Week Of Rain ~ ~ Meet Your Neighbor ~ ~ Boosts Farmers

Farmers across the area have received a big boost from a week of rains in the Bovina area, to the extent that many have been able to turn off their irrigation engines, which had been running non-stop in some cases.

"We finally got some rain!" said Harry Johnson of Sherley Grain, in response to our question concerning the rain.

The current rainy spell started last Friday, when a total of .91 inch was recorded, according to observor Maggie Moore. Then on consecutive days for the first week of August, starting on Monday, the totals in Bovina were .15 inch; .73 inch and .49 inch.

The .91 inch last Friday added to a .34 inch registered last Wednesday and made 1.25 for the last week in July. The 1.37 measured for the first three days of August makes 2.62 inches, spread across the previous eight days.

"It's been pretty general around the countryside for a change," Johnson said. "Most farmers have received two and one-half to three inches. The crops had been looking good for the most part, in spite of the lack of rain, and this will be a big boost to the corn and milo," Johnson added.

No hail damage was reported in the immediate Bovina area, although during the first rain of the current spell an area east of Rhea and north of Pleasant Hill experienced some damaging hail. The hail cloud seemed to start north of Pleasant Hill and ended up in Clovis, N.M.

Tom Ware reported that he had received around three inches during this rainy spell. Other reports included Grady Sorley, 1.1 inches; Jimmie Cockerham, one inch; Ricky Jamerson, one inch; Mike

Ware, one inch. The reports from Sorley, Cockerham, Jamerson and Mike Ware did not include Wednesday night's rain.

The nice part about the past week's rains was that they covered most of the county's dryland or semi-dryland area.

Joe Allen, manager of Sherley-Anderson's Rhea elevator, said that the area around Rhea had received over three inches of rain, for the most part, and all of it fell just right, except for the streak of hail on Wednesday, which caused considerable damage.

Allen said the hail affected about a two-mile streak, and the damage could be 50 per cent where it hailed. "The rain was really needed, and has been well-spaced. Up north and northwest of us they didn't get quite as much, but in all other directions, the rains were beneficial," Allen added.

The Hub area received somewhat less rain than the rest of the area. O.L. (Mac) McMurtrey at Hub Grain said that he had measured 1.25 inches during the past week, and that the rain was "pretty spotted" in the Hub area. "Oh, there were farmers who have reported up to two inches, but others got a lot less," McMurtrey said.

"It is sure helping, especially on the irrigated crops. Many of the irrigation wells are still running, but this (the rain) has helped the farmers catch up.

McMurtrey indicated that the crops in the Hub area were looking good. Some of the crops are late, due to being re-planted, but they are coming along real well.

Local Council Passes Juvenile Curfew Law

On July 11, 1994 the Bovina City Council passed a juvenile curfew ordinance. The ordinance basically states that people under the age of seventeen are not allowed to be out in public without their parents or legal guardians after midnight Sunday through Thursday or after 1 a.m. Friday or Saturday.

There are certain exceptions to this ordinance which include employment, school or church functions, etc. Also this ordinance not only allows for a fine to be imposed on the offending juvenile, but the parents of the juvenile may be fined as well.

Bovina Elem. School Supply List Is Given

With the starting of school just around the corner, the teachers at Bovina Elementary School have provided a list of school supplies that your child will need by the first day of school.

Kindergarten--eight crayons (not jumbo size), one Elmer's school glue, one pair safety scissors, one water colors, one box of Kleenex, two pencils, one folder with pockets, small rug or towel for rest time (No plastic mats please!). Please label each article with child's name.

First Grade--two pencils #2 lead; 16 crayons, scissors (sharp pointed); Elmer's school glue; pencil box; back-pack, satchel or book bag; Prang water colors; kleenex (large box).

