He also begs to inform his old friends that although deprived of the office of a notary public, he continues as usual to execute instruments of writing of all kinds with neatness, accuracy and despatch; and respectfully solicits a continuance of former favors. Translations from Spanish and French to English, promptly attended to.

THE CROPS--

We have conversed with a gentleman recently from Red River above the Raft, who gives cheering intelligence respecting the cotton and other crops in those sections of the country, both in Texas and Arkansas, where there have been no late rains or storms, and a more favorable season has never been known. The crops in eastern Texas are uninjured and the hopes of the planters most gladdening.

We wish we could say the same about the cotton crop of this Parish, we fear it is much injured by the rot.

Texas cotton begins slowly to arrive, and our merchants are on the qui vive for a large and profitable business this season. Natchitoches after this will be a "place."

WARTS--

These troublesome and often painful excrescences, covering the hands sometimes to the number of a hundred or two, may be destroyed by a simple, safe, and certain application. The writer discovered it accidentally, while performing some chemical experiments with soda. The matter is merely to dissolve as much common washing soda as the water will take up,--then wash the hands or warts with this for a minute or two, and allow them to dry with out being wiped. This repeated two or three days, will gradually destroy the most irritable wart. Its theory appears to be that of warts having a lower power of vitality than the skin, so that the alkali is sufficient to produce the disorganization of the former with out affecting the later. The warts never return.

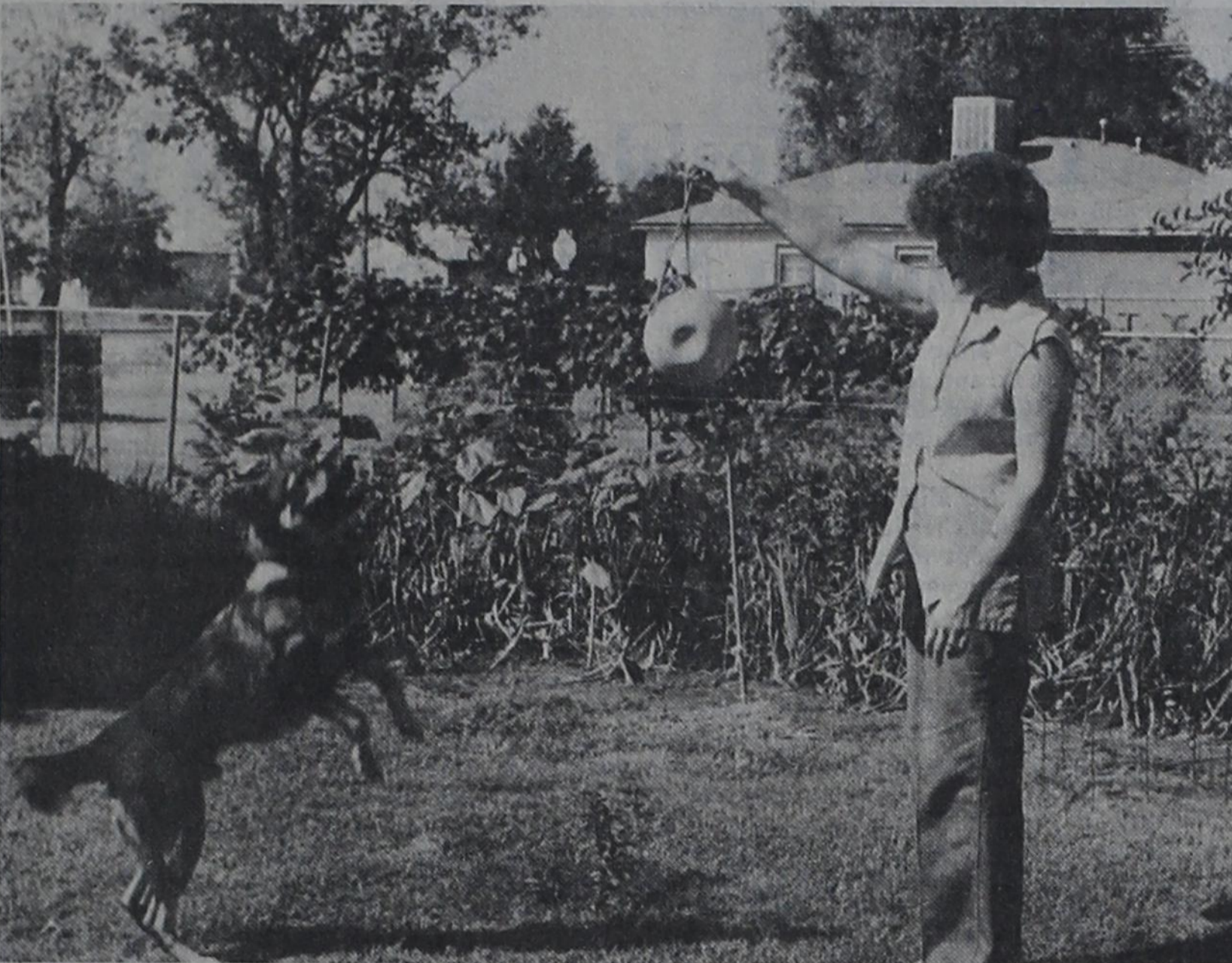
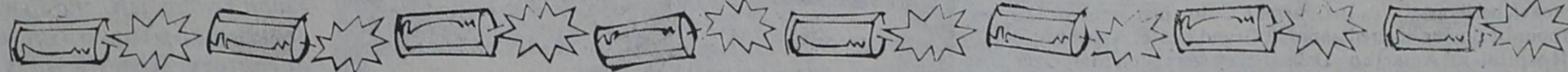
MONUMENT

