DON'T LOOK NOW, but indications at this point are that Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev's Perestroika and Glasnot policies may be in a lot of trouble.

The Soviet leader has instituted a program for more freedom for residents of the Communist Bloc residents. He has also promised that there would be no police action in any of the communist states, such as was witnessed by the world in China earlier this year.

In recent weeks, for the first time in history a Communist regime was turned out in peaceful manner as Poland, one of the Soviet strongholds, ousted its Communist government for one with more democratic leanings.

Poland is Eastern Europe's most populous and most strategically-located country. For the time being, under Gorbachev, Poland has been allowed to choose their own leaders.

Last month, the Russian leaders admitted what historians in this country have known for years: that Hitler and Stalin made a secret agreement some 50 years ago to divide Poland and other parts of Eastern Europe into Nazi and Soviet holdings.

Stalin is supposed to have commented at one time that imposing Communism on the stubborn Polish people made about as much sense as "putting a saddle on a cow."

The iron-willed Poles finally broke loose of their Communist shackles in their August elections, and are now attempting to forge a government that will be more to their liking.

President Bush has been obliged to keep a "poker face" in the wake of the recent developments in Poland, although it is a known fact that the administration is well-pleased with the Polish election, and will be doing everything in their power to assure that the new government succeeds.

The other indication that Gorbachev's Perestroika program might be crumbling is the mass exodus of residents of East Germany through Hungary, to West Germany, where many were given immediate citizenship and jobs.

Thousands of East Germans have made their way to refugee camps in Hungary, and the Hungarian officials have been lax to stop their exodus from Communist territory. In fact, Hungarian troops have been under orders not to shoot the refugees.

It is an interesting point that many residents of Communist-controlled states, when given more freedom, opt to leave the country for areas outside the Communist Bloc, which they know to be REALLY free.

And perhaps they are fearful of the day that Gorbachev may lose his place as the Soviet leader, or finally have to admit that his reform program isn't working as he had intended, and place a "hold" on Perestroika.

BHS Hosts Groom On Friday

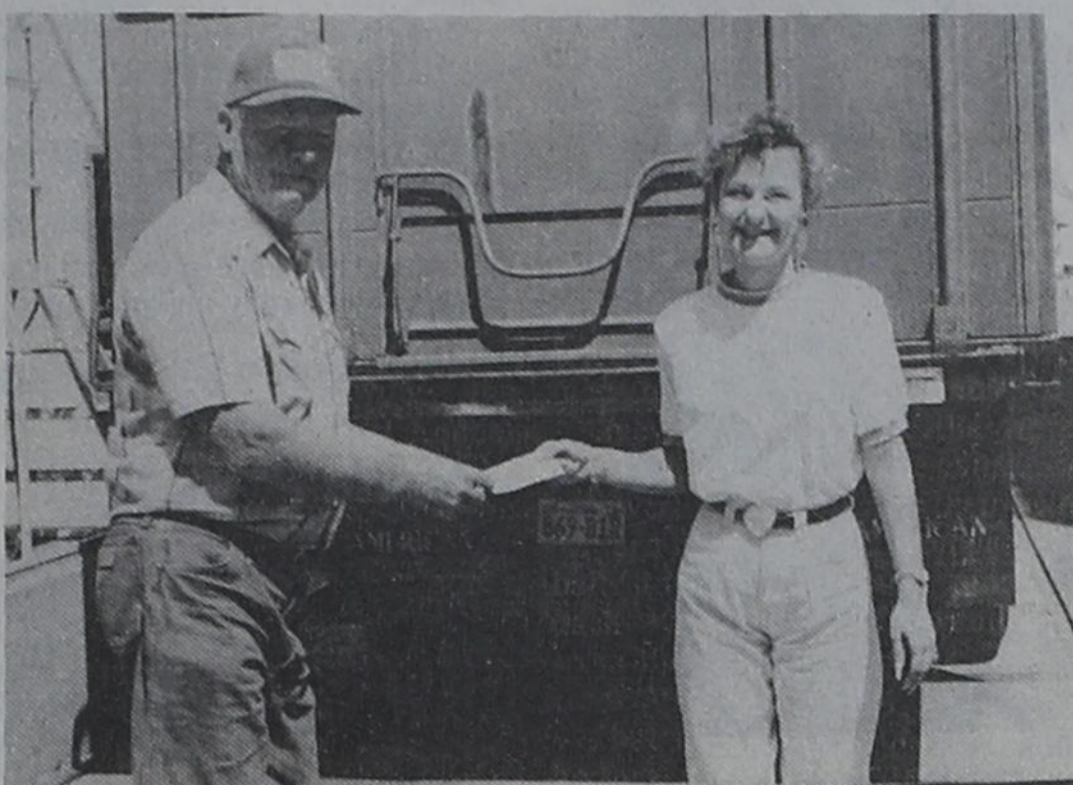
Bovina will host the Groom Tigers in their third game of the season Friday.

