

TEXAS FARMERS

ARE EXPERIMENTING WITH TUNG OIL

BEAUMONT. Texas - Farmers in southeast Texas and southwest Louisiana are experimenting with tung oil groves in quest of a new money crop with a potential \$50 an acre annual return.

Some 200 experiments are in progress in the two states and sponsors estimate that 500,000 trees will be growing in the territory within a year. A mill for crushing the oil out of the tung tree nuts has been promised "within two or three years" if the trees prove profitable.

Tung oil, known as the most powerful drying oil produced, is used chiefly as a water proofing agent in paints and varnishes and kindred products.

Tung nuts are grown profitably in some sections of Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, but the bulk of tung oil comes from the Orient.



Business also is indulging in this era of good feeling. Business always puts its best foot forward, just as lovers do. It wants to develop a spirit of good will on the part of the public and it wants to show its financial backers how things are coming along all hunky-dory. There is nothing wrong in the attitude. It is perfectly logical and human-and it is very interesting to see this wave of healthy feeling grow.

The important, as well as the interesting, thing about this era of good feeling is that to the expert students it shows a gradual, if not conclusive, decline in depression conditions. It proves that things are on the up grade-not that they are at the top yet, but that a momentum is being established which may carry the economic recovery to the top if the federal government settles down and treats business with fairness.

As I said above, New Deal press agents are promoting this business recovery for all that it is worth. Naturally, they are attributing it to the re-election of Mr. Roosevelt as tto basic factor in this upward surge of business. They are capitalizing it to the fullest because by so capitalizing it, the political party in power gets its due share of credit. 



So, business is seeking to counterbalance the politicians and the politicians, speaking through New Deal press statements, are trying to fortify their own position as saviors of the country. Neither one is correct. Without doing too much debunking, I believe it ought to be said that President Roosevelt and his associates have executed some government policies that have been helpful to the business structure. With equal frankness, it ought to be said that business leaders have taken the bull by the horns and have proceeded to

help materially in putting commerce and industry back on the right track again. Neither one ought to take too much credit. Some credit is due each but neither one nor both together is entitled to claim all of the credit for the recovery of business that is now underway.

The answer to the upward swing of business lies chiefly in the fact that the depression has worn itself out. It would have worn itself out just the same whether the adminstration was New Deal or Republican. It would have accomplished just as much in the way of expanded buying power and increased production whether Mr. Roosevelt was re-elected or whether he had been defeated and Governor Landon of Kansas had been elected at the end of the recent national campaign.

I am reminded by this discussion of a remark that the late Eugene Black made while he was governor of the Federal reserve board. 



The industrial council of the Harvester company is an illegal labor organization under the terms of the National Labor Relations act, the board ruled. Under it the employees possess "only the shadow, not the substance, of collective bargaining," according to the decision. Numerous benefits conferred on the employees under the plan are admitted but the board says most of them "are granted in the form of paternalism.

A. F. of L. Council's Report on Social Security Act

WHEN the American Federation of Labor's annual conntion opened in Tampa it had before it the report of the executive incil dealing with, among many other topics, the social security act he report heartily approved of a federal social security program and urged adoption of state laws that ould give labor the greatest possible benefit from the federal statte. If the federal law is unconstilutional, the council said, "it is clear that its provisions must be changed that sanction must be afforded them through an amendment to e constitution."

The council questioned the wism of obtaining the necessary funds through a payroll tax "which to a great extent is to be paid directly or indirectly by the workers involved" and suggested that congress repeal this feature of the law as soon as it convenes.

In discussing unemployment since NRA's end, the council said:

"The shorter work week and the six hour day furnish the real solution to the insistent problem of unemployment. It is the responsibility that private industry must accept in order to give the necessary balance to economic expansion." The council reported a member-
