Thousand-Year, Radium Clock.

It consists essentially of a small glass tube in which a twelfth of a grain of radium is supported by a rod o quartz in an exhausted glass vessel the lower end of the tube containing n electroscope of two aluminum films ders the surface of the glass conduc tive. The positive charge received from the radium expands the leaves of the electroscope until they touch the sides of the tube, when they are dis charged to earth and the leaves fall to gether. While the Senate, for the time being, has killed the statehood bill, we are far from believing the measure dead beyond all resurrection. That the situation is far from satistactory we are compelled to admit, but if the House "stands pat," as "Old Joe" says it will the advocates of statehood for Oklahoma, many of whom are opposed to statehood for Arizona and New Mexico, will be placed in a peculiar position. Both houses of Congress admit the justice of Oklahoma's claim to statehood, and further assert that to deny her that privilege would almest be a crime. The House says, and the President seers in accord with the proposition, that two states must be made or none. The just claims of Oklahoma, laying aside the similar claim of Arizona and New Mexico, may force the Senate to a favorable consideration of the bill passed by the House. This forms the basis for our belief that statehood is not irrevocably buried. As long as there is life, there is hope, and the House and President seem to retain sufficient fighting qualities to bring about an agreement.
The continued cool weather, and particularly the cold nights, gives promise of holding back the fruit trees to a late enough period to iusure a good fruit crop. ## Terrific Snow Storm

Denver, Colo., March 19.-By loss of twelve lives in a snowslide near Silverton today the death roll resulting from the great siorm of the past week in the San Juan mining district has been increased to at least fifteen. It was reported here tonight from Silverton that five mills had been wrecked by slides and these with other mining property estimated to be worth a million dollars, have been swept to destruction in the deep gulches.
Cattle on a thousand hills are reduced to skin and bone. On Cumbres Pass, the highest point on the narrow guage road from Durango to Alamosa, a trainload of passengers is marooned, dependent for warmth upon the meager supply of coal in the engine tender and for food on what the mountaineers can bring them with snowshoes.
Railroad traffic is paralyzed and telephonic and telegraphic communication is interrupted over at least half the state.