BHS Gets Revenge In Silvertown Win

Robert Guevara, junior member of the Bovina Mustang football team, kicked two out of three PATs for Bovina last Friday, then blocked what would have been the tying kick with 1:50 left in the game to give the Mustangs a thrilling 22-20 win over the Silvertown Owls.

It was the home-opening football game for the Mustangs, and evened their season record at 1-1.

The win was sweet revenge for the Mustangs, who were edged by the Owls, 16-14, in bi-district play last November, ousting Bovina from the playoffs.

The game was a close one from the opening kickoff.

Bovina took the lead the third time it had the ball. The Mustangs took the ball at their own 12, and two plays later Porras broke loose on a 68-yard scoring jaunt.

Guevara missed on his only two-point conversion kick, but Bovina owned the lead at 6-0 with 2:21 left in the opening quarter.

Silvertown answered, after causing a fumble and recovering at the Bovina eight-yard-line.

Three plays following the fumble recovery, Owl QB Kendal Minyard hit Bryan Ramsey in the end zone for the score. Silvertown

also missed its conversion attempt, leaving the game tied.

It took Bovina only 59 seconds to regain the lead.

Reyna hit Porras for a ten-yard gain, and two plays later he found Genaro Ruvalcaba on a 50-yard scoring pass. Guevara's kick split the uprights for a 14-8 Bovina lead that turned out to be the halftime score.

On their second possession of the third quarter, the Owls got their potent ground game going, and drove for the tying touchdown.

Starting at their own six, Silvertown marched 74 yards and capped the drive with an eight-yard pass from Maynard to junior Bradley Brunson. Benny Hill kicked the two-pointer to tie the game at 14-14.

After the teams traded punts, Bovina set sail on what would prove to be the winning drive.

It took the Mustangs just six plays to once again untie the score.

A pair of completed passes good for 34 and 24 yards moved the Mustangs quickly downfield, and from the five Reyna spotted Porras in the end one for a six-pointer.

Guevara's kick made the score 22-14 with 4:19 left in the game.

Silvertown took over on their own 32 yard line and quickly moved the ball downfield. Junior running-back Wayne Henderson went over from the two with 1:50 left on the clock for a 22-20 score.

That set the stage for Guevara's heroics. He stormed through the Owls' line to block Hill's conversion attempt as the Bovina stands roared its approval.

The Mustangs led in total yardage, 262-195. Reyna proved to be an efficient passer, completing 11 of 31 attempts for 202 yards. He suffered only one interception and was sacked once.

Silvertown's Minyard completed 12 of 22 passes for 105 yards, and the Owls added 90 yards rushing. Minyard was sacked twice by the Mustang defense, and had one pass picked off.

Meeting Will Explore Ag Computer Use

Parmer County farmers with loans from the Farmers Home Administration are invited to a meeting on September 20 on how FmHA's computer program is used in considering loan servicing options such as rescheduling and write-downs. FmHA County Supervisor Weldon Rainey, said today.

The meeting will be held at 1 p.m. at the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview. The location is just off the old U.S. Highway 87 south of downtown Plainview.

