

MY TURN

ARE WE INVISIBLE here or what? Living in the middle of Parmer County is sort of like being in "no-man's land."

The fellow who checks our office machines once a year lives in Midland. He wanted to call us for an appointment the other day, but had lost our phone number. Since it costs a bunch now to call information for a phone number, he decided to hunt for us in the Lubbock regional "Feist" phone directory. Nope. It comes up to the northwest of Lubbock and takes in Lariat and Lazbuddie but not Bovina and Friona.

Then he tried the Amarillo area directory which only goes west as far as Hereford, Dimmitt and Summerfield. No Friona or Bovina!

Next he tried the Clovis/Portales area directory which takes in Farwell and Oklahoma Lane on the Texas side of the border, but no Friona and Bovina.

I didn't realize that we live in the middle of a desert wilderness, but if you're trying to find those of us in Friona, Bovina, Hub & Parmer without the benefit of the Muleshoe GTE phone book, you're out of luck.

Apparently, the South Plains doesn't want us and the Panhandle is reluctant to claim us.

Even mailing a letter from here gets to be quite an operation. If Gladys Spring in Bovina wanted to mail a birthday card to her daughter, Pam Kendrick, in Friona just 14 miles away, the card would travel on the mail truck right through Friona, on up to Amarillo and then back again... a 165 mile trip.

Here's one that's even worse than that. If Rose McCain, of HCR 1, Bovina, wanted to mail a birthday card to her neighbor Maxine Hart who lives about one mile down the road from her, it would take two or three days to make a trip of about 300 miles. Maxine is on a Farwell mail route. The card would leave Bovina, travel northeast to Amarillo, then south to Lubbock, then northwest back to Farwell.

Now, to top it all off, the clueless, amoeba-brained UIL people have placed Friona, Dimmitt and Muleshoe in a district which competes with Perryton. Good gosh! That's practically in Kansas! We've complained for years about our school kids having to compete in Dalhart, 117 miles to the north, which makes a round trip of 234 miles. Now we get to travel to Perryton, 192 miles to the northeast, in the farthest northeastern tip-top edge of the entire state... a round trip of 384 miles. For the Muleshoe kids, that's a 442 mile round trip.

Won't those Tuesday night basketball games be great? The bus will need to leave school around noon. If the game is over by ten o'clock, you can expect the kids to come rolling home about two in the morning. If they have a test in any of their classes the next day, don't count on them passing it.

For a youngster who competes in school sports, starting in Junior High and on through the four years in High School, he will spend well-over five thousand hours on the road while traveling back and forth to sporting events, or about 31,100 hours on the road during the six years from 7th to 12th grades. What is the lesson that our children learn from this?

You may remember that I have long been an advocate of the Panhandle area seceding from the state of Texas to become our own state. Perhaps we should just secede from the whole USA and become a foreign country. Just think, we could get foreign aid and wouldn't have to pay income taxes. But best of all, we could run our schools the way we thought best for our children and compete with schools in our own immediate area.

Local Feedlots Are Tapped For Program

Nineteen employees from twelve area feedlots are participating in a first-ever feedyard management certificate program offered by West Texas A&M University. Friona's Manuel Diaz, cowboy pen rider, and Craig Hitchcock, assistant manager, at Paco Feed Yard, Inc.; Bill Sterling, head cowboy at West Plains Feedyard, Inc.; and Elton Turley, assistant manager at Caprock Industries, were among those selected for the program based on employer recommendation, management potential and interest, and compliance with the University's academic admission standards.

"The largest concentration of fed cattle in the nation is right here in the Texas Panhandle," Dr. Jerry Miller, dean of the T. Boone Pickens College of Business, said. "We have a responsibility to prepare local residents for management positions in our major industry."

WTAMU administrators and faculty designed the 30-credit-hour, 2-1/2 year program which includes courses in English, speech,

accounting, entrepreneurial studies, global economics, management, marketing, finance, computer information systems and commodity strategies.

"The program will challenge our faculty as well as the students," Miller said. "Unlike most classes, this is a very homogeneous group, and we can target all of our coursework to the cattle feeding industry."

The students meet at Hereford High School once a week from 4-10 p.m. Tuesday evenings for English 101 and CIS 105, taught by WTAMU faculty members, Kathleen Ebell and Dr. Teri Giddens, respectively.