The public are respectfully informed that subscription lists for the purchase and donation to the Republic, of this work of art, executed by Mr. Nangle, and dedicated to the memory of those who fell in the cause of Liberty and Texas at the ever memorable siege of the Alamo, are now open at the War Department, by Mr. Oliver, Chief Clerk of said Department, who has been appointed Treasurer; also at the store of Mr. McDonald, at the Austin City Gazette office, and at the store occupied by Mr. Nangle, where the Monument can be seen.

The monument is formed entirely out of the Alamo Stone, and is ornamented with

Court Has Good Rainfall Session Received Mon.

Mostly routine items were on the agenda for the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting June 10.

Bernard Gowens of Brown, Graham, & Co. met with the court to present the audit report on the county's books for 1984. A motion was approved to accept the report, and pay the auditor's invoice.

Motion was passed to renew the county's liability insurance with Ethridge-Spring Agency of Friona.

Payment of the county's foster child boarding care bills, in the amount of \$1,519 was approved. This money will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

District Clerk Marjorie Watkins met with the court to discuss the part-time helper for her office. A motion was passed for the clerk's helper to work four days a week instead of three.

An indigent citizen met with the court asking for help on medicine bills. After considerable discussion, no action was taken.

Motion was passed to hire Mack Heald to spray the trees on the courthouse lawn for worms and beetles.

A representative of Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas met with the court to explain the company's new insurance proposal. A motion was approved to tentatively approve the plan,

The Bovina area received some nice rain Monday night of this week, with reports all the way from a half inch to two and two-thirds inches between Bovina and Hub.

The heaviest report, of two and two-thirds inches, came from Ben Rejino, who farms west of the Hub intersection. William Gromowsky, whose farm is in the same area, said he received 1.5 inches.

Another report from the Hub area indicated that about a mile south of that intersection, a total of three inches of rain were received. Bovina proper received only about a half inch of rain, and Keith Garner said that he received "just a sprinkle" at his place. Raymond Schueler in the Rhea community said the Monday rain missed them

completely at Rhea.

Apparently the rain "made up" around Bovina, and was heavier as you went south and eastward. The official measurement in Friona from the evening amounted to 1.12 inches.

The area's wheat harvest is virtually completed, and the summer row crops were needing moisture for the most part. Forecasters were calling for another "slight chance" for thundershowers Tuesday evening.

The only indication of hail from Monday's thunderstorm was by Rejino, who said he understood that some hail fell just south of them, and that the Running Water Draw area received even more than the 2.66 inches he measured.

SCS Sets Field Day

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service will sponsor a field day to demonstrate different types of tillage equipment.

The field day will start at 9 a.m. on July 16, at the Hewitt Estate, Section 24, six miles southwest of Friona and five miles northeast of Bovina on Highway 60.