Weldon Rainey said the meeting is particularly important for FmHA borrowers behind in their payments and those having difficulty with their loans.

"We will go about finding one that will keep them in operation," Weldon Rainey said. "We will be putting emphasis on the Debt and Loan Restructuring (DLRS) computer program that was developed just for this purpose."

Corn Harvest Is Underway

Harvest of the area's corn crop has gotten underway.

B.F. Ray and Alvin Glasscock Farm delivered the first load of corn to Sherley Grain on September 6. They harvested two loads that day.

The corn brought in so far has been somewhat high in moisture content, according to Harry Johnson.

Those harvesting corn so far include Wayne McClaran, Joe Black, Buddy Marshall and B.F. Ray.

The recent rains, which delayed the corn harvest somewhat, have never-the-less been a boon to the area's wheat crop. The new wheat crop is starting out well above average, particularly in the moisture department.

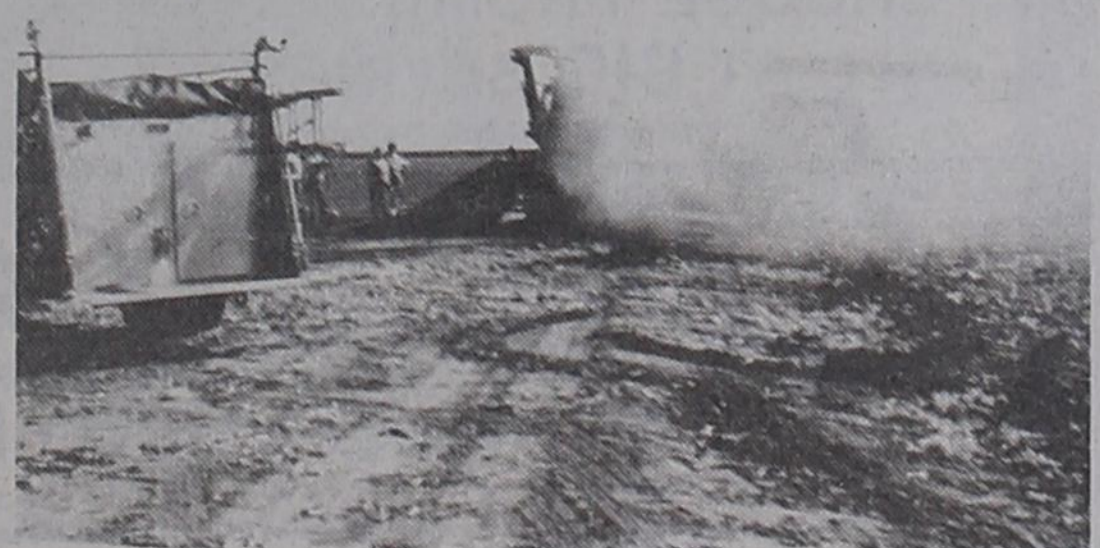
In the race for grand prize, Doug Johnson holds the lead after two weeks with a score of 21. Matt Howell and Dorothy Stowers have scores of 19.

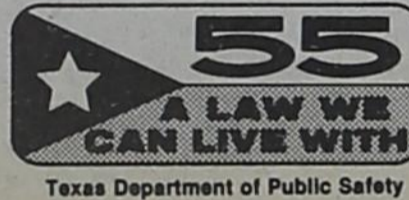
Mexican Dinner Has Good Crowd

Funeral services were held for Walter Steelman, a long-time resident.