"Some of the students are already in managerial positions and would like to improve their skills, and others are seeking promotions," Ebell said. "They are all very motivated, and I try to relate the material to the cattle feeding industry. If they're learning as much about English as I am about cattle feeding, it will be a very successful semester."

Miller is planning to offer

similar courses in Dumas beginning fall 1996.

Funding for the program is provided by a legislative initiative for agriculture/business awarded to West Texas A&M University, participating feedyards and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

District Realignment Puts BHS In 2A By One Pupil

For a school that played six-man football a few years back, a move into district 3-2A seems like a giant step.

District alignments are made every two years by the University Interscholastic League (UIL) based on a school's enrollment.

School officials submit enrollment figures in the fall. They have no way of knowing where the "break" will be for district assignments.

Last October, BHS submitted an enrollment of 150 students. The UIL break between 1A and 2A classification for the 1996-97/97-98 seasons was 149 students. Bovina was nudged into 2A by one student.

The only appeal allowed by the UIL is if a school feels there was an error in enrollment figures submitted. According to Superintendent Nuttall, there was no error in Bovina's figures.

So it is on to district 3-2A, where the Mustangs and Squaws will compete against Amarillo Highland Park, Hale Center, Hart, Lockney, and Olton, rounding out a six-team district.

They leave behind what is now an eight team district. However, coaches are not unhappy about the move.

"Five of the 1A schools in our old district were in the playoffs last

year", according to Coach Bobby Ortiz. They include Kress, Springlake-Earth, Sudan, Nazareth, and Farwell.

Coaches are optimistic about the new setting for district. The Mustangs are continuing their off-season conditioning program and

lose only four seniors from last year.

"It should be an interesting challenge, but one we look forward to", said head coach Mike Royce.

She was nominated by special education teacher Bill Drumma as a special student who has ten times the school spirit of any student.

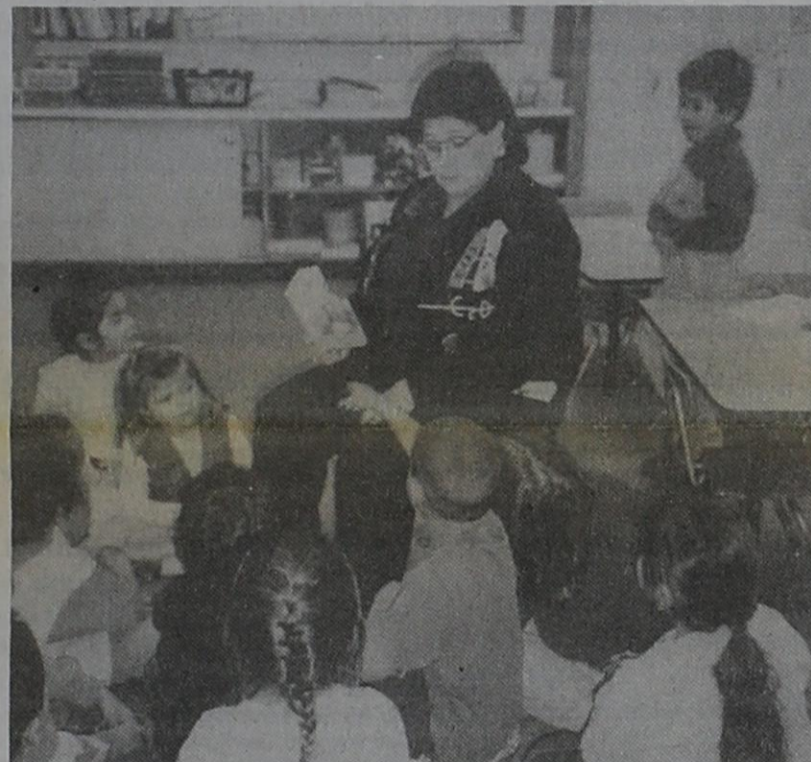
Kelli enjoys pep rallies, art class, and home economics.

The Fillies split district games this past week. They took a narrow 40-39 win over Kress Tuesday night. Bonnie Quintana had a good night's scoring with 18 points.