Several different types of equipment will be used to till wheat stubble and representatives will be on hand to answer your questions.

Former Resident's Husband Is Beaten

George Jackson of Lubbock was taken by ambulance to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock on Wednesday evening of last week when he stopped to help motorists, who, it turned out, were involved in a fight. Jackson also suffered injuries and was hospitalized for five days.

Jackson is Virgie Adams' son-in-law and is married to the former Martha Adams.

George and Martha were returning to their home last Wednesday night when they came upon a car parked on Indiana Avenue in Lubbock. They saw what they thought at first was an accident then realized three teenage boys, two Anglo and one Mexican-American, were beating a woman. It was learned later that the woman was the mother of one of the boys.

Jackson was able to stop the fighting and came back and got in his car. The lady and her husband

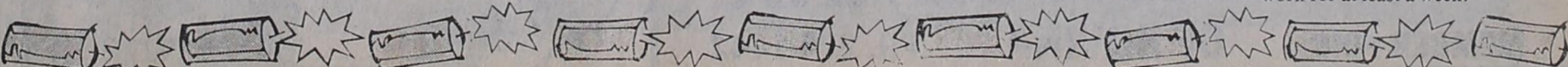
got in their car and drove possibly 50 yards and stopped. One of the Mexican-American youngsters would not get into his car and kept trying to cause trouble, according to Jackson.

When Jackson got out of his car to try to get the youth under control, the young man attacked him, hitting Jackson with a brief case filled with liquor bottles, breaking the bottles.

The youth then came at Jackson with one of the broken bottles, and was joined by the other two boys. The trio held Jackson down and began kicking him, continuing "until they were tired," according to his wife Martha.

Mrs. Jackson said she was told by her husband to stay in the car and keep the doors locked. She said there were people standing all around, but no one offered assistance. Jackson was taken to Methodist Hospital by an ambulance. He suffered a collapsed lung, cracked ribs and multiple bruises.

The young men were arrested. They ranged from 16 to 17 years of age. Martha said on Monday that her husband was released from the hospital Monday afternoon, but would not be able to return to work for at least a week.

Local Residents Assist In Building New Dormitory

El Rancho de los Ninos is an orphanage run by Bo and Jeanne Bartley, former Bovina residents. It is located at Flores, Guatemala, in the El Peten.
It is operated totally on donations from churches and individuals. They accept no help from the government of Guatemala.

On January 5, a group of ten people from the Farwell-Clovis area left for the Lubbock airport. The group left in the Farwell Baptist Church bus driven by Jerry Monk.

The group from this area included Herman Gerles, J.B. Taylor, Steven Compton-Amarillo Southlawn Baptist Church, John Rusk, Grady, Sally and Jerry Pierce, Janice Coffman, Dale Cook-Youth Director, Lewis Foster-Newlight Baptist Church and Ralph Franse.

The purpose of them going was to build a dormitory for 25 girls and a small clinic.

The group flew Southwestern Airlines to Houston. From there, they flew out on Pan Am to Guatemala by way of Miami. They left Miami and arrived at Guatemala City at 8 p.m.

The group spent the night at the Pan American Hotel. While there they met another group that had come from Las Cruces, New Mexico by way of Juarez, Mexico.

After a night's rest, they flew to Santa Elina and met Bo and Jeanne and headed to the ranch.

On Monday morning, J.B. Taylor was made crew foreman, as he had experience helping build the church two years ago. He gave the group their work schedules. Also, mechanics and a dentist, Dr. Sharon Carver from Las Cruces,

and two assistants were on hand. Dr. Craig from Floydada furnished the dental equipment.

On Friday, some of the group traveled to see the Mayan ruins. Ralph Franse said, "A few days before an unbroken pottery bowl was found."

On Saturday, they had a dedication of the dormitory. They celebrated with roasted pig which is cooked in the ground. Franse said it was fine, but probably needed to be cooked a little longer.

Franse said the main food of the country consists of tortillas, black-

beans, corn, bananas and fresh fruit.