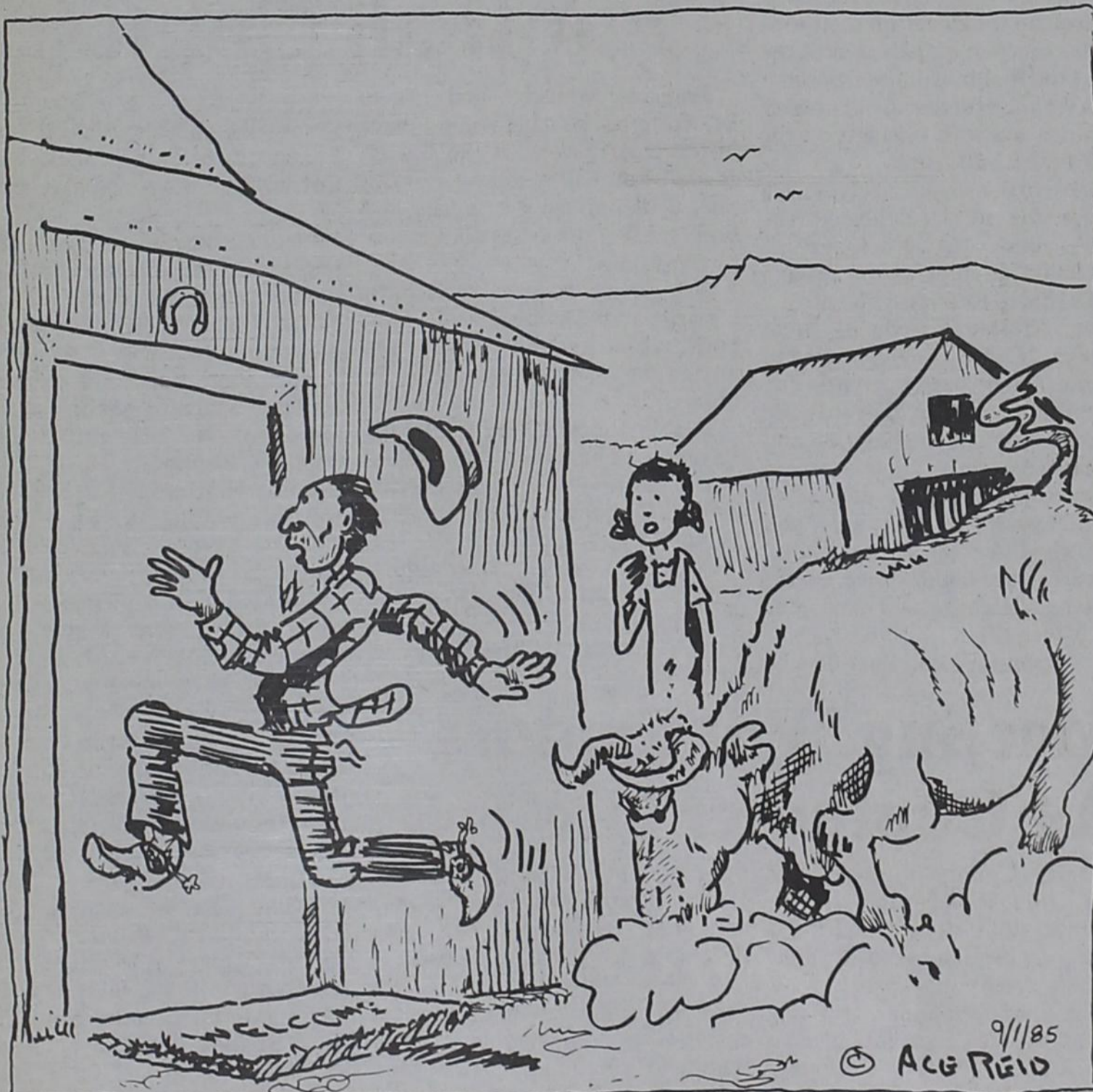
Carl Rea was taken by the Bovina Ambulance to the Parmer County Community Hospital with severe pain in his back.

