THIS IS AN OBITUARY for the typewriter. Smith-Corona, one of the last of the old typewriter manufacturers, went out of business a couple of weeks ago. They went bankrupt because they couldn't compete in the computer age. The traditional old typewriter is not just an endangered species now. It is officially dead.

We've come a good way since Mark Twain submitted the first typewritten book manuscript to a publisher in 1876. He entitled it "Tom Sawyer."

Your lady editor has been typing for so long now that I've almost forgotten how to write by hand. Schools had ceased to teach "penmanship" by the time I started school and my handwriting was deplorable from day one. My mind would race ahead to what I wanted to say next and the words simply didn't get down on paper fast enough to keep up.

So I was anxious to learn to use one of those big old heavy black Underwood typewriters that were the staple of all typing classes back then. They had about 2,000 moving parts and were considered as much a technological miracle in their beginning as computers are today.

But you had to really hit those keys with some amount of force before the letters would jump up and strike the paper. I really didn't have enough strength in my hands to get up very much speed in typing on those heavy old manual typewriters.

I've seen some of the old-time seasoned newsmen at the big city papers batting out news stories with two fingers faster than I could get a piece of paper rolled into the carriage. They never took a typing class. It was 'learn as you go.'

The little portable that came as a high school graduation gift was a big improvement, because you didn't have to hit the keys quite so hard. It served me well through college journalism classes and then went to the back of the closet during the baby raising years. By the time writing again became part of my daily routine, the electric typewriter was the wonderful new invention.

As a matter of fact, I never really got very good at typing either. My work was always a jumbled up mess of strike-overs, edit marks, erasures and white-out. So I was pretty excited when computers became available for home use.

This is the third one I've had in about ten years. They are obsolete almost before you get them home from the store. You can use the old ones for a door prop because nobody wants to buy a second-hand computer that is outmoded, and they keep coming up with new and better advancements daily.

I'm not interested in any part of what the computer can do except the word processor. I'm not interested in games, graphics, fancy programs, or communicating with other nuts on the inter-net.

They have a program that plans nutritionally balanced meals, works up your grocery list, and gives you recipes for what you should cook for dinner. It does everything but cook it for you. Not interested!

They have a program that will turn off your lights at a given time in the evening, activate your home security system, play some soothing music until you dose off, and then start your coffee pot in the morning. Not interested!

But the word processor is great! It can tell me when I've written just enough baloney to fill up this column.

Currently, I have just one problem with it. There's a new little kitten at our house who wants to be directly on top of whatever I happen to be working on at any given moment.

You ought to see what comes up on the screen when a kitty is walking across your computer keyboard. The crowning feature of the computer is, I can erase all of that before it reaches you in the newspaper.

Our new kitty's name is Simon, but mostly we call him "Dammit!"

There is a new neighbor in Bovina that could become very important to many people.

Meet Tony Elliott, a certified licensed Physician Assistant, in charge of the new Bovina Rural Health Clinic.

When we visited the clinic and first met Tony, we accused him of being from "up North" because of his accent. But Elliott, 56, grew up in Tigard, Oregon and graduated from Lewis and Clark College in Portland.

Later he received medical training at the renowned Duke University Medical School in North Carolina where he graduated in 1974, earning the Physician Assistant certification.

Elliott's experience includes five years of urology at the VA Hospital in Asheville, NC and four years in orthopedic surgery in Johnson City, Tennessee.

He also has twenty years of medical experience with the U.S. Army.

Most recently, he was at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo, working primarily in spine related specialties.

Elliott still lives in Canyon for now, but is making plans to move to Parmer County as soon as possible. He is actually employed by High Plains Baptist, who now owns and operates the Bovina Clinic along with eight other rural clinics in the Panhandle.

Elliott and the Bovina Clinic are also associated with the Friona Medical Clinic.

Elliott will be fulltime at the Bovina facility and "on-call" to assist the Friona Medical Clinic. With his long experience in medicine, he can most likely handle whatever ails you. And if not, the Friona doctors are only a phone call away.

