AIDS NATURES WZRK EFFECT OF ACETYLENE RAYS ON GROWTH OF PLANTS.

Grow to Twice Actual Weight of Those Exposed to Sunlight OnlyLatest Victory for This New and Beautiful Illuminant.

The experiments recently made at Cornell University prove that the beautiful rays from the gas, acetylene are as effective as sunight on the
growth of plants, and this may soon growth of plants, and this may soon become a subject for serious consider ation by
the soil.
The results of the experiments are astonishing, inasmuch as they show conclusively the great increase of growth attained by supplementing "The Light of Nature" with "The Light of Acetylene" during the hour in which the plants would otherwise be in darkness. For instance, a certaln number of radish plants subjected to acetylene light during the night, grew to twice the actual weight of the same number of radishes given daylight only, all other conditions being equal,
and peas had blossomed and partially and peas had blossomed and partially matured pods with the help of acetylene light, while without the added light not even buds were apparent

place as an illuminant for towns from a central plant, for lighting houses churches, schools and isolated build ings of all kinds, and it is being used successfully for many other purposes A striking and important feature o acetylene is the ease and small ex pense with which it can be made available compared with the great ad vantages derived from its use. BERNALILLO COUNTY OFFICERS REMOVED.
The removal by the governor of Thomas S. Hubbell, sheriff; Frank A. Hubbell, treasurer, and Eslavio Vigil, school superin tendent, all Bernalillo county officials, relieves that county of a bad set of officials, and at once places the territorial executive upon a higher moral plane than he has occupied since his term as governor began eight years ago. It was freely predicted, and generally believed, that the governor would not have the courage to oust this notorious element from office in the leading county of the territory, but he proved equal to the occasion and de-
serves all the more credit theresor.

It has been an undisputed fact that for years the Hubbel combination has run the county of Bernalillo according to their own sweet will, and it has been asserted, and their removal seems to establish the fact, that they have not at all times conducted the county's affairs in an hones manner. In fact, the charges made by District Attorney Clancy, and upheld by Governor Otero, go to show that a system of grafting was inaugurated and practiced by them, that was not at all conducive to good government.
Still this was not all. The maragement of Bernalillo county affairs reached the ears of the Federal authorities at Washington, and one Federal Judge lost his job by allowing his court to be runn, apparently, by this same gang of politicians. They had such a political hold upon the county and the administration of justice as well, that it was impossible to indict them, much less ever bring them to trial for their misdeeds.
This conduct on the part of the officials of Bernalillo county was a far reaching argument against statehood; for it was argued that if the most progressive and richest county in the territory was unable to overcome this "grafting" propensity of its officials, what could be expected of other communities of the territory with less advancement.
The charges against these officials were made two years ago, and the public prints of the territory have been full of their wrong-doings. The following constitutes the charges then made, and finally acted upon by the Governor:
"Frank A. Hubbell was accused by the district attorney of misappropriating the sum of $\$ 12,000$ collected under the tax levy of five mills for general county purposes in 1903 and which thus became a part of the fund of the year 1904. Mr. Hubbell was charged with unlawfully paying out that money for the current expenses of 1903 , in violation of a territorial law making such procedure a misdemeanor. Mr. Hubbell was further charged with withholding over $\$ 3,000$ liquor and gaming license collected by his brother, the sheriff, and which, by law should be divided between the general school fund and school district expenses. Other small grafts were placed to the account of Mr. Hubbell by the district attorney.

padding the expense account for mantenance of county prisoners, allowing certain saloons to do business without a license, and other violations of statutes made and provided, which charges Mr. Hubbell denied in toto.
"'Slavio Vigil, the school superintendent of the county, whose fame as an educator has been rather eclipsed by his fame as a financier, was charged with gathering in $\$ 675$ of the taxpayer's money for visiting county schools 135 days, at $\$ 5$ a day in the year of our Lord 1903, when the schools had only been in session sixty-five days. As there appearaed to be a slight discrepancy here, the district attorney laid the matter before the territorial executive. The worst of 'Slavio's offense was that the grand jury warned him to return the profits on his enterprising financial coup and he disregarded the warning. Mr. Vigil, by the governor's action, still further stands convicted of securing other moneys from the county for imaginary expenses connect ed with his alleged administra tion of the county schools. In short, 'Slavio padded them frightfully."

The Japanese are Disappointed Yokohama, Sept. 6-Peace terms are not known exactly, but it is rumored that the abandonment of indemnity will cause a general and profund disappointment. There has been no demonstrations.
Word from Nagasaki says that peace news was received without enthusiasm in the chief centers of Kiu Shu province. There is a general feeling of chagrin that Japan has been deprived of the rightful fruits of her victory. The diplomatic failure is considered to be due to the negotiations commencing prematurely.
Press telegrams outlining the peace terms are further inflaming the sentiment against the settlement. There has been no violence although as a precautionary measure the police reserves have been increased. government continues silent. The conservative element predicts that the country will a pprove the settlement when the conditions are thoroughly understood. Minor radical papers advise the refusal to ratify the treaty through various expedients. The bulk of the people continue apathetic.
Sidney Bieber, fire marshal of the District of Columbia, but who has been at Fort Stanton the past summer, has been placed on the etired list as a result of disabilities, received in the line of duty, at a salary of $\$ 90.00$ per month. Capt. Phillip W. Nicholson succeeds to the position. Regret is expressed by the Washington authorities at Mr. Bieber's enforced etirement.
James McCartney, superintendent of the Coalora coal mines before the mines closed down, is preparing to make a new opening. The coal extracted from this new opening will be used to supply the Fort Stanton contract, and the vein may develop a marketable quantity of coal.

##  STOCKMEN OF LIIKOLI COUNIY PROIESI THE LAIE RESERYE RUIIIG

Go Ghe Honorable James Wilson, Secretary of Agricaltare, burban or morbstry.

We, the undersigned citizens of Lincoln County, of the Territory of New Mexico, and property owners in, upon and near the Lincoln Forest Reserve, do hereby respectfully petition your Department for the revocation, or modification, of Regulation No. 25, in the pamphlet issued by the Department in July, 1905, with reference to grazing permits after January I, 1906; and the following reasons are assigned as the basis for such action:

1. Lincoln County is first of all a stock country.
2. The tax rate is naturally very high in a sparsely settled Territory, owing to lack of wealth to produce taxable values.
3. To add a tax for grazing of 35c to 50 c per head to the already burdensome Territorial tax, would make the stock industry an unprofitable one, and necessarily drive many stockmen out of business, or to other countries.
4. Much of the stock will run a part of the time on the Reserve and at other times on the open range; thus at all times making the enforcement of this order a source of great difficulty, and at other times work an injustice upon the stockman.
5. The Reserve is so located-cutting the county in the centre--that it would be almost impossible for stockmen to keep their stock off, even though they do not desire the Reserve as a range.
6. The Reserve contains some of the best grazing lands in the county, and the en= forcement of this order, which many think prohibitive, will reduce the grazing area to such an extent that a large stock loss to the county must result.

We therefore, respectfully ask that you give these conditions your earnest consid= eration, and that you may find it consistent to grant this request shall ever be cur prayer.