Second Grade--notebook paper (wide-ruled not college ruled); two pocket folders; two pencils (regular #2 lead); crayons (at least 16); Elmer's school glue (large

bottle); eraser; kleenex (large box); scissors (sharp-pointed); ruler (inches and CM or MM); school box (small); one spiral notebook (three subject); index cards-lined (3x5); file box for cards; index divider cards (ABC). If you have any of these supplies left from last year, please use them.

Third Grade--pointed scissors; crayons; Prang or Crayola brand watercolors; Elmer's school glue (small bottle); one eraser; two pencils; two red pens; notebook paper (NOT college ruled); one wide-line spiral notebook; one stenographer's notebook; one box kleenex (small box); one bar of soap. If you have any of the above items left from last year please use them.

Fourth Grade--notebook paper (wide-ruled); four spiral notebooks (70 page) (Only one if you are in Mrs. Deen's class); 12 pencils (#2 lead); map colors; crayons (No crayons if you are in Mrs. Deen's class); scissors (sharp pointed) (No scissors if you are in Mrs. Deen's class); Elmer's school glue; ruler (12 inches); kleenex; two folders with pockets (No folders if you are in Mrs. Deen's class); eraser; one 3-ring binder for Mrs. Deen's class.

Fifth Grade--six pencils; two pens (blue or black); two pens (red); crayons; Elmer's school glue; one 12-inch ruler (with metric and standard); scissors (sharp-pointed); kleenex (large box); markers; three spiral notebooks; three folders with pockets; notebook paper (wide-ruled); one school box; map colors (eight or more); eraser; one roll scotch tape (transparent); one compass; one protractor; three pkgs. of 3x5 index cards.

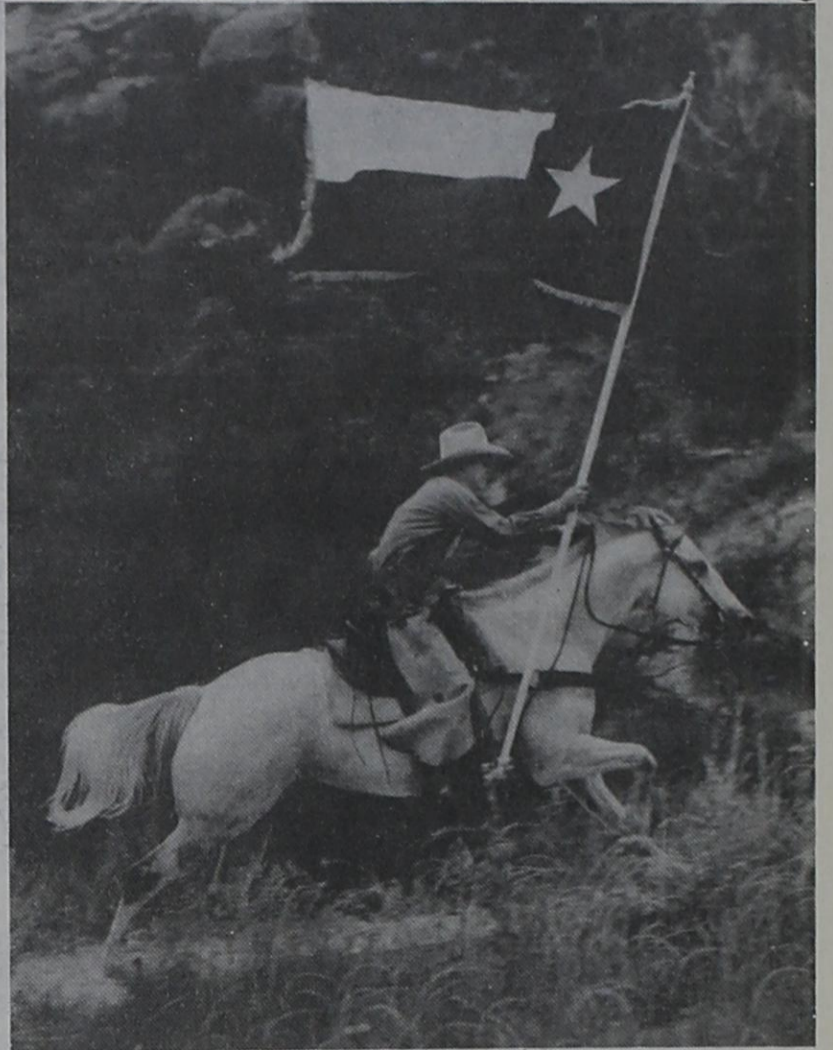
C. R. Brandon, 73, of Kingston, Oklahoma died Monday, August 1, 11:45 p.m. at Kingston, Oklahoma.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church in Crossroads, Oklahoma and graveside services were held at Matador on Friday.

