AT ALBUQUERQUE

The sixteenth irrigation congress is to be held at Albuquerque in the great territory of New Mexico next year. The Outlook congratulates the people of the Sunshine Territory in general and those of the Duke Gity in particular upon this coming event which is one of national importance and which when it comes off can not in its results but prove of great and lasting benefit to the highly important irrigation interests of this commonwealth and therefore also of great good and much value in every other direction.

Always Popular Dish Put Up in Novel Manner.

This salad is arranged on individual plates. Take six small lettuce leaves, and arrange them around the plate; in the center of these leaves put about one tablespoonful of salad dressing; this makes the center of the daisy points, which have been made by cutting into narrow strips the whites of hard-boiled eggs. Take the yolks of the hard-boiled eggs, and by mashing them through a strainer and scattering them over the tablespoonful of salad dressing, it will give it a rough appearance, and will give the finishing touch to quite a good counterfeit of a real daisy. The dressing for this salad is made by beating together three eggs, adding to this one cupful of milk, two tablespoonfuls of vinegar, half a teaspoonful of salt, the same of white pepper, two teaspoonfuls of mustard, butter the size of an egg, made into a smooth paste by mixing with two teaspoonfuls of water. Boil for about 20 minutes, or until it thickens; when cool arrange on the lettuce leaves.

CARE OF TABLE LINEN.

Here Is Truly Where a "Stitch in Time" Does Wonders.

Too little attention is paid to the wear and tear on tablecloths and napkins as a rule. They are washed and ironed and put away, regardless of the places that are becoming thin and worn until these spots become holes and it suddenly dawns on the dismayed housekeeper that her table linen is "going all to pieces."

If tiny holes are found in table linen the first thing to do is to darn them neatly, selecting the numbers of thread or cotton best suited to the material to be darned, using as fine a needle as possible. If the material is much worn it is best to lay a piece of the same under the thin place and darn down upon - it. This gives strength, though it does not look quite as neat as it would without the extra piece of material beneath. A ragged tear always must have an extra piece beneath.

Chicken Cheese.

Vogue says that to make chicken cheese boil two chickens in water to cover until the meat will fall from the bones. Then remove all the bones, mince the meat very fine, season with salt and pepper, and return to the water in which they were boiled, adding a tablespoonful of butter, one of minced celery, and half an onion sliced. Cook until the liquor is nearly gone, skim out the onion, and pour into a deep dish. Put a plate over it with a weight on top, and set away in a cold place until firm. When ready to be eaten cut in neat slices, and serve with a little red currant jelly or some aspic mayonnaise.

Fans to Match Gowns.

The mandate from London is that the fashionable woman must have a different fan for every gown and one for every occasion. "A tiny fan in a shade to match the hat should be carried in the park in the morning," says an authority. "An afternoon fan is more elaborate, but equally small. It is made of real lace or fine silk, embroidered with flowers. The river fan is made of paper, printed with a floral design. A tiny mother-of-pearl fan folds fits into a vanity bag. The peacock's feather fan is a novelty of the season and fioral fans made from real flowers will be largely in request.

Bracelet That Is Smart.

Heavy flat bracelets, carved and wrought, are being worn, and old Greek coins linked together form others of the many quaint arm ornaments which the fad has unearthed. Carbuncles framed in settings of old yellow gold are effective, and amethysts, cut oblong and set in flat settings of chased gold, are equally beau-

Orange Meringue.

Cut two oranges in half crosswise With spoon take out pulp and juice. Clean the inside of the skins, as they will serve as cups for the mixture. Whip stiff the white of one egg, adding sufficient sugar to make a meringue. To half of this meringue add the orange and juice and two tablespoons of claret. Fill the skins and top it with a spoon of the clear meringue, adding a maraschino cherry, or, if preferred, a bit of jelly. One orange serves two, a half for each person.

Fourth of July Gingerbread.