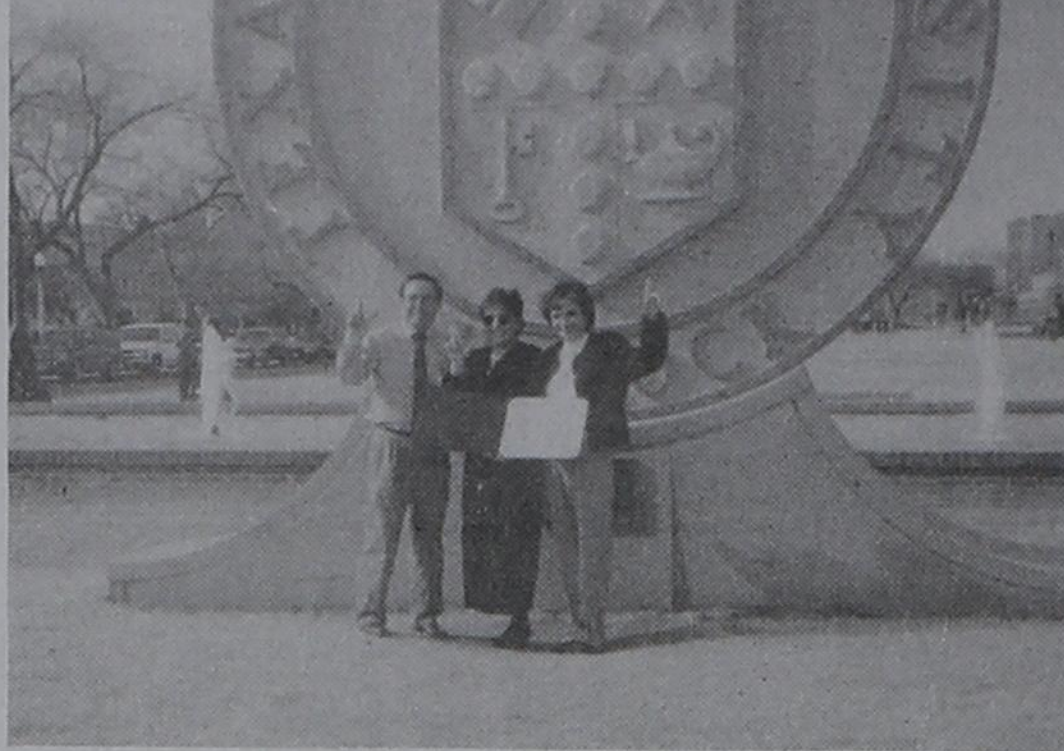

Farmers Advised Of Compliance Rules

All farmers that are farming highly erodible cropland fields are reminded that conservation plans must continue to be followed each year in order to stay in compliance and remain eligible for any USDA farm program benefits.

(d) Breaking out new land to farm may be done if it is on non-highly erodible land, or on highly erodible land on which a conservation plan is signed which adequately controls both wind and water erosion.

(e) Highly Erodible Determinations were made on a field by field basis prior to 1990 using old ASCS maps and field boundaries. These field boundaries are still the basis for your plans even though the size and shape of the current fields may have changed.

The Natural Resource Conservation Service is mandated by the USDA to perform random status reviews or spot checks on a percentage of highly erodible tracts each year.

We're here to help you stay in compliance and not out to get you, so if you have any questions pertaining to your place, please call or come by the NRCS office in Friona for the time being.

(a) The plan goes with the land and should a change of operators take place, the new operator is required to follow the plan.

(b) Any water erosion problem must be addressed in the plan with proper treatment planned.

(c) All structural practices such as terraces, waterways, etc. and grass plantings done to control erosion must be maintained.

Out Here

A few years back, when we lived in Tulsa, Reverend Gary Harber, pastor of the Trinity United Methodist Church, walked to the pulpit one Sunday morning and opened his sermon by asking, "What's wrong with our world?"

He held up the Sunday edition of the Tulsa World. "What's happened to our world?" he asked again and spent the next few minutes reading the headlines and excerpts from that Sunday paper.

I don't recall the specific events, but he recounted them after item of terror, atrocity, senseless crimes, and natural disasters that had made news that Sunday.

His theme, "something is wrong with our world", did not fall on deaf ears.

I often think of Reverend Harber's sermon. He has since left Tulsa, and the last I knew he was in Elk City, Oklahoma.

"What's wrong with our world?"

We live in an instant world now. Instant information, instant replay, drive-thru lanes, fast-foods,

frivolous lawsuits, and a general distrust of mankind.

When our U.S. troops arrived in Haiti a few years ago, the television cameras were on the beach when they landed. Instant war coverage.

Now we have troops in a place called Bosnia, where so-called civilized people have slaughtered thousands of innocent people and buried them in mass graves.

