"When a little company of the for eign women living in Shangnai formod themselves into the Tien Tisu Hui (Natural-Feet society), thay were
zreeted with derision by evorybody," writes Mirs. Archibald Littie. "But they gave and collected littio sums of money, gave prizes for easays, se lected tracts and had them printed. and themselves circulated them throughout the length and broadth of the vast empire-as big as Europe. When Chinese men in their tens of thousands assembled for their annual or triennial examinations little assortments of these tracts were given to each competitor to take back to his native village. At last the dowager empress issued an imperial edict. Then one, by one, the great Chinese viceroys issued proclamations agains terview or a letter from the organiz ing secretary of the Natural-Feet society.

And now, by last post, a letter from the far west of China says unbound feet is the order of the day for little girls now; foreign style clothes for boys, and drill everywhere.' "On the western, the warmer sida,"
stretches down to the sea, but on
the eastern, as one approaches the Okhotsk sea, whence comes cold, piercing winds, the 'talga" (Siberian virgin forest) gives place to hills cov ered with white reindeer moss and but few trees, or to broad stretches of tundra near or the stretches of hills and valle in mouths. Both hils and valleys in the interior are, for the most part, clad with dense pine forest, three-quarters of the island belng so covered. The flora shows a strange admixture of polar and subtropical species, the latter being more especially in evidence in the southwest of the island, where the vegetation and scenery resemble that of northern Japan.
To the north the forests are composed chiefly of larch, pine, birch and other north temperate or polar spe. cles, with wild raspberry, bog-myrtle and other undergrowth. On the coasts, on the broad stretches of Si berian tundra, occur various small polar plants. To the south are maple, oak, ash, bamboo, cork tree and other subtropical trees or shrubs. The
fauna shows a similar variety."

The new plant will cost ultimately $\$ 20,000,000$ to $\$ 30,000,000$ and will require ten years for its build ing. There will be twenty-sever blast furnaces and fifty open hearth fur naces, making it the largest steel plant in the worla.
More than 12,000 men will be em ployed in the plant.

COMING POLITICAL FIGHIT.
The most important political fight in the history of the territory is beginning to materialize, and as the season advances the the fight will wax warmer. The contest is between Governor Hagerman and the regular republican organization.
The republican organization contains the names of such fighters and politicans as Burscm. Prichard, Baca and Ravnolds, who have behind them the rank and file of the party. The governor, it is true, has his supporters, but they are mainly drawn from the democratic party, and they can render but little assistance to the executive.

This split in the republican ranks was brought about by the impolitic action of the governor in disregarding the republican organization, and in many instances filling the territorial positions with outsiders, all of whom are opposed to the organization and some of whom were not residents of the territory.

In this fight, one in which we can view with perfect equanimity, the organization seems to have just cause for complaint, and they also appear to hold the upper hand.

The main contest will come in the selection of members of the territorial legislature, particularly the councilmanic branch, and the delegate to congress. A pretty fight is on and will be watched with growing interest.

Mount Vesuvius has been active the past two weeks, and an incalculable amount of destruction followed its eruption. A dozen towns within a radius of as many miles have practically been overwhelmed by lava and ashes, thousands of people are homeless while hundreds were buried under the ruins of the various towns. ## San Francisco in Ruins.

A disastrous earthquake shock visited the city of San Francisco on the morning of the 18 th, destroying, or injuring, a large portion of the buildings in the city, and causing the death of hundreds of people, variously estimated at from 1,000 to 20,000 . The property loss may reach $\$ 100,000,000$.
Fire followed the shock, and the flames threaten to complete the destruction of the city. The city is under martial law, and all dynamite has been commandered to use in blowing up buildings to check the spreading flames.
The shock was widespread, extending over the entire state of Nevada, and as far east as Ogden, Utah.

\section*{A COSTA RICAN VOLCANO}

On the island of Costa Rico is the remarkable volcano of Poas. The crater has an altitude of about 8,500 feet. The traveler who makes the ascent, on reaching the lip of the crater, finds himself at the brink of a vast perpendicular-sided pit, at the bottom of which lies a motionless pool of yellowish water. The sense of deadly stillness and desolation is undisturbed by the Indication of life The almost vertical walls are devoid of even a vestige of plant creation; not a bird wings its way through the air; the surface of the pool is with out a ripple, and even the human voice sounds strange and incongru ous. Suddenly the silence is broken by a great and startling underground rumbling, and a huge column of a dark-colored liquid is thrown to a vast height from a spot near the center of the lake. The column ordinarily rises to a height varying from 250 to 500 feet. Almost instantly a vas cloud of vapor is evolved which sur rounds the column and rises to an immense height.
A thousand feet below the lip is the lake or pool, along the shores of with it is necessary to move about cealed holes filled with a slimy substance, consisting mainly of sulphate
phuric acid. This hardens in a few moments when exposed to the air and consequently the pits are cove almost impossible to distinguish be tween them and solid ground. foot goes through this thin crust will be found that in a few days th shoe will be destroyed, as the seams cannot resist the acid action. The lake at closer view is discovered to be covered with clouds of vapor and it is impossible to see for any dis ance. Among other gases, sulphur dioxide is present in considerable quantities, and at times the smell be comes almost unbearable.

At close range the water is grayish in color, and it is so acid that it al most burns the tongue when tasted Any dark cloth moistened with the liquid instantly becomes red and is ultimately destroyed. The tempera ure at the shore, while varying con siderably, ranged around 115 degrees Fahrenheit. During one of the great est eruptions known a tremendous col umn of dark liquid rose to an est mated height of 2,000 feet and was about 300 feet in diameter. The waves produced on the lake by such after the eruption has ceased long whole crater is filled with the roa of the troubled waters.

One of the most hopeful signs of the times was, in his opinion the popular interest that is now manifest ed in health questions, and to garden cities he looked for the partial solution of the problem of overcrowding But in referring to the enormous increase in the demand for oxygen and the output of carbonic acid, he made
the alarming prophecy that the da might come when we shall be entire well as dent on imported oxygen a to trust to the ocean to dispose of carbonic acid.'
He cried for a liberal scheme natural ventilation, and advocated in connection with all great cities series of broad avenues convergin toward them from all points of the compass, free from buildings and covered with vegetation. But the coun try was the proper breeding groun of intellect, and children should be brought into living contact with na ture, so that they might form frien ships with trees and animals, and be sects and bilds, and secrets of in sects and bilds, and be taught to take more pleasure in the hedgerow ketable beauty than in the shop win dows with their flaunting temptations For these reasons he declared that for children living in London or oth er vopulous cities the seaside town with the "vulgar riot of the sands, was not the place in which their va cations could be most healthfully or profitably spent.-London Express.

Slowest Train in the World.