A good, old-fashioned Fourth of July gingerbread is made in this way: Rub to a cream one-half cup molasses, one-half cup milk, with one-quarter teaspoonful soda dissolved in it, a salt spoonful salt, one beaten egg and flour to mix stiff, with two teasponfuls baking powder sifted with it. Divide the dough in portions, pat into a sheet, place on a floured and buttered baking tin, run a fluted roller over it if you have one, otherwise mark in parallel rows and bake.

WORK THAT CAN EASILY BE DONE AT HOME.

Not Necessary to Pay High Prices to Expert Cleaners-Proper Care of the Finer Grades of Summer Materials.

Many garments are beginning to show rather dingy, so that a few hints on the doing up of fine materials may not come amiss.

Nothing looks so dainty and fresh, summer or winter, as white, but the charges for laundering or French cleaning are prohibitive. Most people are afraid to undertake the washing of silks, cashmeres, and the like at home, but really, with a little care, they are not nearly so difficult as they

Very fine muslins should be soaked in tepid water in which borax has been dissolved; one teaspoonful borax to a gallon of water being sufficient. After half an hour they can be rubbed gently in soap suds made of fine, white curd soap and boiling water then poured over them and left to cool. They should be well rinsed and squeezed rather than wrung out.

In washing silk handkerchiefs care should be taken to prevent their turning yellow. A silk handkerchief should never be boiled nor have any soap rubbed upon it.

Make a lather of finely shredded white soap and water, wash, and squeeze the handkerchiefs in it, press out all the moisture possible, and dry quickly in the sun; ironing them while they are still damp, but not

White silk handkerchiefs used as neckties are sometimes cleaned very well with dried and powdered starch In which a little powdered blue has been mixed.

The handkerchief is spread over a clean linen cloth and with a pad of clean white linen the powder is rubbed over the silk, then dusted out, after which, with a moderately hot Iron and two folds of slightly damped linen laid over the silk on the right side, the handkerchief is ironed, which brightens it considerably.

To clean black silk from mud stains the following recipe will be found a good one. Peel and cut into small pieces a moderate sized potato. Pour on it half a pint of boiling water; cover and allow to stand for 12 hours. Then add pure spirits of wine sufficient to give the feel of very thin starch. Sponge the spotted silk rapldly with this liquid, and rub each spot carefully, thoroughly wetting the material

Turn the silk face downward and press the wrong side with a cold iron, passing it always lengthways of the material.

To iron a silk waist, commence Ironing with the collar band and voke. then the wristbands and sleeves. Use a sleeve board for ironing the sleeves. After ironing the small parts, begin with one side of the waist and fron the whole of it. Silk should be Ironed quickly and carefully, so as not to make creases, as it is almost Impossible to get them out.

If the waist is trimmed with lace and lace insertions, gather up the lace In the hand, dip the fingers in some starch and put it on the lace. Squeeze but the starch, being very careful that It does not touch the silk.

For the insertion, spread it out flat on the hand and put the starch on it evenly with the fingers. Put the starched parts carefully on each other when rolling the waist up in a cloth.

Ironing the silk gives it a smooth and glossy appearance, but should the waist get dry before it is ironed, dip it into clean cold water and roll In a cloth. Do not sprinkle water over it, as that would make it look rough and blotchy when iroued. When the waist is finished fold it neatly without creasing and air it.-Marion Harris Neil in Chicago Inter Ocean.

Maple Confections.

Maple confections are most popular this year. Maple cream over ice cream, maple cream with whipped cream may be prepared as follows: Take one-half a pound of maple sugar, one-half a pound of brown sugar, onehalf a cup of water and half a teaspoon of cream of tartar. Boil these together until they form a soft ball when dripped into cold water. Pour out into a shallow platter and when nearly cold beat with a fork until thick and creamy.

Candied Pineapple.

Peel and slice a pineapple, cutting out the eyes. Weigh the fruit, and allow a pound and a half of sugar for each pound of fruit. Put fruit and sugar into the preserving kettle and add a very little water. Boil until the pineapple is tender, take from the sirup and spread on a platter to cool, while you boil the sirup until very thick. Return the pineapple to the sirup, stir for a few minutes, then spread the fruit on platters until dry and candied.





