## Santa Fe Assessorship.

Santa Fe, N. M., March 13.The fight for assessorship of Santa Fe county, which at present has three claimants to the office, assumed a new phase when Anastacio Gonzales, the democrat who was removed for incompetency by order of Judge John R. McFie. of the first judicial district court, took the preliminary steps for an appeal to the territorial supreme court, which meets in June, and would not reach there until next January, by which time a new assessor will have been elected.

A writ of supersedeas was asked.

In the meanwhile, Glenville A. Collins, appointed assessor by Governor Herbert J. Hagerman, asked for a writ of mandamus to compel Edward S. Andrews, appointed assessor by the board of county commissioners, to tuly over the books of the office.

## To Make Indelible Ink

Indelible ink for marking linen may be easily prepared at home by putting two inches of lunar caustic in an ounce bottle and filling the bottle up with good vinegar. Be careful that the bottle is perfectly clean, or the resultly and loave in a sunny place for tightly and leave in a sun two days before using.
In using indelible ink it will be
found more satisfactory to write on the goods if the following preparation is first used: Put in a clean bottle a scant desertspoonful of salts of tartar and a lump, of gum arabic the size of a hickory nut. Fill the bottle with rain water and stand in a sunny place for a couple of days before usTo use, dip a camel's hair brush in the gum liquid and paint over a space on the linen large enough to contain the initials or name desired-then allow it to dry for at least twenty-fou: hours and iron before using the in. delible ink. Always use a new pea and dry in the sun, if possible.

That statehood, so far as New Mexico and Arizona are concerned, is a dead duck in the pond is the generally expressed belief, though some believe it may be resu citated and brought to life during the present session of congress.

The News attempted to get the result of the vote last week, but the multiplicity of amendments anil the lightning and unexpected changes so mixed things that our correspondent failed to send anything. So the story must be told now.

As before noted, the senate had agreed to vote on the bill last Friday at 4 oclock. The Foraker amendment, which has been previously explained, was presented, and adopted by a vote of 42 to 29. Senator Burrows, of Michigan, proposed an amendment eliminating New Mexico and Arizona from the bill. 'This amendment was defeated by a vote of 36 to $35, \quad O n \quad$ a second ballot this amendment was adopted, the vote standing 37 for to 35 against.
The bill as amended was sent back to the house, and will go to a conference committee of the two houses of congress. If the house refuses to concur in the senate amendments, as the leaders indicate it will, the measure will be right where it was at the beginning of the session.

The story can best be told, however, by the dispatches, and our readers may draw their own conclusions. Here they are:

THE HOUSE WILL STAND PAT.
Washington, March 12. Statehood legislation formed the topic of discussion at the White House roday. It developed from calls on the president of Speaker Cannon and of Representative Watson, of Indiana, the republican whip of the house, that the members of the house are incensed at the action of the senate, not only on the statehood bill but on other measures passed by the house which have been received with disapproval by the senate. Wheu Speaker Cannon was asked if, in his opinion, there would be statehood legis-
lation this congress, he said vehemently: "Go ask Aldrich, Burrows and company. They seem to want to run things, So far as I am concerned -... so far as my vote goes, -... legislation. will proceed along usual lines. The bill will be sent to conference between the two branches. Do they think the house was born in the woods to be scared by an owl?"
Watson was positive that the House would not concur in the senate amendment of the statehood bill. "The house will stand pat," he declared. "The senate has kicked out our Philippine bill, has tried to emasculate the rate bill and has cut life out of the statehood bill. Do you think the house will stand such treatment? It will not and you may depend upon it."

There is some talk of calling a caucus of the republican members of the house on the statehood bill, but so far as learned, nothing definite has been determined.