Ordinance No. 89-9-1

AN ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE ENTITLED "VICIOUS DOGS," PROVIDING DEFINITIONS, PROVIDING FOR THE DECLARATION OF A DOG AS VICIOUS, AND THE NOTIFICATION OF DECLARATION OF A VICIOUS DOG, PROVIDING FOR A DETERMINATION HEARING AND APPEAL, PROVIDING FOR A DEFENSE TO THE DECLARATION OF VICIOUS DOGS, PROVIDING REQUIREMENTS FOR OWNERS OF VICIOUS DOGS, PROVIDING FOR NOTIFICATION BY OWNER OF CHANGE OF STATUS OF VICIOUS DOG, PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE, PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN THE OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER, PROVIDING A CRIMINAL PENALTY, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of this City Board of Aldermen that it is necessary for the protection of the public health, safety and welfare of the citizenry to regulate vicious dogs; NOW THEREFORE:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION I. DEFINITIONS: as used in Sections I through VII inclusive, the following words or terms shall have the following meanings, unless the context shall indicate another or different meaning or intent.

- "Vicious Dog" means:
 - any dog that, when unprovoked, inflicts severe injury or death to a person, or bites a person on public or private property; or
 - any dog that has killed a domestic animal without provocation while off the owner's property; or
 - any dog which, when unprovoked, chases or approaches a person upon the streets, sidewalks, or any public or private property in a menacing fashion or apparent attitude of attack such that the person reasonably believes that the dog will cause physical injury to that person; or
 - any individual dog with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack unprovoked, to cause injury, or to otherwise threaten the safety of persons or domestic animals.

- "Animal Control Officer" means an employee designated by the Mayor of the City. That Officer to be the Chief of Police or any of his deputies shall enforce the provisions of this section.
- "Determination Hearing Officer" means any employee or individual designated by the Mayor of the City. The hearing officer shall have a working knowledge of animal behavior.

- "Enclosure" means a house or a building, or in the case of a fence or a structure/pen, the fence or structure/pen must be at least six (6) feet in height. The structure/pen must also have minimum dimensions of five (5) feet by ten (10) feet. The fence or structure/pen must form an enclosure suitable to prevent entry of young children, and must be locked and secured such that a dog cannot climb, dig, jump or otherwise escape of its own volition. The enclosure shall be securely locked at all times. The structure/pen must have secure sides to prevent the vicious dog from escaping from the enclosure. The structure/pen shall provide protection from the elements for the vicious dog. The Animal Control Officer shall have the right to require that the fence be higher than (6) feet or require a secure top and/or a secure bottom be added to the structure/pen if the need is demonstrated. This additional requirement shall be based upon the type of dog to be kept in the enclosure and its anticipated ability to escape.
- "Menacing fashion" means the show by a dog of a disposition, determination, or intent to attack or inflict injury or harm to a person.
- "Owner/Keeper" means any person, firm, corporation, organization or department possession, harboring, keeping, holding, caring for, having an interest in, or having control or custody of a dog. If the owner/keeper of a dog is a minor, the parent or guardian of

that minor shall be responsible for the compliance with specifications of the ordinance.

- "Severe injury" means any physical injury that results in broken bones or disfiguring lacerations requiring multiple sutures or cosmetic surgery or that results in death.
- "Unprovoked" with respect to an attack by a dog means that the dog was not hit, kicked, or struck by a person with any object or part of the attacked person's body nor was any part of the dog's body pulled, pinched or squeezed by the person attacked.

SECTION VI. REQUIREMENTS OF VICIOUS DOG OWNERS.

An owner of a dog declared to be a vicious dog under this Section must comply with the following within thirty (30) days of such final determination. Compliance with these requirements will be determined by the Police Department.

- The dog must be licensed in accordance with City Ordinance 78-15; and
- the vicious dog shall at all times wear a collar marked with a fluorescent yellow color visible at fifty (50) feet so that the dog can be identified as a vicious dog; and
- the vicious dog must be kept in a proper enclosure; and
- the owner must present to the Chief of Police a Certificate of Public Liability Insurance in the amount of \$100,000.00 to cover any damages caused by the vicious dog. The insurance shall be kept in effect continuously and shall not be cancelled unless the dog is no longer kept by the owner; and

- the vicious dog, when taken outside the enclosure, must be securely muzzled in a manner that will not cause injury to the vicious dog nor interfere with its vision or respiration but shall prevent it from biting any person or animal; and the vicious dog must be restrained by a substantial chain or cable leash having a minimum tensile strength of 1,000 pounds and not to exceed six (6) feet in length; and
- the owner shall post a sign on his premises warning that there is a vicious dog on the property. This sign shall be visible and capable of being read from the public street or highway. In addition, a vicious dog symbol or decal, understandable by small children must be displayed on or about the sign; and

- the owner shall have the vicious dog tattooed on the inside left rear leg with a vicious dog license number issued by the Animal Control Officer.
- the vicious dog must be spayed or neutered.

