## FOREST SERVICE CIRCULAR.

The following circular from the Department of Forestry, to the various supervisors of forest reserves, has been received by Supervisor Hightower; and as ifontains a new ruling on the grazing of stock on reserves, and many of our readers are interested in this subject, the circular is herewith presented:
"In accordance with the forest-reserve rules aud regulations, on and after January 1. 1906, a moderate fee will be charged for the privilege of grazing all classes of live stock.
"The forest reserves belong to all the people, but of necessity, under proper management their use for grazing purposes can only be allowed to a limited number. Therefore it is fair and just that those who receive the grazing privilege should pay a small fee which will go toward helping to pay the running expenses of the reserves.
"In order to protect and assist home builders, a special concession will be made in the grazing fee on cattle for of 1906 as follows:
"The permits of each state or territory for the year 1905 will be listed in order of the number of the cattle covered; then beginning with the smallest, one-half of the permits will be counted off, and the number of cattle shown by the largest of these will be taken as a basis for this concession.
"Applicants for grazing permits will be charged only half rate on cattle $n p$ to the number thus established for their state or territory, but all cattle over this number will be charged for at the full rate.
"In determining the amount to be, charged, the advantages of the locality, method and cost of handling stock, transportation facilities, market conditions, and demand for range will be considered and the rate established accordingly. The number of stock to be allowed on each reserve will be fixed on the basis of mixed stock as they are usually owned and ranged in the locality.
"In calculating the number for which permit will be required, and the amount to be paid for the privilige of grazing cattle and horses, all animals six months old and over at the time of entering will be counted, but no charge will be made for calves and colts under six months of age at the time of entering, or for those born during the year for which permit is granted. The intent is that the calves,and colts raised during any calendar year shall be charged for during the following year.
-The fact that young stock require less feed than old stock is taken into consideration in fixing the rate, and in all cases the charge will be reasonable in comparison with the advantages of the reserve.
"In counting sheep and goats, all animals six months old and over at the time of entering will be counted as grown stcck, and each two head of lamhs or kids under six months old will be counted as equal to one head of grown stock.
"When sheep or goats enter a reserve for the purpose of lambing or kidding there, an additional charge of 2 cents per head will be made on the grown stock, and the permit number required and a mount to be paid for grazing the lambs or kids raised will le estimated on the average per cent of lambs or kids usually raised in the locality, two head to count as one. Thus, a person who wishes to drive in 1,000 ewes for the purpose of lambing on a range where the average lambing is estimated to be 80 per cent would be required to have a permit for, and pay the grazing fee on, $1,4 C 0$ head. The 80 per cent increase on 1,000 ewes or 800 lambs to be raised would be countid as equal to 400 grown sheep.
"It will be the aim of the forest service to restrict the allowance for each reserve to a number of stock which experience shows to be the actual grazing capacity of the range under normal conditions, to make such range divisions among applicants and different classes of stock as are for the best interest of the reserve and commonwealth, and to divide the grazing privileges fairly. The advantages given in the use of a protected range are considne cooperation of stockmen tion for the money collected, and the ear conservative use of the range is-solicited to carry out the policy of a conservative use of the rangen utility.

Trails in Forest Reserves. During the coming winter and spring many miles of trails will be built in the government forest reserves. One os the chief cares of the forest service in the management of the reserves is o protect them against fire. The trails will afford a means of reaching all parts of the forest reserves on horse back and the fire lines will form vant-
age points from which the fire may be attacked and there controlled
The trails will be carefully planned This does not involve much expense for in many sections a perfectly good trail can be built for $\$ 20$ a mile and many miles will cost less than $\$ 5$. The rangers themselves will perform most of the work.

The weather has been extreme$1 s$ cold at times, too, during the storm, the thermometer registering $14 \frac{1}{2}$ degrees below zero last Saturday morning, and another morning after that date the indicator sought the bulb. This was almost unprecedented for this section, and makes us a little siy now when taiking about our fine "Etalian" climate.

The information came over the phone from Lincoln Monday night that the store building and its contents of W. A. Hyde, at Hondo, 12 miles below Lincoln, was destroyed by fire Monday. No particulars are obtainable, on account of the deep snow, which stopped communication between places not having phones, and wo therefore only able to give the bare report. Our readers will recall that this same fanily met a similar disaster near the same place a hittle over three years ago.

## Portable Breathing Apparatus an In-

vention of Much Merit.
In Europe a respiratory and life saving apparatus has been used with considerable success by miners, firemen and others, who are required to penetrate mines or apartments that are filled with smoke or unbreathable gases, especially after accidents such as explosions. With this apparatus sufficient air and oxygen are carried to support respiration for two hours, even while the individual is working. The apparatus consists of a mask or helmet, which completely covers the face, but exposes the ears, so that while the eyes of the wearer are protected from the smoke he can hear distinctly
There are connected with the mask two rubber bags -one for the exhaled air and the other connected with the oxygen and the regenerated air. The former is contained in steel cylinders, and by means of proper reducing valves acts on the air after the car bonic acid which has been exhaled is absorbed by granulated potash. The instrument weighs about twenty-eight pounds, but is sure in its action, and has been used successfully by the Paris fire department, where, in addition, portable electric lights with flexible cables form a part of the equipment, and thus allow firemen to penetrate dark and smoky rooms and cellars to save life or cut off gas or electricity, or perform some other usefurl duties. In mines the apparatus is valuable in case of accidents due to firedamp or explosion, and it is coming into extensive use for this burpose. -Montreal Herald.

Paints Wild Beasts' Eyes.
