Improvements in Sight

Judging from the way the new company that has bought the townsite of Carrizozo is starting in, it looks as if there will be something done in the way of development during the next few months.

Mr. Wetmore informs us that his people are going to invest some money on improvements on Fourth and El Paso streets and Fourth street and Alamogordo avenue at once.

Mr. Wetmore has been out of town several days closing the final details of the trade and getting papers for the townsite. C. B. Eddy accompanied him as far as Alamogordo where the final transaction was closed.

The old shack that has been used by Henry Pfaff for a saloon is being moved to make room for a new building and the other half of the same building will be replaced with a new modern brick as soon as the present lease, held by W. C. McDonald, expires on March 31st.

Mining Activities

Among the mining companies that are beginning active operations in various parts of Lincoln County is the Columbia Copper Company, which controls some valuable properties in the White Mountains and also near Corona in the Gallinas. It is stocked to a large amount and is preparing to do extensive development work on its various properties, including the ones mentioned. The directors of this company are among the best known business of the territory and the mere fact of their being connected with the enterprise is a guarantee of its stability. A portion of the treasury stock has been put on the market and will be sold and the proceeds used in developing the properties.

The work which interests the people of this vicinity most is a group known as the Gallinas, situated in the northern part of this county. The company has a bond and lease on these claims which lasts 18 months, thus enabling them to develop and prove the ore body. This property is on the same formation as the Corona Queen, and it is believed by many who are acquainted in that district that it will be equal to Bisbee as a copper producer when once properly opened up.

Evidences continue to accumulate that this will be a record-breaking year in New Mexico mining, and Lincoln County will not be behind in that line; besides the Corqua Queen and Columbia Copper companies that are already organized and getting in line for actual work, there are several other companies being organized which will soon be ready for business. Lincoln has the resources and they are going to be developed.

There is real need of a development association of some kind in Carrizozo at the present time. Letters of inquiry about the town and valley are being received almost daily, and have to be answered by individuals or go unanswered. All these inquiries show that there is an interest throughout the country in the undeveloped lands of New Mexico and that it will only require a little enterprise on the part of our citizens to secure a portion of the immigration which will come into the territory this spring. The business men of Carrizozo should organize to push the development of town and valley.

And now the legislature is in session, and the historic City of the Holy Faith of Saint Francis will take on its most active appearance, as it has done many times before when the Law Makers were spending the people's money within its limits, but it remains to be seen whether the representatives of the people will meet the demands of the times, and do something to improve conditions in the territory, or will spend the time and money allotted them and retire like their unlamented predecessors.

We are informed on good authority that W. C. McDonald will erect a building in the near future, which will be suitable for school and public meetings and will donate it to the public until such time as a schoolhouse can be built.

UNLAWFUL FENCES

The following order of the De-
partment of the Interior being a
matter of general interest through-
out the territory, we publish it for
the benefit of our readers.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR
Secretary's Office.

Washington, D. C. Jan. 3 1907.
Commissioner, General Land Office.

Sir: Referring to the circular of
instructions to special agents of
your office, approved by me Febru-
ary 29, 1904, relative to their duties
under the act of February 25, 1885,
entitled, "An act to prevent unlaw-
ful occupancy of the public lands,"
you are advised that said circular
is hereby amended and modified as
follows.

Strike out from said circular par-
agraphs 5 and 6 and insert in lieu
thereof the following.

It shall be the duty of the special
agent on receipt of any charge or
complaint or upon information be-
ing acquired by him from any
source, that an unlawful inclosure
is being maintained by any person
or persons, association or corpora-
tion, to at once proceed to secure
sufficient data, including a descrip-
tion of the lands inclosed, with
reasonable certainty, not necessari-
ly by metes and bounds, nor by
Governmental subdivisions of sur-
veyed land, but only so that the in-
closure may be identified and the
person or persons guilty of the vio-
lation, as nearly as may be, and by
description if the name can not, on
reasonable inquiry, be obtained and
to at once submit the case, with the
data thus obtained to the United
States attorney for prosecution.

It shall be the duty of the special
agent, and he shall be so instructed
to be alert and vigilant to detect

the existence of unlawful inclosures
in his district and proceed in ac-
cordance with the above directions,
and he is not to construe his duties
as requiring that there must be a
formal complaint filed before he
can act, but it shall be his duty, as
above stated to take the initiative
himself.
