## AIDS NATURE'S WORK

EFFECT OF ACETYLENE RAYS ON GROWTH OF PLANTS.

Grow to Twice Actual Weight of Those Exposed to Sunlight Only-Latest Victory for This New and Beautiful Illuminant.

The experiments recently made at Cornell University prove that the beautiful rays from the gas, acetylene. are as effective as sunlight on the growth of plants, and this may soon become a subject for serious consideration by all progressive cultivators of the soil.

The results of the experiments are astonishing, inasmuch as they show conclusively the great increase of growth attained by supplementing "The Light of Nature" with "The Light of Acetylene" during the hours in which the plants would otherwise be in darkness. For instance, a certain number of radish plants subjected to acetylene light during the night, grew to twice the actual weight of the same number of radishes given daylight only, all other conditions being equal. and peas had blossomed and partially matured pods with the help of acetylene light, while without the added light not even buds were apparent.

Acetylene is already taking its place as an illuminant for towns from a central plant, for lighting houses, churches, schools and isolated buildings of all kinds, and it is being used successfully for many other purposes.

A striking and important feature of acetylene is the ease and small expense with which it can be made available compared with the great advantages derived from its use. The machine in which the gas is generated is easily installed.

#### California Rattlesnakes.

Rattlesnakes in large numbers have been reported as infesting the hill slopes just behind the University of California grounds, and there is a belief that the record-breaking rattler that was killed a few months ago was the mother of this large brood of young snakes.

E. A. Bailey was almost stung by a rattler that attacked him while he was surveying on the hills yesterday. A few days ago a party of boys were found playing with a dead rattler just behind the Greek Theatre.—San Francisco Call.

#### Our Seven-League Boots.

With the Pennsylvania railroad's eighteen-hour train to Chicago actually making the run on its first test in sixteen hours, the possibilities of transcontinental travel burst upon one's imagination with startling force. Chicago is something less than 900 miles from New York City. San Francisco is 3,000 miles distant. Without reckoning that competition in speed making, the introduction and development of the electric motor for general railway purposes and the other factors hastening this country to newer and faster transportation performances will probably further cut down the running time between New York and Chicago, it is a very simple calculation to conclude that it is not either impossible or improbable that a special train, or perhaps one regularly scheduled, could cover the space between New York and San Francisco-roughly three times that between New York and Chicago-in three times the hours needed for the trip from here to Chicago, or forty-eight hours, or two days!

If the evolution of railway dashes across the continent is to be continued-and who can doubt that it willit is not a far flight of the imagination to picture the time when all the United States may be regarded as suburbs of New York City, with the commuter wending his daily way to the great lakes or the Gulf of Mexico for a peaceful night's sleep afar from the roar of the metropolis.-New York Press.



It has been an undisputed fact that for years the Hubbell combination has run the county of Bernalillo according to their own sweet will, and it has been asserted, and their removal seems to establish the fact, that they have not at all times conducted the county's affairs in an honest manner. In fact, the charges made by District Attorney Clancy, and upheld by Governor Otero, go to show that a system of grafting was inaugurated and practiced by them, that was not at all conducive to good govern-

Still this was not all. The management of Bernalillo county affairs reached the ears of the Federal authorities at Washington, and one Federal Judge lost his job by allowing his court to be run, apparently, by this same gang of politicians. They had such a political hold upon the county and the administration of justice as well, that it was impossible to indict them, much less ever bring them to trial for their misdeeds.

This conduct on the part of the officials of Bernalillo county was a far reaching argument against statehood; for it was argued that if the most progressive and richest county in the territory was unable to overcome this "grafting" propensity of its officials, what could be expected of other communities of the territory with less advancement.



The Japanese are Disappointed.

Yokohama, Sept. 6-Peace terms are not known exactly, but it is rumored that the abandonment of indemnity will cause a general and profund disappointment. There has been no demonstrations.

Word from Nagasaki says that peace news was received without enthusiasm in the chief centers of Kiu Shu province. There is a general feeling of chagrin that Japan has been deprived of the rightful fruits of her victory. The diplomatic failure is considered to be due to the negotiations commencing prematurely.