As Elliott says, call or come by if it hurts.

# Book Offers Details Of Infant Murders

The Bovina Blade/Friona Star received an advance copy this week of the book "Mommy's Little Angels" by Mary Lou Cavanaugh.

The book gives details as reconstructed by area law enforcement officials on the Diana Lumbrea case--the true story about a Bovina mother who murdered seven children.

Mary Lou Cavanaugh, a former law enforcement employee-turned-writer, is the author of the book, and this writer had the opportunity of interviewing the author via telephone from her new home in Oregon.

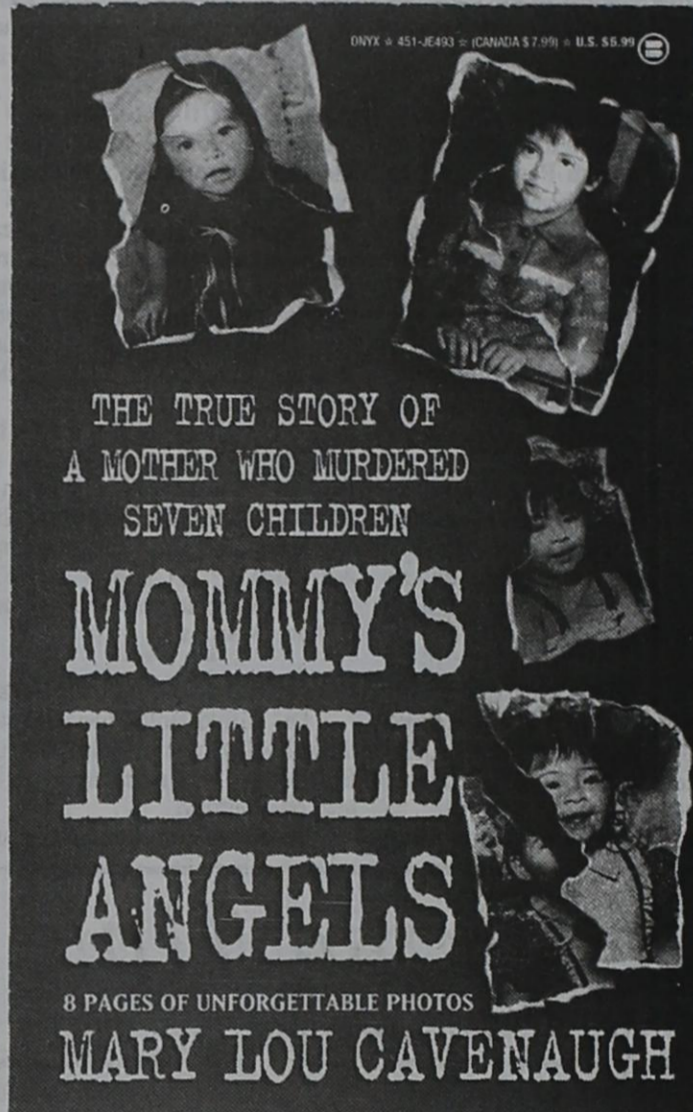
Ms. Cavanaugh said she wrote the book to "shake things up--to challenge those in power to listen to their moral conscience and make changes necessary to protect the children--all of the children."

The author was living in Lubbock when she first heard about the Lumbrea case. She was doing work on her graduate degree at Texas Tech. She was writing true short stories based on her law experiences. They were published in such magazines as Detective Files, True Detective, etc. She wrote for a company that published seven different magazines.

One afternoon while watching the 5 p.m. news on TV, she saw Diana Lumbrea being escorted out of the Lubbock County Courthouse, and heard about the possibility of seven infant murders. "I felt as though man's inhumanity to man had reached a new low," she says in her opening chapter.

