## Coach Scroggins Kerby's Salutatory Address To The BHS Class of 2001


(Tyson Kerby, son of Susan and Al Kerby, Jr., was the 2001 salutatorian of Bovina High School. Here is the text of Tyson's commencement speech to his classmates, friends and family.)


Whether it is wealth and riches or simply a wife and kids, we will all be happy. Now, don't get me wrong though, in ten years I just




A fire in a trash barrel apparently was the cause of the fire that destroyed a barn on the Fangman farm northeast of Friona.



#### **Bull Town Bulletins** By Bill Ellis

SINCE OUR READERS drive a lot-many drive a lot of miles every day, others not-somany miles, in most cases they drive alongside a BNSF Railroad. We came across some amazing information that may answer a lot of questions which had welled-up in your minds. The U.S. Standard railroad gauge (distance

between the rails) is four feet, 8.5 inches. That's an exceedingly odd number. Why was that unusual measurement used? --Because that's the way they built the railroads in England, and the U.S. railroads were first built by English emigres stolen away from the Motherland to assist the early railroad builders.

Why did the English people build their railroads with this unusual space between the rails? Because the first rail lines were built by the same people who built the pre-railroad tramways, and that was the gauge they used.

Why did "they" use that gauge? Because the people who built the tramways used the same jigs and tools that they used for building wagons, which used that particular wheel

other spacing, the wagons would break on above. some of the old, long distance roads, because that's the spacing of the old wheel ruts.

by Imperial Rome for the benefit of their legions. The roads have been used ever since. And the ruts? The initial ruts, which everyone else had to match for fear of destroying their wagons, were first made by Roman war chariots.

standard railroad gauge of four feet, 8.5 inches comes from the original specifications for a Roman war chariot. Specs and bureaucracies live forever!

An interesting twist to our story: The 4 feet 8.5 inches was derived by the Romans so their chariots were made to be just wide enough to accommodate the back ends of two war horses.

In recent years, a plant in Utah was designing solid rocket boosters (SRBs) for our country's space shuttles. The designers would have made the boosters "fatter," but they had to be shipped by train through a tunnel that was just a tad wider than two horses' behinds.

Thus, a major design feature of what is arguably the world's most advanced transportation was determined by the width of a horse's behind.

Experts tell us that when the pioneer traders and trappers began exploring the American wilderness, they used some of the same trails that the Indians had been using for years. The Indians had in many cases followed some trails made by animals, in search of water or food.



He was a Bataan Death March survivor. For those of you not familiar with Bataan, in WWII a group of soldiers from our neighboring state, New Mexico, made up the 142nd National Guard. They ended up going to war with very little training.

The battalion was captured and forced to march the length of the island. When the march was over nearly one half died, the others were badly dehydrated and in need of medical attention. Twenty-seven percent of the POWs died in Japanese camps. They spent almost the entire four years of the war in terrible conditions. I was fortunate, on the

night before Thanksgiving, to meet Tom McKay. He was in the 142nd National Guard and survived the Bataan Death March.

Tom told me stories of being a cowboy in Bovina where he grew up. We talked about many things. I finally got enough courage to mention that I noticed the Purple Heart medal and asked him about the Bataan Death March.

Like other survivors, all Tom would say is I was just doing my job. I told him what an honor it was to have met him and asked if he had written anything about his military experience for his children and grandchildren to read after he was gone.

He indeed had and it was published in a book. Try as I might to get him to, he never would talk about the events of the war. When it came time to leave, all I could think about was without men like Tom, we wouldn't be living in the greatest country

in the world. In a very weak effort on my part, I shook his worn old hand and told him, 'I'm sure you have been told this before but on behalf of my generation and my children's generation, I want to thank you and your generation for our freedom and making America and the world a safe place for democracy."

Every day there are people in our lives that make a big difference. Every day you make a difference whether you know it or not. Tom is an everyday person that because of extraordinary circumstances has become a hero in my eyes. These people are everywhere. Thank everyone around

you who has made a difference. Some of you seniors sent a thank you letter to one of your teachers. It was very special to each and every one of the recipients. They don't always get the credit they deserve but each letter was very special.

Thank you for the thoughtful letters.

In conclusion, thank those who have helped you. Try to help others less fortunate. Be proud of who you are. Go out into the world with your head high and your expectations higher. Thank you."

With their long hair, peace beads, bandanas and backpacks, they sat around on the sidewalks and in the doorways. As you walked along the street, braless girls in dirty t-shirts would panhandle for money.

"Sir, do you happen to have any spare change?" Those words and those hippies drove Henry nuts. If he was walking along and a couple of hippies were strolling ahead of him, he would use his briefcase as a battering ram as he busted

through between them.

He climbed the Delta ladder. Through hard work and toeing the Delta line, he became district, then regional, sales manager. Delta moved

him around to other cities, then back to Dallas. The friend that called me, Susan, was his secretary at one time.

We were a close knit group of thirty-somethings back then, full of ambition, ideas and devil-may-care attitudes. No matter which airline or travel agency you worked for, friendship came

In 1997, when I went back home to Hillsboro for my 40th class reunion, me and Albin Podsednik and Coach Dewitt thought of Duck Owens. Nobody knew where he was at the time.

Duck was a big, dumb, lug of a guy. Our senior year, me and Bobby and Albin and Joe and Duck were the starting lineup for the Hillsboro Eagles.

Duck came from a poor family. He never seemed to have much. I don't remember him ever having a car. He had a goofy laugh and it took him longer to learn a play than the rest of us.

Coach would throw the ball to Duck suddenly and hit him in the stomach with it before Duck's hands reacted. He was about 6' 3". In 1957, that was pretty tall.

I don't believe I ever saw

Duck again after we graduated. His obituary said he died in a Stephenville nursing home at the age of 63. The survivor list did not include a wife or kids. It said he spent most of his life in

the trucking industry.

The past may be gone for now, but don't worry. It'll always be right back.

I am happy here at the home, but it is hard giving up all of your personal things (especially your car).