We are unearthing the bodies, but no one seems to have a reasonable explanation about why they were murdered.

During the World Wars, Korea, and Vietnam, thousands of American soldiers were killed, and are missing.

Yet today, one soldier dies in Bosnia, and we see the instant replay, interviews with the family, military leaders describing the circumstances.

Not to be disrespectful, but one soldier dies and it makes world news. Instantly. Wonder how that makes the families of the thousands of soldiers in other wars feel.

First, they said he stepped on a mine. Then they said he didn't. Now they say he was handling some live ammunition in an area that he was not supposed to be in. It was his own fault he got killed?

Somewhere the madness has to

stop. But will it? I don't think so.

Can we legislate morality? Not in your lifetime. Is there an answer to abortion? Never will be.

The United States cannot make the rest of the world over to be like the United States. Doesn't matter how many troops we send, how many places we go, or how few lives we lose.

We don't even do a very good job of handling things in the U. S. of A. We have taken a fairly simple life and made it so complex that no one can control it.

For instance, why will it take seven years to balance the federal budget? "Hello, Friona Bank. Just wanted to let you know that I should have my checkbook balanced in seven years."

Another downside to instant information—think what it would be like if Phil Gramm was elected President and we had to listen to his monotone twang for four years.

Then of course O.J. is at my house day and night trying to get someone to listen. He's talking, we're listening, but we're not buying it. Instant O.J.

I predict that, in fact, the federal budget will be balanced at about the same time O.J. finds the real killers.

In sparsely populated Parmer County, the atrocities in Bosnia,

and North Korea, and Thailand, are light years removed. Maybe that is good.

But we still should ponder the question Reverend Harber asked: "What's wrong with our world?"

We had some major vandalism at the high school a few days back. As Superintendent Hal Ratcliff told the Noon Lions Club, "I don't understand vandalism." Neither do I, Hal.

What is life to be like 25-50 years from now for our kids and grandkids? Will they be asking "what's wrong with our world?" or will they know.

Look into the eyes of a child and ask yourself "what's going to be wrong with their world?"

Does prayer work? Maybe. Consider this.

Jack Patterson says that ever since Texas got the lottery, his wife has been praying to win it. She prays to win every time they have the drawing, and has for several years.

Finally he told her that he knew she wanted to win, and that she was praying for it, but, "Honey", he said, "don't you think you would have a better chance if you bought a ticket?"

That's the way life in our world is. You can either pray about it, or buy a ticket and try to win it.

Both wouldn't be bad.

