The present board of commissioners being Now advised by the district attorney's office that such contract so let for the term of four years is void on account of the same being contrary to public policy. 2 It is therefore resolved that said contract so let for four years, is hereby rescinded and that pro-- posals for bids to do such print2ing for one year, to commence May 15tb, 1906, be called for, and to this end the clerk of this board is instructed to cause notices to te inserted in the Capitan News and in the Outlook newspapers, inviting bids to do such printing for the one year a above stated, said bids to be filed $z$ in the probate clerk's office and the same will be opened and passed upon at a special meeting of this board to be held May 16, next.

In the matter of the road recently constructed by contractor Booth-the board having heretofore appointed four citizens of Lincoln county to view this road, and they having reperted to the board that the road has been constructed within the terms of the contract let to Booth, and each member of the board having respectively inspected this road in person, now receives the same and orders the clerk to issue a warrant to contractor Booth for $\$ 450.00$ in payment for the work done by him, less the sum of $\$ 150.00$ heretofore advanced him on this contract.

## THE PRESIDENT'S DEMOCRACY

Some of the most important policies advocated by President Roosevelt are to be found in the declarations of democratic platforms. In fact, his strenuous advocacy of certain measures makes him much more of a detuocrat than a republicav; and this is moreclearly proven when a search is made for his supporters in congress. He has behind him, in most of his propositions, the solid membership of the democratic party, and the most active opponents to his plans are the oldtime republican menber, who hold to a faitis poclaim d by the founders of the republican party.

The indications point very clearly to a division in the republican party-not one that exists as at present and consists of divergent views, with a semblance of cordiality among its members but one in which the party will be divided into two hostile camps, the president heading one and having the younger members of his party at his back, and the other composed of the old conservatives, such as Aldrich, Knox, Spooner, Foraker and their supporters, who thrive on the glories achieved by the republican party in its youth.

The president not ouly advocates rate regulation, the prosecution of the trusts, and, it a measure, a reduction of the tariff, but he recently made a speech in which he practically asserted that the accumulation of vast wealth was a menace to our government, and advocated an inheritance and an income tax.

These propositions are strictly democratic; yet, best of all, they are just and equitable, and are along the lines of good policy; and whether advocated by a republican or incorporated in a democratic platform should, and we believe will, receive the earnest consideration of the great middle-class Americans.

The president may be called a republican, because he was elected as such, but his utterances and recommendations show him to be a man tar in advance of his party and its policy; that he is filled by a desire to avert an impending calamity and is willing to follow

## Terrible Destruction.

The results of tive earthquake and fire at San Francisco have been summed up, and the losses are appalling. The only redeeming feature in the later reports consisted iu cutting down the loss of life, which will probably fall under 1,000 .
The property loss, on the other hand, has increased, and the amount is now tigured at $\$ 300$, 000,000 , or twice the loss sustained in the great Chicago tire, which, up to the San Francisco disaster, was the greatest in the history of the world.

The respouses of the people from all parts of the world, but particularly in this conntry, have been most generous, and it has been the means of saving thousands of lives in the wrecked city. Every city of any consequence in the union adopted relief measures; Congress appropriated $\$ 2$, 500,000 and the sum for relief totals around $\$ 15,000,000$. The insurance companies were struck for $\$ 100,000,000$ to $\$ 150,000,000$ and all told the amounts at hand will aid in the work of rebuilding the city. a plan that the placky inhabitants have already set on foot.

With one exception, the United States mint, not a substantial building was left standing in the city. The magnificent buildings of the Leland Stanford University are a mass of ruins, and many surrounding towns suffered from shock and fire
