have incapacitated the pilot or interfered with controls."

Japan is the question mark in the war situation, and Japan would deliberately antagonize all her neighbors and friends in western Europe by striking at Russia, in a way interesting to all of them.

Akeley, who used to help his husband hunt lions and gorillas in Africa, has been in Africa on his own account and reports that in Southeast Africa natives are turning to their old ways and methods which will change them.

Washington Digest National Topics Interpreted by William Bruckart

Washington. — President Roosevelt has very neatly called the bluff of his critics that he is wasting billions from the treasury and doing nothing to replace it.

It was the greatest tax bill ever submitted in peace time. Whether the proposals the President has made are economically sound or whether the levies he thinks advisable will do the job he expects of them, of course, remains to be seen.

It is a most interesting situation, politically. In nearly a score of years of Washington reportorial experience, I cannot recall having seen so much squirming and wriggling as well as fretting and mumbling among representatives and senators.

Whatever the merits of the Roosevelt proposals may be, there is no course open for his opponents except to support him in the general move to pay as you go.

Force Hands of Opponents of Opponents. Unless they support these new tax levies, all of the howling and shouting and tumult about a reduction in the treasury deficit becomes just so much belly-wash.

Opponents may differ with the President as to the details of his tax plan but the situation he has created for them compels that they stand with him.

Frank Kent, the able news commentator, summarized one phase of this situation the other day by saying: "It makes no difference that the situation which compels the imposition of new and heavy taxes is largely Mr. Roosevelt's fault."

In other words, there nearly is no alternative for opponents of the President's policies. They must show their sincerity by going through with him in the laying of new taxes.

On the other hand, it seems to be the consensus among Washington observers that Mr. Roosevelt ought not to be allowed to get away with one declaration which he made in submitting his tax proposals to congress.

Taxpayers the Goat

So it simmers down that the men a year ago and two years ago voted the President almost limitless funds to deal with an emergency are now compelled, if they intend ever to be statesmen, to stick by, vote the taxes and take it on the chin if that is to be the reaction from the voters.

The "windfall" tax is designed to offset the action of the Supreme court which ordered the return of the processing taxes as having been illegally collected.

The tax on undistributed profits of corporations is the center of all kinds of controversy already.

MY EXPERIENCE WITH DIXIE ROSE COTTON

In spring of 1935 I purchased some Dixie Rose cotton seed from Mr. W. S. Galloway of Vernon, Texas. Mr. Galloway and his son are breeders of Dixie Rose cotton. Mr. Galloway guaranteed that this cotton seed would produce twice as much cotton per acre as any other cotton by which I would plant it and give it the same attention. I planted it on my farm along side acala seed which was from certified seed the year previous. The Dixie Rose cotton produced from two to five times as much per acre as the acala. He also told me that it would gin out, staple and grade and pick with the acala which I was accustomed to raise. I found that he was correct in every respect. I sent samples of the Dixie Rose bales and the acala bales to the Department of Agriculture for grading and stapling so I am not guessing about this phase of it. I did not pick any of it myself but my pickers said it picked as easy if not easier than the acala. It matured much quicker than the acala. I produced about three bales per acre on my best acre last year. I am confident that there will be a number of four bale per acre yields from this cotton here in the Pecos Valley. It has yielded that much and more other places. It sounds almost too good to be true. I am not surprised that a great many erratic stories are circulated about this cotton. I am so well pleased with it that I am planting all my acreage to it this year. You may desire to plant at least a few acres of it. I have on hand a very limited supply of well matured, carefully picked and ginned seed, put up in 100 lbs. bags, which I am offering for sale.