If the owner of a dog declared to be vicious under this Section is unable or unwilling to comply with the ownership requirements listed above, the dog shall be euthanized by an animal shelter, animal control agency, licensed veterinarian or the City Animal Control Division. A dog declared to be vicious under this Section shall not be offered for adoption or sale.

SECTION VIII. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION.

- The owner of a dog which, when unprovoked, inflicts severe injury or death to a person or bites a person on public or private property; or which kills a domestic animal without provocation while off the owner's property shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$200.00 but not more than \$2,000.00.
- It shall be a violation of this section for a vicious dog to kill or wound, or assist in killing or wounding any domestic animal belonging to or in the possession of any person, or for a vicious dog to attack, assault, bite or otherwise injure any person or assist in attacking, assaulting, biting, or otherwise injuring any person while out of or within the enclosure of the owner whether or not such vicious dog was on a leash and securely muzzled or whether or not the vicious dog escaped without fault of the owner. The Animal Control Officer is empowered to confiscate and

destroy such vicious dog in an expeditious and humane manner. In addition, the owner shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$200.00 and not more than \$2,000.00.

3. It shall be a violation of this section for the owner of a vicious dog to:

- fail to have the vicious dog licensed; or
- have a vicious dog outside the enclosure unless muzzled and restrained by a leash or chain as set out in Section VI; or
- fail to have a proper enclosure to confine the vicious dog; or
- fail to post signs around the premises with clear visible warning signs that there is a vicious dog on the premises; or
- fail to post signs with an appropriate warning symbol which informs small children of a vicious dog on the premises; or
- fail to secure and maintain public liability insurance of at least \$1,000,000.00; or
- fail to collar the vicious dog with a collar marked with a yellow fluorescent color visible at fifty (50) feet; or
- fail to have the vicious dog's inside left rear leg tattooed with a vicious dog license number issued by the Animal Control Officer; or
- fail to have the vicious dog neutered or spayed; or
- fail to notify the Animal Control Officer of a change of status as set out in Section VII; or
- fail to keep the dog confined at no cost to the City during the hearing process as required by Section III.

(e) fail to post signs with an appropriate warning symbol which informs small children of a vicious dog on the premises; or

(f) fail to secure and maintain public liability insurance of at least \$1,000,000.00; or

(g) fail to collar the vicious dog with a collar marked with a yellow fluorescent color visible at fifty (50) feet; or

(h) fail to have the vicious dog's inside left rear leg tattooed with a vicious dog license number issued by the Animal Control Officer; or

(i) fail to have the vicious dog neutered or spayed; or

(j) fail to notify the Animal Control Officer of a change of status as set out in Section VII; or

(k) fail to keep the dog confined at no cost to the City during the hearing process as required by Section III.

If the owner of the vicious dog is found to be in violation of any of the above, the owner shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$200.00 but not more than \$2,000.00.

4. Exemptions

The provisions under this section shall not apply to any law enforcement agency where a dog is being used for law enforcement.

5. A rebuttable presumption shall exist that the owner or keeper acted in a criminally negligent manner with regard to any actions brought under Section VIII, Subsections 1, 2 or 3 of this section.

SECTION IX. Severability, Publication and Effective Date.

1. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Aldermen that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the Board of Aldermen without the incorporation in this ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

2. The City Clerk of the City of Bovina, Texas is hereby directed to publish the caption and Sections I (1), VI, and VIII of this ordinance for one (1) day in the official newspaper of the City of Bovina, Texas, as authorized by Art. 1176b-1, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after September 20, 1989, and its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained.