Press telegrams outlining the peace terms are further inflaming the sentiment against the settlement. There has been no violence although as a precautionary measure the police reserves have been increased. government continues silent. The conservative element predicts that the country will approve the settlement when the conditions are thoroughly understood. 

#### Telegraphy on Trains.

Wonders never cease and science produces most of the wonders nowadays. Wireless telegraphy has been an accomplished fact for about five years, so the public has become rather familar with it, at least by hearsay, but now comes an entirely new application of it which will probably revolutionize the method of controlling railway trains as completely as the railway itself revolution.z., ransportation methods. By means or wireless telegraphy it is now possible for an engineer to be warned of the approach of another train on the same track. The whole process is automatic. The transmitting instrument on one train sends a signal which is recorded in the cab of the other by means of a bell and colored lights, showing the engineer at a glance approximately how far away the first train is, and whether it is coming from in front or behind.

With such a system working effectually the last vestige of danger of col-Lsions would be removed. There would be no more frightful smashups which occur so frequently through the misreading of orders. Every engineer would know at all times whether he had a clear track ahead of him, and thus one of the greatest elements of danger in railroading would be re-

moved.

The possibilities of wireless telegraphy are only beginning to be realized, and it is quite certain that in a few years the invention will take its place as one of the most useful products of electrical science-Colorado Springs Gazette.

Capt. Mahan's Conclusions Drawn from Battle of Sea of Japan.

Capt. A. T. Mahan, writing for Collier's on "The Battle of the Sea of Japan," discusses the value of submarine boats as exemplified by Admiral Togo's attacks upon the Russian fleet. He says:

To recapitulate: After allowance has been made for the demonstrated superiority of the Japanese in training and experience, it seems clear from Togo's use of his vessels, and from such details of the action as have so far been received, that the superiority of the battleship and of the gun, for the main purposes of naval warfare, has not been shaken. On the contrary, by an account attributed to a Japanese, It appears that the remaining Russian battleships, after the loss of the Borodino and in the subsequent confusion, though already much mauled beat off after dark, using their searchlights, two attacks by the whole flotilla of the enemy's destroyers, acting in two squadrons; and Japanese attacks have not heretofore, in this war, been found easy to repel. Should the official accounts confirm this, it will approach demonstration that uninjured battleships, manned by watchful seamen who keep their head, will in the long run suffer from torpedo attack only in the same proportion as military force suffers from other incidents of war. Let it be mentioned also that the torpedo vessel, from the delicacy of its constitution—a box of machinery-and from the narrowness of its coal supply, will always be most numerous and efficient in home waters. This advantage in this case fell to the Japanese, and it may have contributed to determine Togo's choice of position. This particular consideration shows that, in the broad view of naval policy, the function of the torpedo vesesl is defensive, although its local action is offensive.

I have not seen any indication which to me seemed conclusive, or even probable, of the employment of the submarine in these engagements; but neither does there appear any tertain reason why any one who so prefers may not atribute to them such amount of the damage done as to him seems likely.

We, the undersigned citizens of Lincoln County, of the Territory of New Mexico, and property owners in, upon and near the Lincoln Forest Reserve, do hereby respectfully petition your Department for the revocation, or modification, of Regulation No. 25, in the pamphlet issued by the Department in July, 1905, with reference to grazing permits after January 1, 1906; and the following reasons are assigned as the basis for such action:

Lincoln County is first of all a stock country.

2. The tax rate is naturally very high in a sparsely settled Territory, owing to lack of wealth to produce taxable values.

3. To add a tax for grazing of 35c to 50c per head to the already burdensome Territorial tax, would make the stock industry an unprofitable one, and necessarily drive many stockmen out of business; or to other countries.

4. Much of the stock will run a part of the time on the Reserve and at other times on the open range; thus at all times making the enforcement of this order a source of great difficulty, and at other times work an injustice upon the stockman.

5. The Reserve is so located--cutting the county in the centre--that it would be almost impossible for stockmen to keep their stock off, even though they do not desire the Reserve as a range.

6. The Reserve contains some of the best grazing lands in the county, and the enforcement of this order, which many think prohibitive, will reduce the grazing area to such an extent that a large stock loss to the county must result.

We therefore, respectfully ask that you give these conditions your earnest consideration, and that you may find it consistent to grant this request shall ever be our prayer.