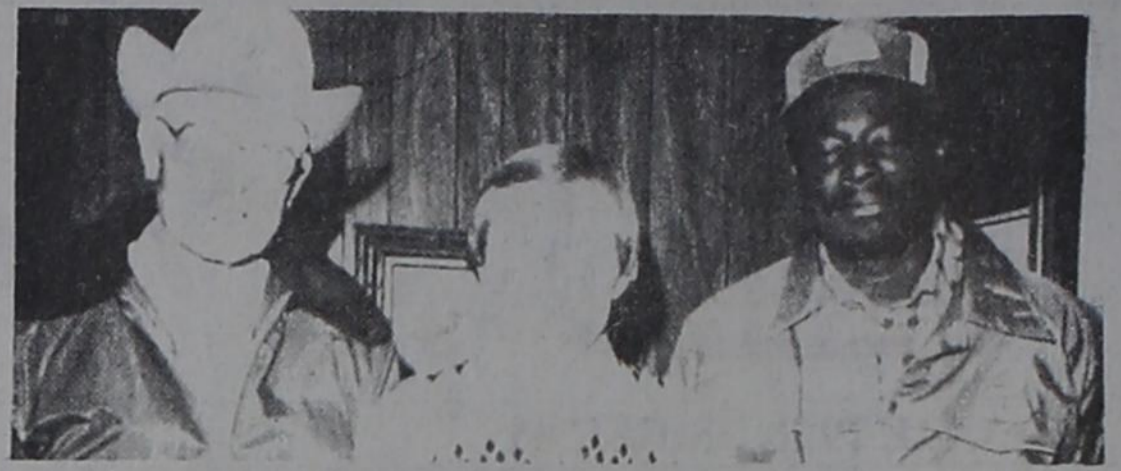
Franse has been to Guatemala five times, and said this was one of the better trips as the country was more stable.

This time next year, Franse said, plans are being made for building a cafeteria.

The group returned home January 14 at 2 a.m.

