YAQUIS ON THE WARPATH
From the state of Sonora, Mexico, comes a harrowing tale of butchery of a four Americans and one Mexican, by a band of Yaqui Indians, on the 19 th inst
The party of Americans was returning from the interior, where they had gone to examine some mining property, and were am bushed by the Yaquis. Six Americans and two Mexican drivers constituted the party, and only two of the Americans and one driver escaped.

"The two survivors, accompanying the bodies of the four victims of the Yaqui massacre, passed through El Paso last night (22nd) and tell a most thrilling story of escape.
"The Indians have asserted that unless they are freed from the persecution of the state officials they will murder every man in the province."

## Oldest Hotel in Europe

The Goldenes kreuz (Golden Cross) at Regensburg (Ratisbon), in Bavaria is the oldest hotel in Europe. King Ferdinand I. halted at it on his way to his coronation in 1531, and no other hotel in Europe possesses records of such great antiquity as the Golden Cross at Ratisbon does or can boast of having had so many royal visitors as have enjoyed its hospitality.
The existing visitors' books, which date from 1819, contain the names of more than 500 imperial, royal and princely personages. The room Bismarck, at that time Prussian minister, slept when he came with his sovereign to hold the conference wnich was the last attempt to prevent war between Austria and Prussia. The negotiations were held in the "small hall" of the hotel, under the preaidency of King William of Prussia.
The host is equally proud of the autographs of Schiller and other men of letters which he possesses. The auwords, "Und eine Heimath ist es" ("It is indeed a home"), in memory of his stay there and no landlord could wish for a better advertisement.

The near approach to death of the baby was witnessed by Policeman Kersten and several others, but it a happened so quickly that no one but the dog was able to do a thing toward saving the life of the little fellow. Mr. Corwin is a miner and has lived in Berkeley several years.

## Dog Nurses Polar Bear Cubs.

 The two polar bear cubs which were born at the Buffalo "zoo" a short time Crandall has obtained a foster-mother for them in a female Irish setter.The dog nurses the cubs, and her milk appears to agree with them. The dog, however, does not yet mother the little ones. That is, while she permits them to nurse she does not cuddle them and protect them with her body from the cold. It is, therefore, necessary to keep them in a large box, cotton lined and filled with hot water bags. For this reason it is necessary to keep a constant watch upon them to see that they do not become ill or die from exposure.
"I am in hopes that the dog will soon mother them," said Mr. Crandall. "When she does, it will not be necessary to watch them constantly, as the warmth of the dog's body will be all the protection they need from the weather.'
The mother bear gave birth to three cubs, but before they could be taken from her she ate one of her offspring. This is the trouble that curators of all zoos have in raising young bears.

## California Salt Farm

One of the strangest of farms in the country, if not in the whole world, is situated in southern California, 205 feet below the level of the sea. The place is known as Salton. It is a salt farm of about 1,000 acres. Here the salt lies, as deposited by nature from The salt to sixteen inches in deptb. this crop the year round; and, though the harvest has continued for twenty years, during which time more than 40,000 tons of salt has been harveste only ten of the 1,000 acres of the farm have been touched.
The salt is first plowed up into furrows; it is then thrown into conical piles by men with barrows, after works near by, and put into marketworks near by, and put into marketable condition. The work is done by Mexicans and chinamen, the intense heat being more than the white man can endure.

World's Greatest Hen Farm.
What is said to be the largest egg farm in the world is owned and man aged by C. E. L. Hayward, at Han cock, N. H., says the Philadelphia North American. It has now over 8,040 hens, kept in 600 small houses, fourteen in each
The hens are never allowed outside their eight-foot-square coops and are never fed green feed, contrary to the teachings of all other poultry keepers. Each hen gets about a quarter of a pound per day of beef scraps, gluten hominy feed, wheat, etc., with a little salt, ground shells, grit and charcoal and plenty of clear water. They average 100 eggs each during the year, for which the high average of twenty-six cents a dozen is received, or a total feed $\$ 2.17$. It costs about $\$ 1.17$ each for feed, so that the profit on each hen is about $\$ 1$. Only young hens are
kept, the second year they are sold and pullets are bought for the next year's egg crop.

## ABCOUT THE LONDON "CABBY."

Hig Works Fourteen Hours a Day and Gets About Five E'hillings Pay.
There are in London 2,711 cab proprietors, and of these 2,224 own fewer than five vehicles, says a writer in Outing. As you see, it is a poor man's industry.

The average price for hiring a cab is 12 shillings and 3 pence a day. In addition the cabman has to pay the yard fees. He gets two horses a day and is usually fourteen hours on the box. His license costs him five shillings a year. The tax of $£ 2$ on the cab and the 15 -shilling wheel duty are paid by the owner. Taking it day in and day out, the cabby makes about 5 shillings a day. In the season he may take in more money, but as the hire is raised on him it comes to the same thing. If he is not contentand there is no reason why he should be-he does not grumble unduly.

Every day in London 120,000 people ride in cabs. Of course there is friction and there is a deal of noisy quarreling over fares, but so far as my ex perience goes the cabby is usually right in his estimate of the distances he has traveled and the money that is due him.
The cab horses are a good lot. They are worked six hours a day on an average. About three years in a hansom, however, will do up the best of

Ex-President Cleveland, during his sojourn in New Hampshire the last summer, attended divine service in a chapel unique on an island in picturesque Lake Asquam.
Eighteen or twenty years ago Ern est Balch, who was then a student at Harvard college, conceived the idea of a summer athletic school for boys, and chose the island lentioned as the location. "Camp Chocorua" was there established, and had a very successful existence for a decade, being the pioneer of the large number of such schools now in existence.

A custom has sprung up among th summer residents of the central por tion of Lake Asquam region of gather ing every pleasant Sunday morning a this open-air auditorium for divin worship. From cottage, camp and ho tel about the shores boats put out with their freights of worshipers, a bound for one common goal-the nat ural sanctuary.
It was in one of these rustic seats that ex-President Cleveland sat as one of the band of worshipers on a cer tain charming Sabbath morning last August. Mr. Cleveland was at the time the guest over Sunday of Col J. H. Coit of Concord, N. H., at the camp of the latter on an island in Lake Asquam, and accepted an invi tation to rejoin the members of th camp in their novel church attend ance.

Little silver herrings and golden-hued young salmon drift about like clouds young the moon and on all sides, against the rocks that vary the surface of the tanks, wave the exquisite fringes of the sea anemones. Here, above all is the supreme beauty of the water world.
Every variety of fringe and flowercup is mimicked here in hues that fairly rival the roses of the garden. Purest white, soft creamy yellow, rich salmon color, every shade of tender ple and vivid green spring from these rocks a living flower, with petals as delicate as they are deadly. For these beautiful fringes and ethereal-looking bubbles of color are so many murderous arms outstretched for food. As we -watch them swaying gently in the current, a poor little transparent shrimp comes paddling swiftly by.
