

There is, of course, a class of publicity that is worthy, and which newspaper publishers are always glad to aid in placing before the public. That publicity deals with public matters, the aiding of the schools and churches, the fight for

better things in the community and in the state and a great variety of what we call "drives" in the interest of the public. And, after all, in the matters there is public interest and that makes them not only good publicity but real news.

The average newspaper gets requests every day for as much space, free of charge, for all sorts of propaganda, as the newspaper has in its columns, for both news, features and advertising.

Sometimes the line between news and publicity is very dim. but there is always a clear, distinct line between publicity and advertising-the clink of the vanished silver dollar or the rustle of a check or Uncle Sam's paper monen.-Roswell Record.

Red and Gold Salad Drain contents of one No. 2 can grapefruit sections from juice; marinate sections in French dressing to which maraschino juice has been added. Arrange on salad greens and sprinkle with finely chopped maraschino cherries.

#### French Dressing

One-half cup canned grapefruit juice; 6 tbsps. fat; 11/2 teasp. sugar; 1/2 teasp. salt; 1/4 teasp. paprika.

Combine ingredients in fruit jar in order given; cover tightly; shake well before serving. Makes % cup dressing.

Banana Ice Cream

Two cups mashed ripe bananas (5 to 6); 1½ tbsps. lemon juice; 1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 teasp. salt; 2 eggs, beaten; 1 cup milk; 11/2 teasps. vanilla; 1 pint cream (whipping or coffee.)

Use ripe bananas - yellow peel flecked with brown. Mix together bananas, lemon juice and sugar. Add salt, eggs, milk and vanilla. Stir in cream. Freeze, using 8 parts ice to 1 quart ice cream salt. Makes about 2 quarts.

Brazil Nut Ice Box Cookies

Two cups flour; 2 teasps. phosphate baking powder; 1/2 teasp. salt; ½ cup butter; 1¼ cups brown sugar, firmly packed; 1 egg, well beaten; 1 cup chopped Brazil nuts; 2½ teasps. vanilla.

Sift flour, measure, add baking owder, salt and sift again. Cream butter; add sugar gradually, and cream well. Add egg, Brazil nuts and vanilla. Add flour gradually, mixing well. Shape into rolls 11/2 inches in diameter; roll in waxed paper. Chill until firm. Cut in -inch slices; bake on ungreased sheet in hot oven (425° F.) about 5 minutes. Six dozen cookies.

#### Sardine Brownies

Drain smoked Norwegian sardines from oil. Chop and mix with lemon juice and small amount of mayonnaise. Cut Boston brown bread into rounds with cookie cutter. Place slice of cucumber on each round and put chopped sardine mixture on top.