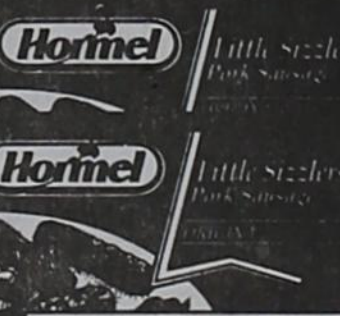

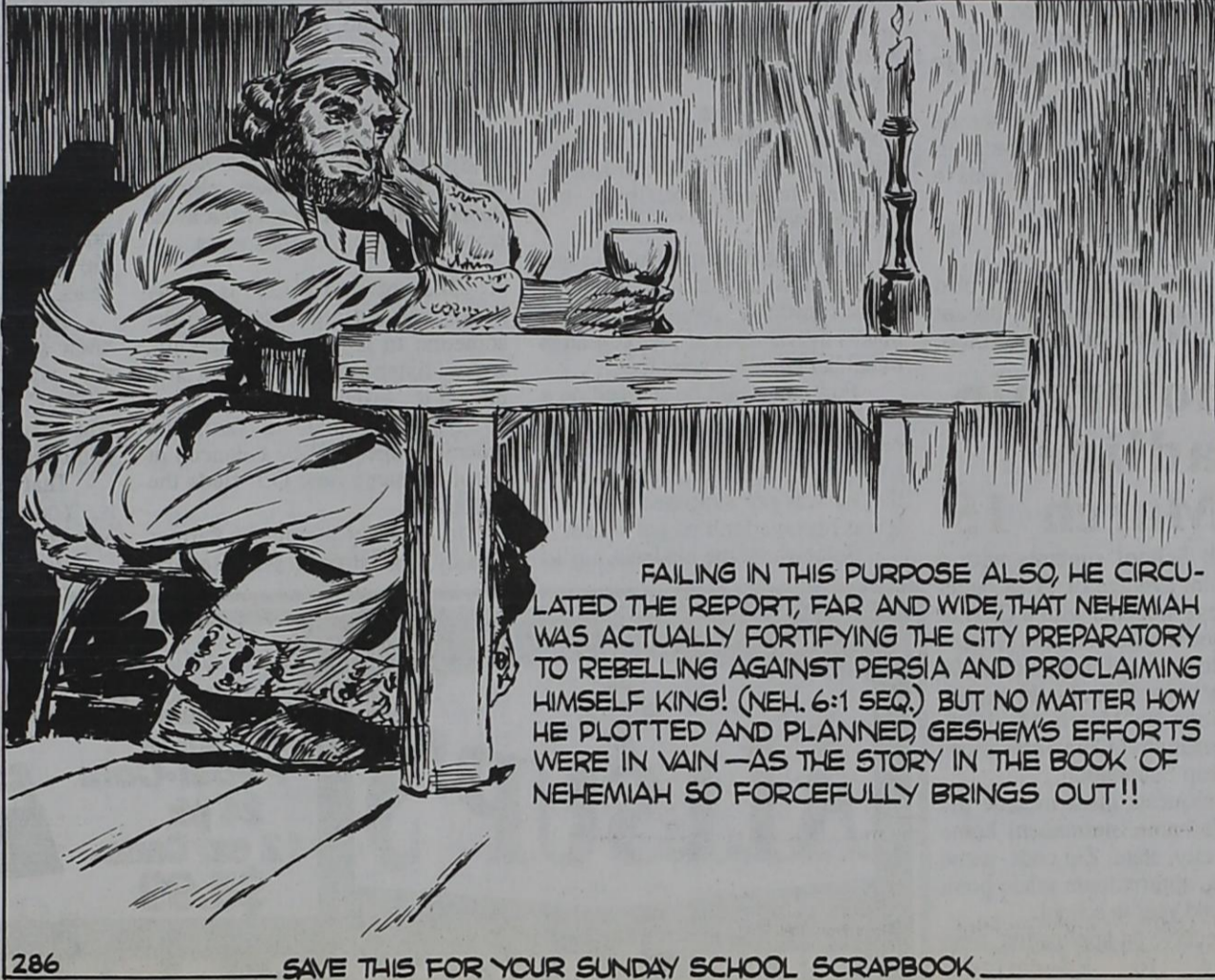

Lester Roth Writes Newsletter Article



LESTER ROTH

Lester Roth, a resident at Prairie Acres, wrote his story for the February Prairie Acres newsletter, the *Prairie Times*. His story is featured below.

By LESTER ROTH
I was born in Haycenter, Nebraska on June 29, 1909. My father, "Kelvin," was killed by a shotgun that went off when I was four years old.

Later my mother, "Ella," remarried. I have a sister and two brothers. I am the oldest.

I lived with my uncle for a year. Then my folks came down from Silverton, Colorado and took me with them.

When I was eleven years old, we worked on a farm with six head of mules for farming. Milked a hundred cows a day, for five years.

I only went up to the fifth grade. But, am glad that I was able to put my sister through high school and my brothers through the ninth and tenth grade.

At the age of nineteen, I met "Sylvia Kirk" in Greeley, Colorado. I didn't own a car, "I had a horse."

I worked for a farmer and learned how to drive an International tractor. I was making \$10.00 a month, and worked about four years for him. Sylvia used to go by and take me some water, and at times she would drive the tractor while I sat on the disc to eat my lunch.

We married on August 26, 1935. Right on my mother-in-law's birthday! I was twenty-five years old and Sylvia was nineteen.

Our first home was a boxcar. It was so small that our table was made into a bed at night!

Later, I worked for Paul Morgan at a feedlot in Denver, Colorado. He picked four men and myself to come to Lubbock, Texas to work for him.

We started Luther's Feedlot, one of the biggest feedlots around at the time.

Sylvia and I brought our furniture and my two horses from Colorado.

Then, we moved to Friona in the late 1960s where we started High Plains Feedlot. It also was one of the biggest feedlots. I worked for them until I retired.

Sylvia and I have two daughters and two sons. We lived on three acres north of town.

"One day, I got up to make some coffee and then I passed out." My neighbors had to go pick me up on their four wheel drive on account that it was real muddy and they took me to the hospital. "The doctor said I had a heart attack."

