## Adds Value to Diamonds

Diamonds can be engraved in a very artistic manner. This development of the diamond cutting art brings int existence a new class of jewelry, for which a considerable demand is ex pected. It was long believed that the diamond could not be engraved with safe or satisfactory results. A few stones roughly engraved were foun in ?ndia, and a diamond was exhibited
at the Paris Exposition in 1878 on at the Paris Exposition in 1878 on
which a portrait of the king of Hol land was scratched. But the work was mperfect and the stones were rather depolished than engraved. Some of the linest specimens of engraving on diantonds are the work of M. Bordinet a Paris jeweler. One is a scarfpin bladds is a slender diamond and the hanifle a ruby. ## Terrible Cost of War

There can be no doubt that the ghastly carnage at Sha-ho river has excited a general feeling of horror excited a general feeling of horror
throughout the civilized world. Not only has the slaughter been carried out on a scale unknown to living man but all this hideous butchery has led to absolutely nothing. After days and nights of unceasing and unrelenting fighting the Japanese, we are told, have pushed the Russian army fifteen miles further to the north. Is it surprising that people should be asking what is the good of it? The advance of fifteen miles in a measureless continent has been purchased by a sacrifice of some 30,000 men on the part of the victors and of the loss of an even larger number of men by the Russions. War of this sort, offering as it does a prospect of indefinite bloodshed so long as a Japanese force can be mustered against a Russian one, presents a spectacle which even to the most indifferent and case-hardened must be intolerable. The loss of life and the torrent of human agony would be bad enough in any case, but in the present war they stand out with a gloom

Governor Otero has sent a very strong message to the legislature, and advises that body to do many things, some of which is good. some bad and a part unnecessary.
A revision of election laws suggested may be classed as good.

A law punishing bribery will be good.
Grammar and high schools for rural districts unnecessary.
Straight salaries for county officers: doubtful, possibly good. Exclusion of lobbyists-good. A territorial investigation board: unnecessary; may be bad. Greater powers granted to the board of equalization and traveling auditor-they have too many powers now.

Treasurers and ex-officio Collectors be compelled to deposit public funds in authorized banks to draw not less than three per cent interest-good.

A libel law-alright, if drawn right.
Law regulating the sale of patent medicines-unnecessary; for people must have some nostrums.

Revision of road laws-for God's sake, yes; and at once.

Appropriation to complete the scenic road-the vilest of the vile.
Law requiring druggists to keep register of poisons sold-good.

Liberal appropiration for his torical society-bad.

That portraits of former gov ernors be placed in capital rotunda and halls. This might not be objectionable, if the present governor is permitted to write Ex before his name before the law takes effect.

An ppropriation not to exceed $\$ 2,500.00$ for the a pprehension of the assassins of Col. Francisco Chavez. Cut it in half-that amount might convict an innocent man.

Ranger force: questionablepossibly a good recommendation.
Revision of assessment and taxation law-good,
Passage of new jury law: good -very good, if we don't get a worse one than we have.

## PLAN FOR CATTLE BARM

Gives Accommodation for Forty Cows and Twenty Calves.
Sub.-Will you kindly give me a plan for a cattle barn for forty cowe and twenty calves, with three or four ox stalls. I have a bank on the nort I should like a feet high, from which ment (which I propose to be of base ment (which I propose to be of stone) running from east to west. I want a room below it for preparing food. The cheapest way to supply water to The cattle in the stalls. I supply water to the cattle in the stalls. I intend sinkin mill.

The plan shown provides 39 single cow stalls, 14 calf stalls and 4 box stalls, with feed room under the granary. For cleaning the cow stables there is a passage nine feet wide be tween each row of cattle running the full length of basement so that a cart or boat may be driven through and manure taken out. The barn (begin ning at the east) consists of a 16 -foot

bent, then a 14 , a 12 -foot driveway then two 14 -feet bents, making 70 fee in all. There should be an overshoo six feet on the east side of drive way in the barn to give room for eam to pass under if there should be loaded wagos on the drive floor. If desired a window in any of the feed alleys at the west end of barn may be made into a door to get into the base
By having a large tank kept full of water and another small one connect d with it, and the water trough in ront of the cattle, the animals will always have a continuous supply of water. The small tank is so arranged with a float that as the cattle drink he water in the trough the water in he small tank is lowered. This causes the float to fall, opening the alve and allowing the water to come in from the large tank. As the wate ises in the small tank it also raise he float which shuts off the wate rom the large tank. The water in the troughs in front of cattle is there ore always kept at an even height The water troughs are put in front of mangers, and can be arranged so as to have a lid on hinges at one side of manger which the cattle will learn to lift when they wish to drink. Tho li
will drop back of its own accord.