"It was sort of like that story chose me, instead of the other way around. I couldn't get it out of my mind. When I called sheriff's deputy Jerry Bailey at Dimmitt, he confirmed that I should write it. He was anxious for the story to be written (possibly to keep something similar from happening again). I didn't understand how incredible a story it was until I got into it," Ms. Cavanaugh said.

In the Texas portion of the investigation, which accounts for six of the seven deaths, the author quotes former Parmer County Sheriff's Deputy Richard Bonham extensively. As a matter of fact, this part of the story is written as if



Bonham were telling it. "It had to be from the perspective of the detective. I couldn't glorify a killer," Ms. Cavanaugh explained.

She also devotes an entire chapter to John Blackwell, owner-operator of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home in Friona, who was suspicious about the deaths, until a forensics examiner's autopsy showed that one of the infants died from heart trouble.

Although the examiner's report served to "muddy the water" as far as Blackwell was concerned, it wasn't until later on that the man who did the autopsy--Ralph Erdman--burst on the scene for his less than expert examinations.

"I thought that the book was well-researched. I don't have any problems with the quotes she attributed to me, except for when she implied that I knew at the time of Erdman's bad track record. He convinced me at the time that the baby had died of a heart murmur," Blackwell said.

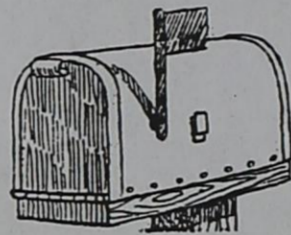
## D. Hromas, C. Neal Honored

## Pre-K to 5 Supply List Published

Bovina ISD has released the list of school supplies for students in Pre-K through 5:

**Kindergarten:** 8 crayons (not Jumbo), 1 Elmer's School Glue, 1 Pair Safety Scissors, 1 water colors, 1 box Kleenex, 2 pencils, 1 folder with pockets and a small rug or towel for rest time (no plastic mats please. Please label each article with child's name.

**First Grade:** 2-#2 pencils, 16 crayons, sharp pointed scissors, Elmer's school glue, pencil box, back-pack, satchel, or book-bag, Prang water-colors, Kleenex (large box).

**Second Grade:** Notebook paper (wide ruled, not college ruled), 2 pocket folders, 2 pencils #2 lead, crayons (at least 16), Elmer's School Glue (large), eraser, Kleenex (large), sharp-point scissors, ruler (inches and CM or MM), small school-box, 1 spiral notebook (3-subject), 3 X 5 index cards lined, file box for cards, ABC index divider cards.

**Third Grade:** Pointed scissors, Crayons, Prang or Crayola watercolors, Elmer's school glue (small), eraser, 2 pencils, 2 red pens, notebook paper (not college ruled), 1- 5-subject spiral notebook, 1 stenographer's notebook, 1 Kleenex, 1 box map colors, 1 bar of soap.

**Fourth Grade:** Wide-ruled notebook paper, 4 spiral notebooks (70 page and only one if you are in Mrs. Deen's class), 12 - pencils (#2 lead), map colors, Crayons (no crayons if you are in Mrs. Deen's class), sharp-point scissors, Elmer's School Glue, 12-inch ruler, Kleenex, 2 folders with pockets (no folders if you are in Mrs. Deen's class), eraser, and 1 -3-ring binder for Mrs. Deen's class.

**Fifth Grade:** 6 pencils, 2 pens (blue or black), 2 red pens, Crayons, Elmer's School Glue, 1-12-inch ruler with metric and standard, sharp point scissors, large Kleenex, markers, 3 spiral notebooks, 3 folders with pockets, wide-ruled notebook paper, 1 school box, map colors (8 or more), eraser, 1 roll Scotch tape (transparent), 1 protractor, 3 pkgs 3 X 5 index cards.

The teachers ask that if you have supplies left from last year, please feel free to use them.

The Bovina school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$.90 (PK-5) and breakfast for \$.50. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast.

**TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.**

**HOW TO APPLY**

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

It was our first increase in subscription prices in over 15 years, so we held the line for quite a while. Hopefully we can maintain the new price for awhile, although some sources say there may be yet another hike in newsprint within the year.