Shortly after, we moved to town so I could be near the hospital. I had to be put on oxygen

and also on breathing treatments. Plus lots of medications.

It was hard for Sylvia to continue to take care of me, so she brought me to live at Prairie Acres in August of 1992. Even though I

hated to be separated from her, I knew she had to do what was best for me.

Sylvia has lost most of her hearing and lives with my daughter now.

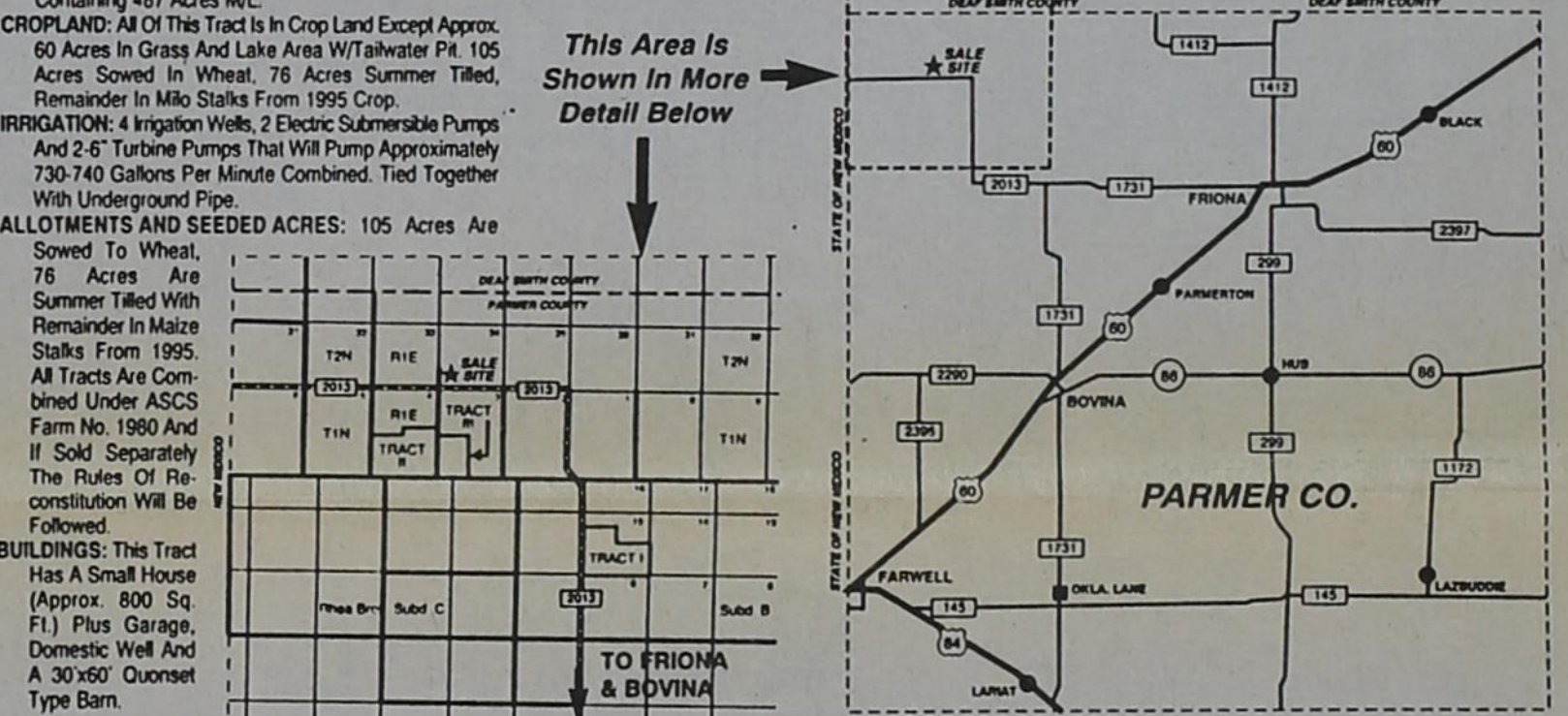

On Friday, February 2, friends and relatives gathered at Prairie Acres to celebrate Oma Looney's 100th birthday.

She was born to Albert and Elizabeth Dorsey on February 2, 1896, in a small town in Arkansas.

The family soon moved to Lingleville, Texas. The lure of cheap land moved them to Concho County, Texas, but a severe drought over seven years made another move, this time to Silver City, New Mexico.

