

THE LONG BATTLE over the federal budget ended on Thursday this week with yet another victory by President Reagan, who won his biggest political battle since taking office.

Opinions on the proposed budget, which contains \$100 billion in additional revenues over the next three years, have been sharply divided.

Even some members of President Reagan's own Republican party desserted him on the recent issue, claiming that the tax increases went against the cutbacks which the President had promised to make.

However, in the final analysis, the president was able to convince a majority in both houses of congressthat the additional revenue is necessary in order to help cure the nation's ills. The budget as passed still contains massive cuts in some welfare programs.

So, at least President Reagan has been able to make a start toward a balanced budget, even though he had to "strike a compromise" on the new budget.

Like most taxpayers, we did not agree on every portion of the budget which the congress approved this week. Though personally I'm not a smoker, I feel sure that those who do are thoroughly opposed to the doubling of the federal tax on cigarettes.

As a businessman, we were against the cutbacks to tax advantages which some small businesses have needed in order to keep operating.

You have to admire the president for the fact that he realized that his all-out "supply side" economics platform was just not getting the economy turned around.

DPS Reminds Of Laws On School Buses

The summer vacation from school is now over, and thousands of youngsters are starting back to school, many of those for the first time. Last year in Texas, the pedestrian death accounted for approximately 16 per cent of our total traffic fatalities, several of these were school age children.


So, once again we will be seeing those big yellow school buses back on the streets and highways. The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind you that Texas law prohibits the passing of a stopped school bus that is loading or unloading passengers when the lights are flashing. If you are in doubt--stop-those few moments you lose may mean a lifetime to some youngster. None of us wants to be responsible for the death or injury of a young child, so remember to slow down in the school zones in the mornings and again in the afternoons. "And, just because most of the children will be in school, we must not forget the preschooler who will still be playing in the residential areas. Remember, slow down as you are driving through school zones, around buses, and in and around school areas. Drive as if you had a child there because someone has," stated a spokesman for the DPS.

School Gives Its Calendar

First official holiday on the schedule is Labor Day, September 6. Other school holidays include: October 11, teacher in-service day; November 5, teacher in-service, student holiday; November 25-16, Thanksgiving; November 29, teacher in-service.




Enrollment



McCains May Host National Show

The most famous "brother team" on Oklahoma television news--in fact, the only brother team--may soon be syndicated nationally.

Ben and Butch McCain, who host the early-morning program, "Action 4 a.m.," may have parlayed their unique musical talents into a nationally syndicated hour of song, dance and talk.

"There is talk of syndicating us in a variety-type setting," disclosed Ben, the elder brother, "but it's just in the talking stages now."

If the syndicated show does materialize, it will be the culmination of a dream for the two brothers.

"We are writing songs constantly," said Ben. "We write, share ideas and use a lot of original songs in our act. We play all over the state."

It all started while Ben was working as a television reporter in Amarillo about five years ago. He had written a song, "Memphis Lady From Texas," which was released locally over 15 radio stations. "It was really nothing big," Ben said. "It was something I wanted to do. I think our later songs are much better."

said Ben. "And, we were more than a little scared. There were about 7,000 people in the audience. As far as we were concerned, it was a long, long way from Bovina, Texas, where we were raised. And we were pleased with the response we got."

That brought a smile to Butch's face. "Yeah. They didn't throw anything at us. And, that's one reason we move around when we sing--so they won't throw anything at us."

About the only thing the audiences throw at the McCain brothers when they perform is praise. They move through the state, working beauty pageants, giving concerts at colleges and emceeing the "Oklahoma Opry" in Oklahoma City.

"The response has been good, very good," said Ben. "Some of the most enjoyable dates are the beauty pageants. We emceed the Miss Altus pageant, and got a chance to work with the 1982 Miss America, Elizabeth Ward. As a matter of fact, I sang her song."

welcome attention to them on the network level. An NBC newsletter not only announced their consistently high ratings, but also put in a word of critical praise about the show. "It's not happy talk," said Butch. "It's news and weather, sports, and we have interesting guests--like Vice President Walter Mondale."

"We're a weird breed, I guess," Ben said. "We're half-newsmen, half-musicians. We're really happy with our show, and with where we are now musically."

"That's right," said brother Butch. "We're the only brother news and weather team in the whole universe--the whole galaxy--I think. If you hear of any other brother teams in the news business, let us know.


To be grouped in a carpool for fall classes, the students must return the applications to the Activities Center by Wednesday, September 1.