The hike in newsprint is somewhat linked to government regulations, as well as the use of recycled paper, which unfortunately has been considerably higher than "virgin" newsprint.

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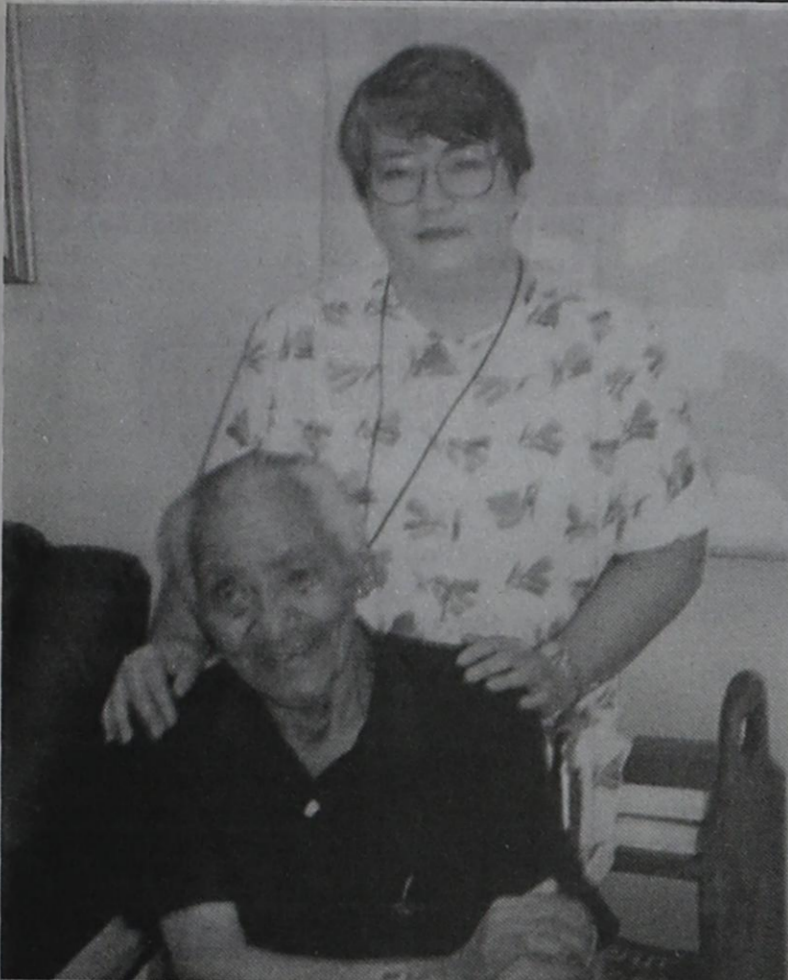

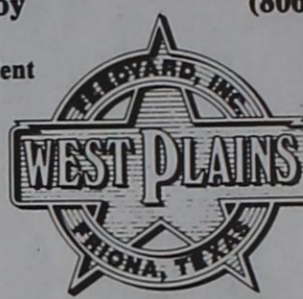

## Copleys Give Details Of Storm Development

Terry and Vickie Copley and Shannon Cochran watched as the funnel cloud formed over Friona on Friday, June 2.

When the cloud started building southwest of Friona, Shannon came to the Copley home and told them that a bad cloud was sure forming. He put his pickup in the Copleys' garage and went to his home on a four-wheeler.

The Copleys went outside to look at the cloud. The wind was blowing very hard out of the northeast at that time. They discussed the fact that it was sure strange for such a bad looking cloud to be coming from the southwest with the wind so strong from the northeast.

They went back inside their home and shortly afterward, Channel 10 put Parmer County in a tornado warning, so they decided they needed to go pick Shannon up since he did not have a vehicle at his house.

Just as they got to Shannon's house, the wind changed from northeast to southwest and got very cold. As they were backing out of his driveway, it started to hail—not many hail stones, but they decided to head back home.