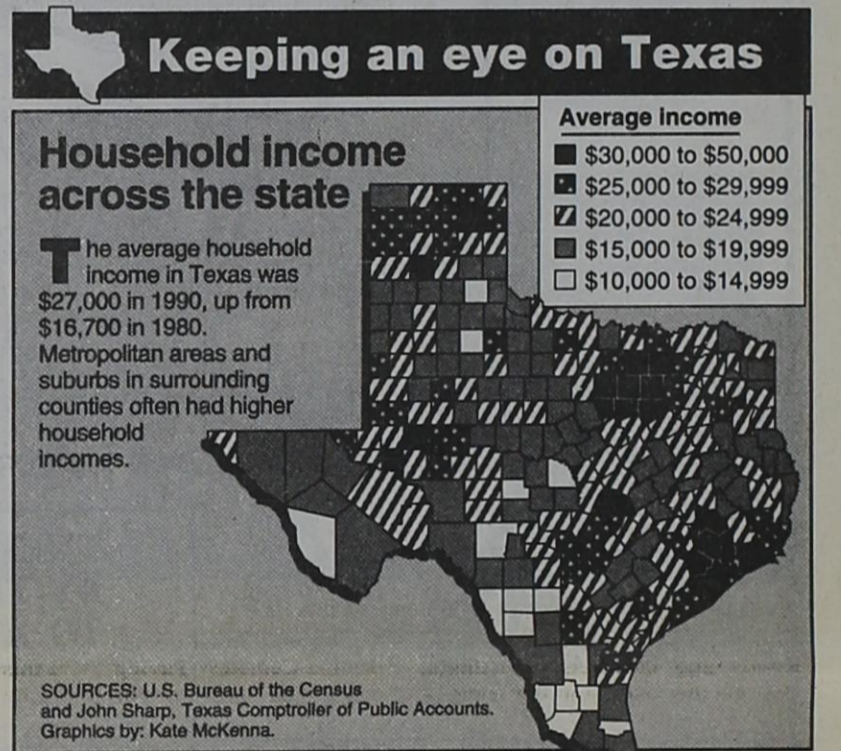
Brandon was a former resident of Bovina and moved away about thirty years ago.

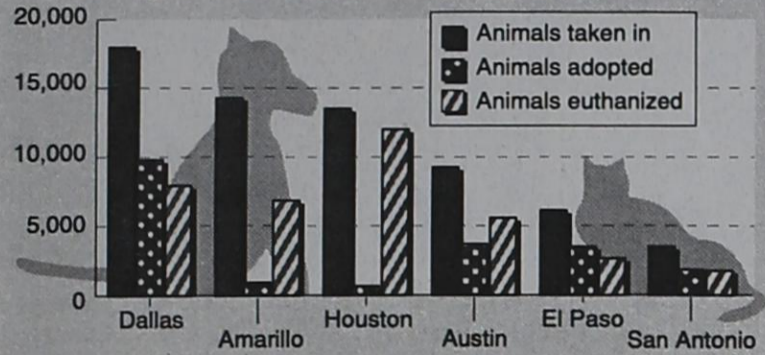

Our first recipe this week, "Golden Potato Soup," was submitted for the Schlenker Family Favorite Recipes by Connie Schlenker Johnson, daughter of Carl and Velma Schueler Schlenker and a teacher in the local school system.