But the trip took the family, two wagons and horses, to Roswell where they were convinced to homestead on the north side of the Capitan Mountains about 20 miles from the town of Capitan.

It was here she met J. J. Hammonds and they were married on October 12, 1915.

They moved to Hardeman County, Texas and had four children: Otha (now deceased), J. T. of Bovina, Loyce McCleskey of Las Lunas, New Mexico, and E. G. Hammonds of Waterford, California.

When the marriage dissolved, Mrs. Looney moved with her four children to Bovina in late 1922 where she worked as a cook in a hotel and restaurant.

On May 24, 1924, she married Rush Looney. They farmed at Bovina until 1944 when they moved to Hot Springs, New Mexico.

There they both worked at Carrie Tingley Crippled Children's Hospital.

After Rush Looney passed away, she retired and moved back to Bovina in early 1960.

She bought a small house and for several years she kept children until health and failing eyesight forced her to quit.

According to son, J. T., she was always active, enjoying traveling, camping, and fishing.

She liked cooking, quilting, and all kinds of needle work.

She lived alone until November of 1993, when, at the age of 97, she moved to Prairie Acres in Friona.

Now she likes to hear from her ten grandchildren, nineteen great grandchildren, and nine great-great grandchildren.

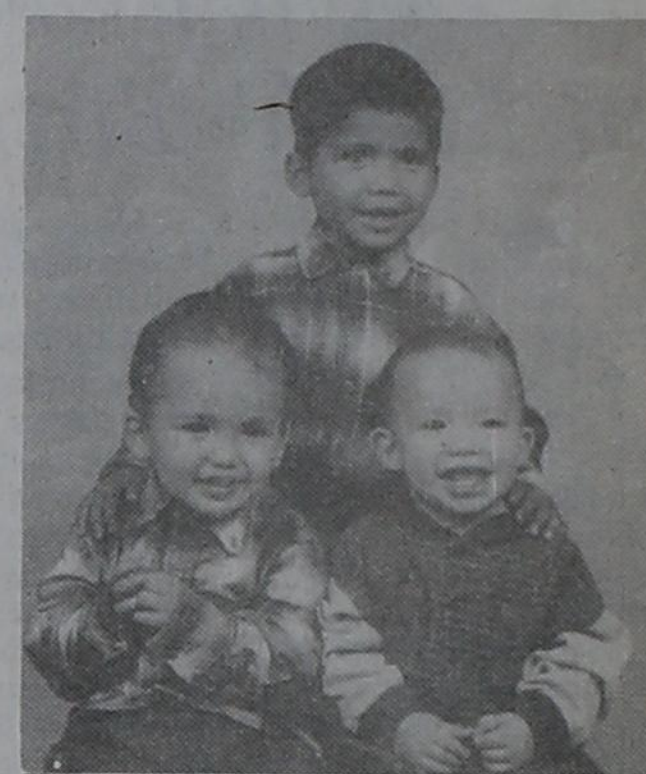

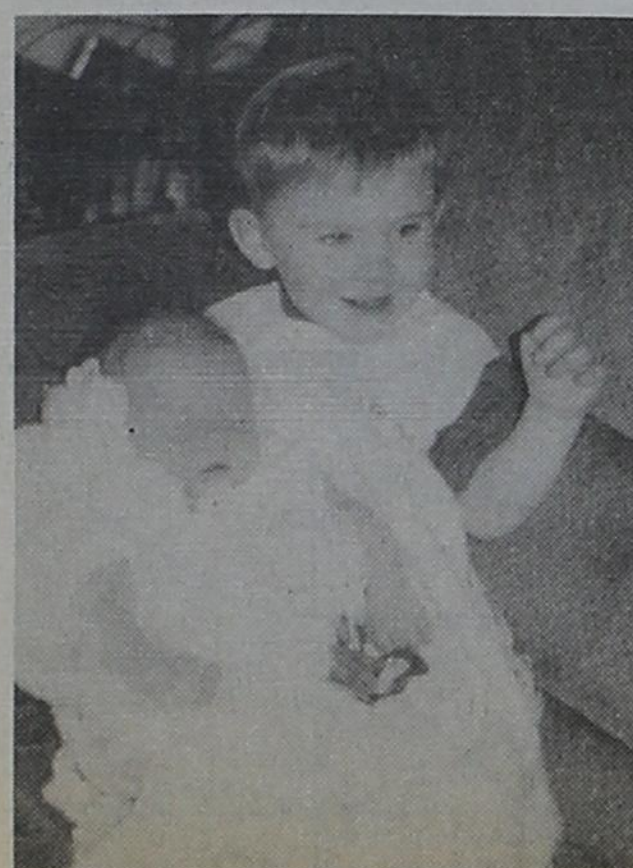

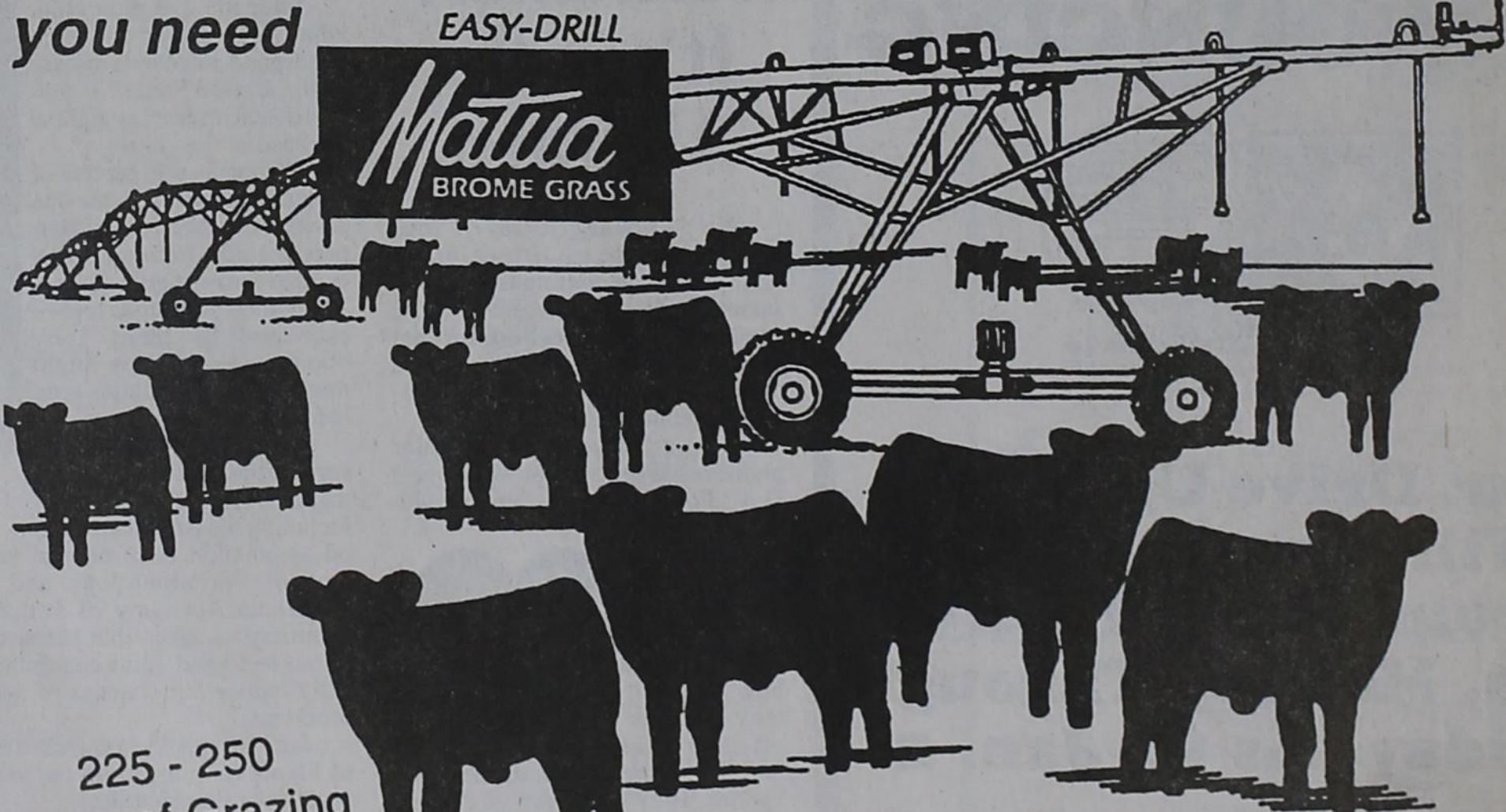