When they turned into their driveway, they looked to the west at the cloud. Terry said, "Look Shannon, that is a tornado trying to come down." The bottom of the wall cloud was spinning, but nothing was on the ground at this time.

They parked their vehicle and went around to watch the cloud. In a very short time, they were able to see the dark cloud with trees and other debris spinning in the dirt.

When the funnels did finally form, there were as many as five small funnels darting out of the cloud in several different directions, at the same time, then the big funnel that resembled a large cloud

just traveling on the ground came through the cloud. Even as the large funnel approached, the smaller ones kept darting out from the edges.

Right after the large funnel turned and traveled north, the Copleys remarked about the roar of

the cloud—something you have always heard about. While they were listening to the roar and thought the worst was over, they looked to the north and another funnel was on the ground, traveling northeast, approximately two minutes behind the large funnel.

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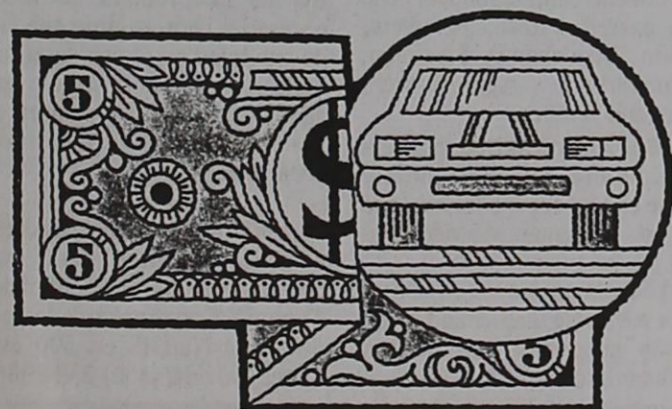

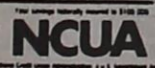
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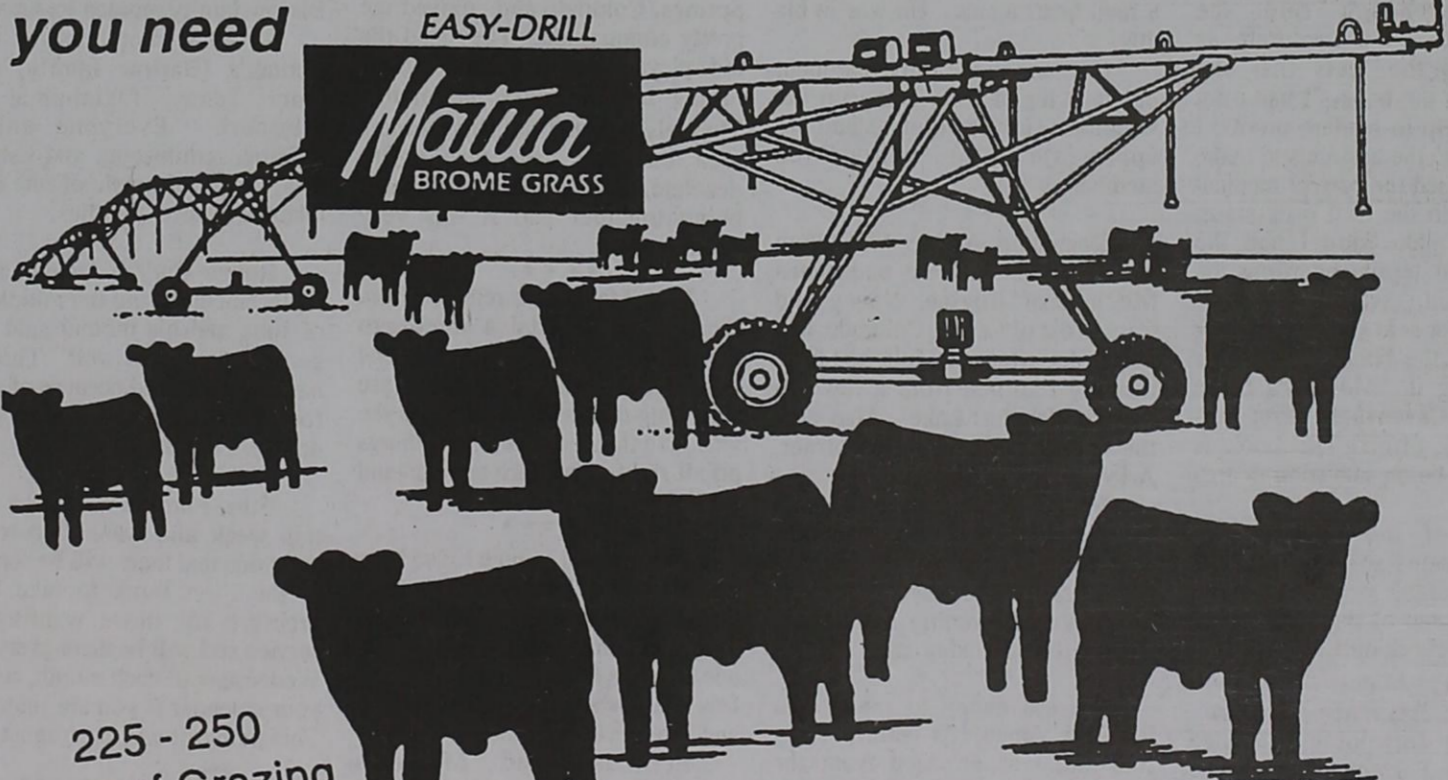