She and her husband, Joe Bob Johnson, and daughters, Mendy, Abby and Joni, live on a farm northeast of town. Connie's maternal grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schueler, were pioneer residents of the Rhea community.

GOLDEN POTATO SOUP

- 5 cups chopped potatoes
- 1 cup carrot slices
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1 chicken bouillon cube
- 4 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 lb. Velveeta cheese, cubed

Combine first six ingredients. Cover and simmer until mushy. Remove from heat and mash. Add milk until you get desired consistency.

Put flour and a little milk in a shaker and shake until well blended. Add to soup mixture. Cook on medium heat until thickened watching carefully. Add Velveeta and stir until it is melted.

SWISS TUNA GRILL

- Nan Burns
- 1-6 1/2 or 7 ounce can tuna, drained
- 1/2 cup shredded process Swiss cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- Dash of pepper

Combine ingredients and make into 8 rye bread sandwiches. Spread butter on outsides and grill approximately 3 minutes per side or until mixture is heated.

BEA'S HOT MUSTARD SAUCE

- Bula Schlenker Hopkins
- Mix and refrigerate overnight four ounces Coleman's mustard and 1 cup cider vinegar.
- Mix in double boiler: 2 beaten eggs and 1 cup sugar.
- Add mustard mixture and cook over hot water until slightly thick, stirring or beating frequently.

- 2 egg yolks stiffly beaten

Mix above ingredients and boil 1 minute. Remove from stove and add 3 tablespoons pineapple juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and 1/8 teaspoon salt.

Spear pineapple, bananas, apples, oranges, grapes and strawberries cut in bite size pieces. Use above sauce for dip.

Separate and roll dough into squares and roll flat. Place strips of bacon on dough lengthwise, side by side. Roll up tightly--jelly roll fashion. Chill several hours or overnight.

Slice thin and place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes.

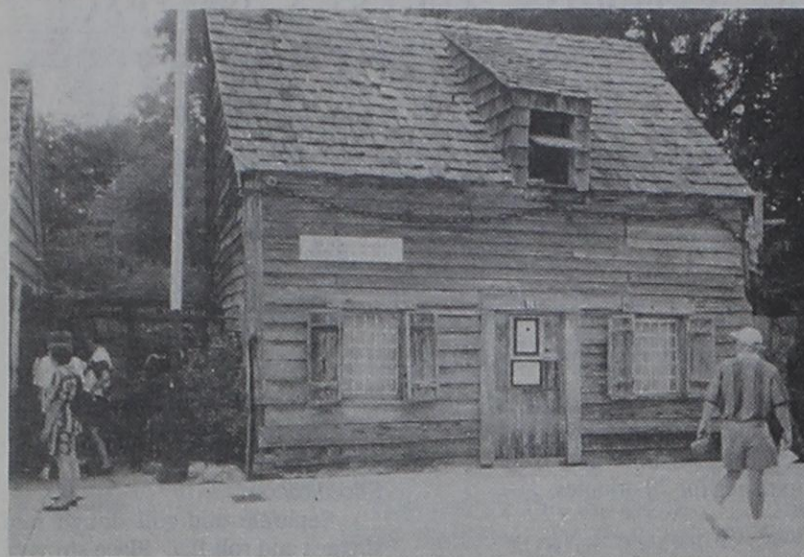

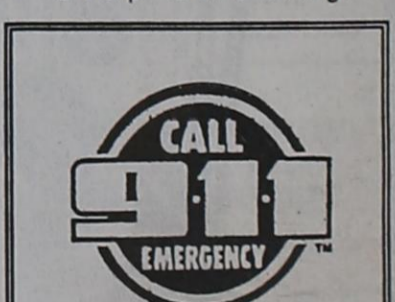