BEEF CROUTONS A DAINTY.

Savory Flavoring Is the Most Important Part of Dish.

The secret of success in making beef croutons lies in the savory flavoring. Fruit juices play a large part in recipe for a tasty meat dish: Mince a m. and 7:30 p. m. pint of cold meat very fine, with a small shallot and the grated rind of a. m. an orange. Season with salt, pepper and a pinch of grated nutmeg. Put a cup of port wine over the fire and, when hot, add a few teaspoons of brown sauce or good gravy, and a dash of catsup. Finally turn in the minced and flavored meat and simmer gently for five minutes; add a teaspoon of lemon juice and boil up once more. Set back on the stove to keep hot. Cut half-inch slices from a medium dry loaf of bread and shape with a tin heart-shaped cutter. Melt butter in a frying pan, fry the bread to a golden brown, drain on paper and arrange on a hot platter. Heap the minced meat on these, garnish with o'clock a. m. chopped, hard-boiled egg, or serve on each crouton, forming a nest in the night. meat, a poached egg.

PACKING THE LUNCH BASKET.

Newspaper Not Proper Thing to Wrap the Eatables In.

When it is not expedient to carry a basket or small box, at least see that the eatables are daintify wrappednot promiscuously jumbled into a piece of newspaper. One is surprised and sometimes almost disgusted to see the method employed by many women who are fastidious in other respects, and it is amazing that they eat with any relish at all when bread, cake, pickles, a banana and possibly a cold boiled potato are tied in newspaper without other wrapping. Every one should know that strong chemicals are employed in the manufacture | HEWITT BLOCK. of paper, together with rags and refuse, and it is not a cheerful thought that the things we eat come in direct contact with them for several hours. The moisture from the viands causes more or less ink to be absorbed, and, while not necessarily harmful, it is not appetizing, to say the least .-Home Magazine.

Shoulder of Lamb Grilled.

A shoulder of lamb is excellent roasted, but is often preferred cooked in the following manner: Score it about an inch long and rub it over with a little butter and the yolk of crumbs. Sprinkle over salt, pepper and sweet herbs, roast until a light brown. This is good with plain gravy, but better with the following

Take a quarter of a pint of drippings from the meat, mix it with the same quantity of water. Place on the fire. When it boils up thicken with a little flour and water mixed. Add a tablespoonful of tomato catsup; season with salt and pepper.

English Meat Pie.

As a way of using left-over meat try an old-fashioned "English meat pie." Chop cold beef finely, put in a deep baking dish a layer of the meat, strew lightly with bread crumbs, season highly with salt, pepper, butter and a few drops of onion juice; repeat the process till the dish is full or your meat used up. Pour over it a cup of stock or gravy, or, lacking these, hot water with a teaspoon of butter melt | CARRIZOZO. ed in it; on top a good layer of bread crumbs should be put and seasoned and dotted with butter. Cover and bake half an hour; remove the cover and brown.

Apple Taffy.

Wipe small apples carefully and run a thin skewer through each. Make a sirup of a pound of sugar and a small teacupful of water, and, when a little hardens when dropped into iced water, add a tablespoonful of lemon juice and dip the apples into the sirup. Lay on waxed paper to dry.

Carolyn Custard Pie.

Line a deep crockery plate with lady fingers or any stale cake. Pour over this a few tablespoons of cognac or any good wine and cover with a custard made of one pint of milk. the yolks of two eggs, one-half cup white sugar, and thicken with corn starch till quite thick. Upon this place as they are less likely to have an oily taste. Make a meringue of the whites, stiffly beaten, and sweetened. Brown in oven and serve cold with whipped cream.

Baked Beets.

Many old-fashioned cooks like the English way of baking beets instead of boiling. They claim they preserve their natural sweetness better when baken. Wash well, but do not break the skin. Put into a baking tin with a little hot water thrown over them. When tender, peel, slice and serve with oil and lerger juice, pepper and salt, or butter, pepper and salt. Boiled beets are fine chilled, sliced with celery, and covered with mayon-