## Book Is Out...

Marcia had been diagnosed as having a heart murmur, and we were quick to get her to a specialist after this experience. It turned out not to be that much of a problem," Blackwell added.

"The book DOES make our system look bad, and it (rightfully) shows how this case had just 'fallen through the cracks,'" he added.

Blackwell said that Ms. Cavanaugh came to his office in Friona and interviewed him on two occasions.

Bonham, who was serving as Parmer County Sheriff's Deputy at the time, did the bulk of the investigating from the county's standpoint. Sheriff Rex Williams assigned Bonham to the case.

"I spent 31 years in law enforcement, and this was by far the most unusual case I ever worked," Bonham said this week. The bulk of the Parmer County investigation came after Ms. Lumbra had been arrested in Garden City, Kansas, for her seventh murder.

Lumbra was indicted for murder by the Parmer County Grand Jury, but before the case could go to trial she and her attorney were allowed to "plea bargain" for a lesser charge.

Bonham recalled that Ms. Cavanaugh came to Parmer County on several occasions researching the case. "She came to my office in Bovina at least once, met me at the sheriff's office once, and she may have talked to me in Castro County. She also called me on the telephone a number of times," Bonham said.

Ms. Cavanaugh said she attempted to be as accurate as possible in the facts that she presented in the book. "I had a lot of expert help in reading proofs. I sent proofs to the hospitals to make sure I had used the correct medical terms, and to the trial officials in Kansas to make sure I had the correct legal terms regarding the trial," she said.

The author said she spent a year researching the book and another year writing it. "Mommy's Little Angels" is Cavanaugh's first full-length book effort. The book is expected to be on sale soon in area bookstores.

(Many of the officials we contacted hadn't seen the book as yet and couldn't comment on its contents. Some of them borrowed our copy to check out.)

"I didn't blame Actkinson (District Attorney Johnny Actkinson) for doing the plea bargain in Parmer County. He reasoned that a trial in Farwell could prove extremely costly for his county, which doesn't have a lot of money for such things," Cavanaugh said.

"But I thought Lubbock's District Attorney Travis Ware copped-out when he plea-bargained there. Lubbock had an excellent case for murder, and could have gotten a murder verdict on Lumbra. Ware didn't want the Erdman episode to come before the court and make problems for previous murder cases he had prosecuted," the author said.

As a post-script, Ware was beaten by a challenger in the 1994 election at Lubbock.