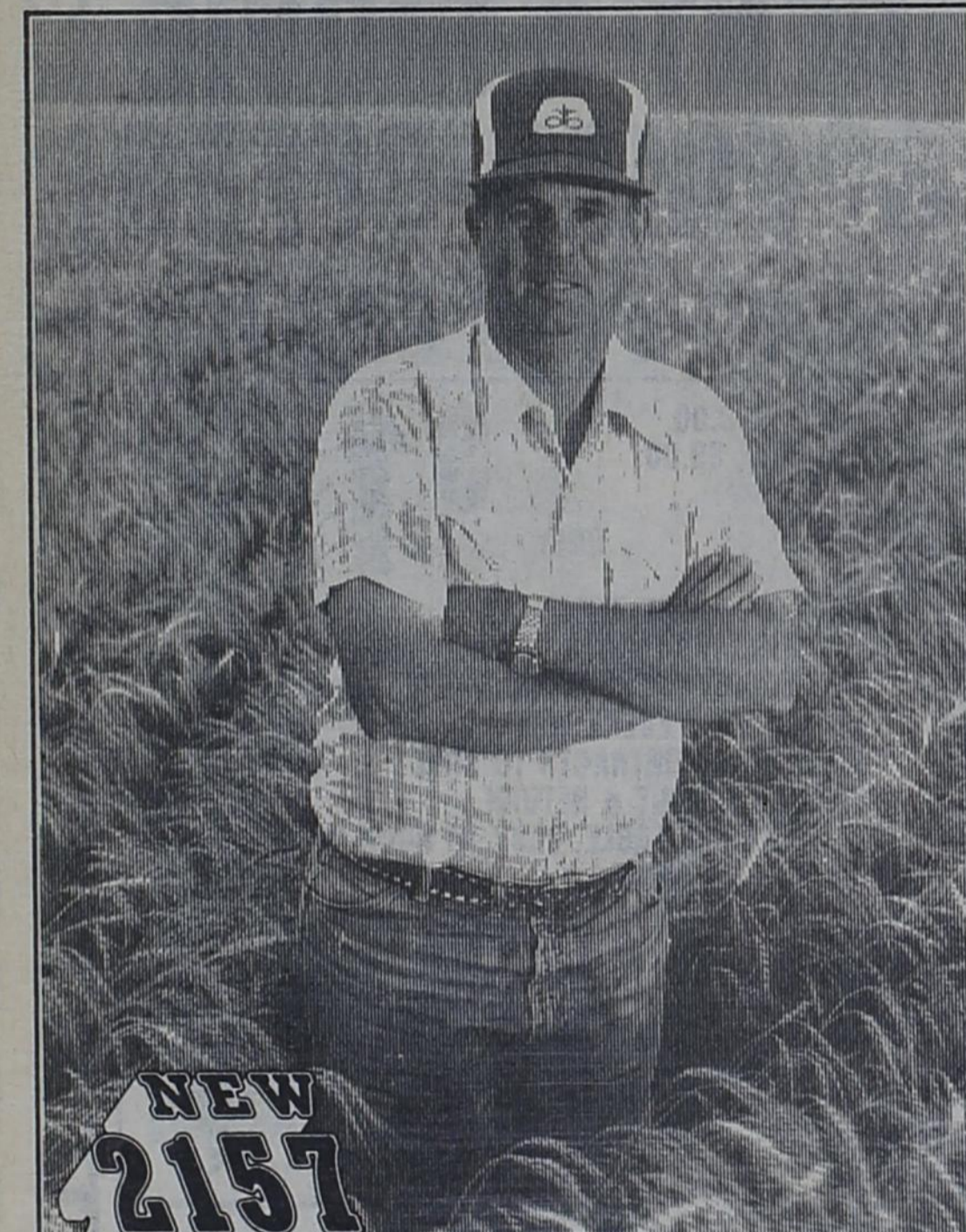

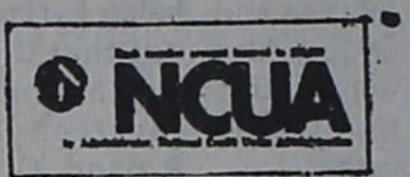

One other indictment was handed down by the Grand Jury on a charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, but the person is not in custody at this time.

