





Blum, however, warned the Nazis that France cannot and will not co-operate with Germany economically or politically while the possibility continues to exist that this help may be some day turned against the country which gave it."

He expressed opposition to Hitler's policy of making bilateral pacts, and added: "I believe I am practicing realism when I declare we do not wish to separate French security from European peace."



On April 19, 1847, the first regular mail service in California was established when the United States military authorities inaugurated a semimonthly "government express." is virtually no better protection Army despatches, private letters against heat than white complexand newspapers were carried, free of charge, between San Francisco and San Diego by two soldiers on horseback, who started from these towns on alternate Mondays. Meeting the following Sunday at Dana's rancho, near San Luis Obispo, they exchanged mails. Each soldier then started back to the point from which he had come, arriving there in time to begin another trip the following Monday. The rush of settlers to California, following the discovery of gold, necessitated the establishment of Post Office department routes, which supplanted this original service.



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

When using a mechanical refrigerator, simply set the control for freezing desserts and forget all about it until the freezing is com-

Frozen Pudding.

Add three tablespoonfuls of quickcooking tapioca to two cupfuls of milk, with one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt; cook in a double boiler for 15 minutes, or until the tapioca is clear and the mixture thickened. Add one-half cupful of milk, three tablespoonfuls of corn sirup and cook until smooth. Cool

KNOW THYSELF by DR. GEORGE D. GREER teaspoonful of vanilla. twelve blanched, sliced and toasted almonds, two tablespoonfuls of candied pineapple, diced. Turn into a freezing tray and freeze three to four hours.

To prepare toasted coconut bisque, use the above recipe, adding one cupful of toasted coconut, crumpled, in place of the fruit and nuts. Frozen ginger pudding is pre-

pared in the same way, adding four tablespoonfuls of ginger sirup and one-fourth of a cupful of pecan meats coarsely chopped. Serve as usual.