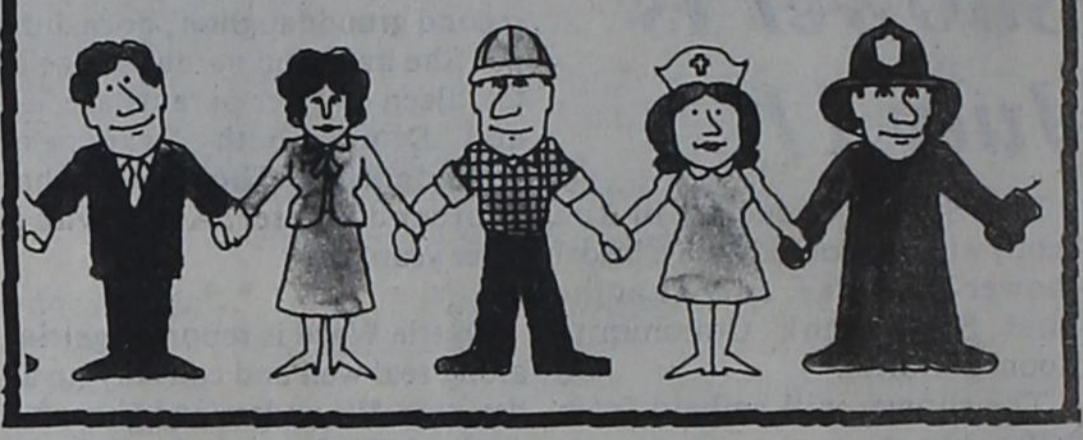

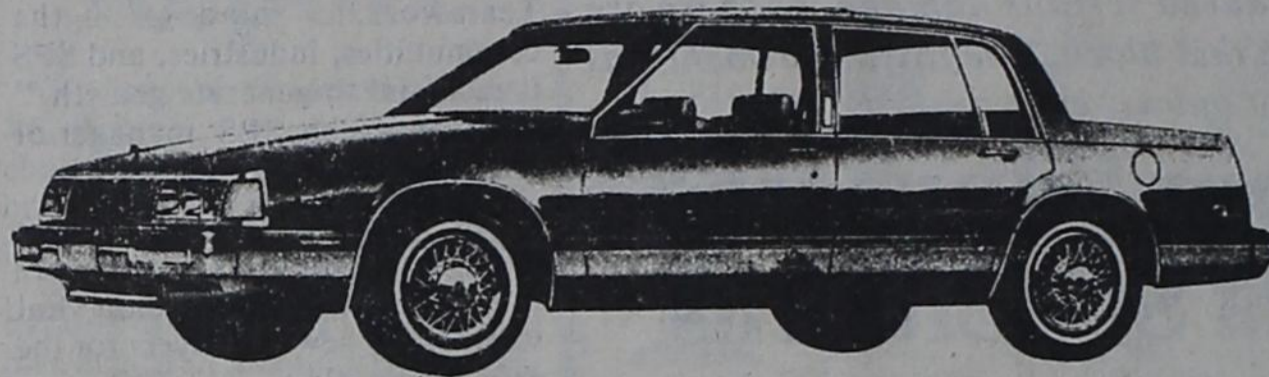

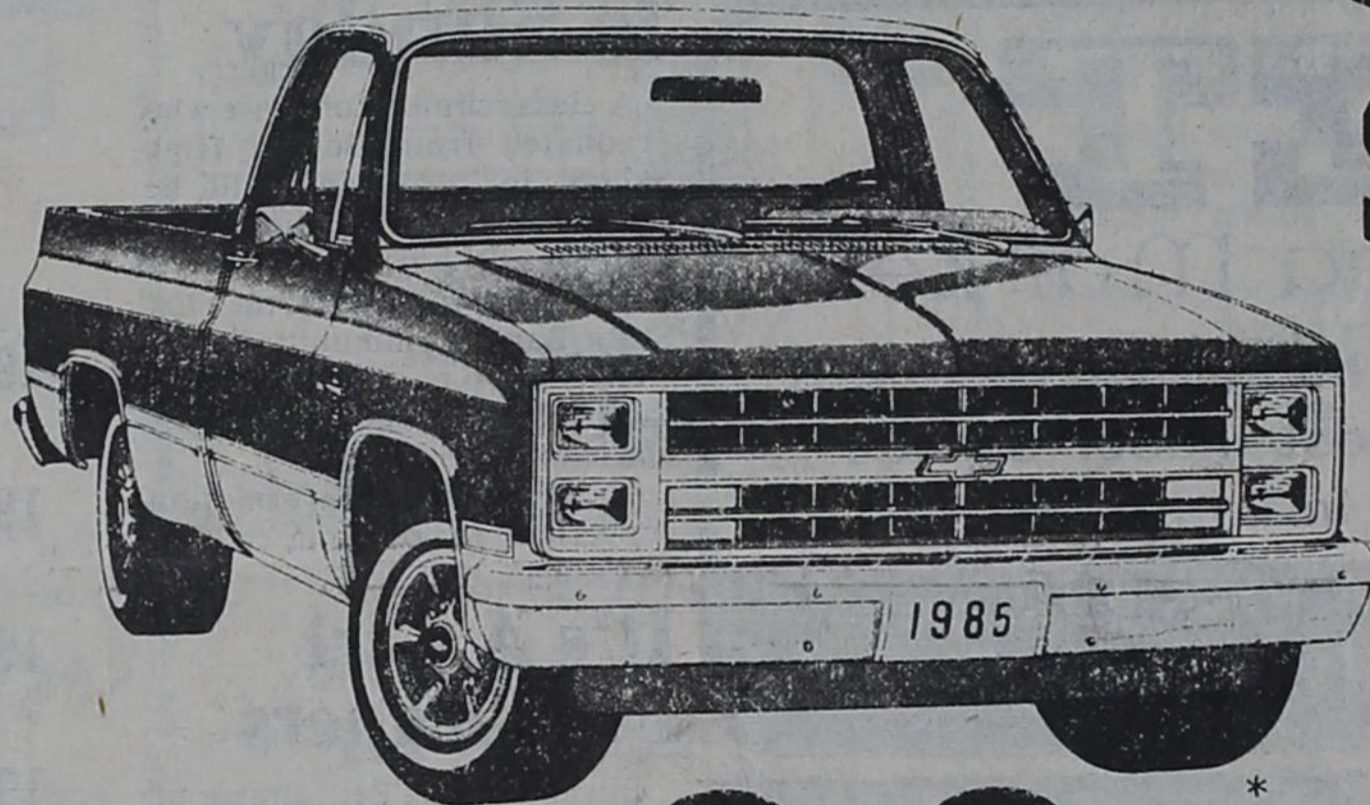
