## GAME LAWS OF

There has been considerable inquiry of late in regard to the game laws of the territory, and at the request of several subscribers, we publish the following synopsis of these laws, hoping they may be a benefit to those wishing to take a fall trip into

It is unlawful to kill any elk, mountain sheep, beaver or ptarmigan within the con-

It is unlawful to kill any antelope, pheasan, bob-white quail or wild pigeon within the territory of New Mexico for a period of five years after passage of this

in any manner to injure or destroy any deer wi hin the territory of New Mexcommencing October 15 and ending No- at once. vember 31 of each year. Provided that no person shall kill or have in his possession more than one such deer during Independence Mining company, said period in each year. (Section l.

It shall be unlawful to kill, trap, en snare or in any manner kill or destroy any native or crested quail within te territory of New Mexico, except that such birds may be killed with a gun only, during the months of October, November, December and January of each year. Provided, upon representation to the board of county commissioners of any county, if a petion signed by twenty-five householders of any precint in such county, praying for the suspension of the restrictions of this section as to the killing of quail in any such precinct, it shall be the duty of such board to make and enter in the official record of the broceedings of such board, an order extending the time within which quail may be killed in any such precinct for a period of two months from and after the time hereinbefore limited, within which time quail may be killed. (Section 1, Chapter

## ers May do With Barren Land

For the first twenty years of the settlement of the central Kansas counties the territories lying in the west part of the county north of the Smoky hill river and known as the sand hills was considered worthless. It was for years unfenced and the owners did not get enough from the Among the new enterprises pasturage to pay the small taxes. The hills are thinly covered with grass, wild plum srees and the scraggly weeds that infest the open prairies in places where soil

A half dozen years ago some settlers who had lived there and worked by the day elsewhere in order to earn a livelihood began raising watermelons and A party of stockholders in the canteloupes and brining them to town for sale on the street. That was the beginning of the usefulness of the sand hills.

The melon selling of the stree developed until every year in late August and September a dozen wagons are lined up along the sidewalk opposite the postoffice and the citizens of the town buy their supplies there. Passing tourists stop for their share and one or two wagons are at the station when the through trains come in and they sale many melons to the pas-

But that is merely the local trade. In the last few years there has been developed a shipping trade as well. The melon raisers are getting their cantaloupe seed seed from Rocky Ford. They are raising great watermelons that are equal to those of Georgia, from which state comes the seed. Whole carleads in which every melon weighs over thirty pounds are A deal has recently been common. It is becoming a science with the dwellers in the sand hills who are becoming the most prosperous of the coun-

cents a hundred pounds of melons as they are delivered to the car. One of the farmers took from an acre and a half \$190 worth of melons and is not yet done picking. Over 200 acres of melons are yet to be harvested and will bring high prices. for this is a good melon year. Even the cantaloupes are excellent and one can scarcely tell them from the Rocky Fords, so luscious are they. One of these days the sand hill melons will be crated and rosa. Mr. Gilmore will have shipped to the east as are those from the upper Arkansas valley.

The usual way of mending is to sew the raveled edges together with over-and-over stitch, says Harper's Bazar. This may stop further raveling, but even with the greatest care there will be a fuzzy seam very conspicuous on the plain part of the stocking, and most unsightly on any part.

A better way, which only requires patience, is to pick up the stitches and crochet the edges together with a fine needle and fine silk of the same

The seam then will never be noticed by anyone but the wearer.

In Many Ways They Can Be Utilized for Other Garments.

#### Plums with Cream.

Have you tried eating plums with cream? Some persons like good sweet plums, peeled and stoned and sliced with sugar and cream, like other fruits, or only with cream.

Make plum jelly by scalding the plums and throwing away the first oily butter water, more than one if it comes off greenish and strong. Cover the fruit with fresh water and cook until the juice is red and strongly flavored with the fruit. Pour this off and use for jelly, with the usual amount of sugar, straining it before using for jellly. The plums left in the kettle will be nearly whole. These will make good plum pies or sauce when sifted, because they have not been pressed at all.

Scald plums in this way for sauce; it is the bitter oil in the skins that makes the fruit less palatable. Stewed plums are delicious when rightly cooked and are also choice when poured over a batter, or cottage pudding.

#### Another Honey Cake.

Two pounds of honey, two pounds of flour, one-half pound of butter, six ounces of almonds chopped fine, oneeighth of an ounce of ground cardamon, one-quarter ounce of ground cloves, one ounce of pure carbonate of potash, dissolved in a little water. Let the honey and butter come to a boil, and, when cool, add the spices, almonds and flour, and lastly the potash. Let the dough stand over night. Roll out into a sheet a quarter inch thick and bake in a moderate oven. Cover with white frosting.

#### Chocolate Fig Cake.

One and one-half cups sugar; onehalf cup butter; one-half cup milk; three eggs; two teaspoonfuls baking 16, 1905." powder; two and one-half cups flour; eight teaspoonfuls of unsweetened chocolate cooked in one-half cup of milk until it thickens. Filling-Pound of figs, chopped fine; one-half cup of sugar; boil until it thickens, stir in one cup of English walnuts, chopped fine, and spread between layers and on top.

#### French Pudding.

Whites of six eggs, three-fourths cup prunes cooked and chopped fine, ten cents' worth English walnuts, cup sugar; put sugar through sieve three or four times; cup nuts and prunes, beat egg, stir together in bowl; put in pan and bake in slow oven for 40 minutes.

#### Potato Biscuit.

One and one-half cups of flour, one teaspoonful of baking powder, onehalf teaspoonful salt, one cup of mashed potato. Mix all with a little milk to moisten to the thickness of baking powder biscuit, roll out, cut in rounds, and bake 20 minutes in a quick oven.

#### Paraffin as a Cleaner.





## WARM DAY DAINTIES CONCENSION OF THE PROPERTY O

EXCELLENT FOR SUMMER AFTER-NOON TEAS.

Departure from the Old-Fashioned Meat and Bread Sandwich-Beverages to Take the Place of Iced Tea.

Everyone has tired of the old-fashioned meat and bread sandwiches and something new that will please the palate on hot and sultry afternoons will surely be welcomed. A very economical way of using up fish, and one of the most popular of the new sandwiches is made as follows:

Take the yolks of six hard-boiled eggs and rub them to a paste, and mix it with the same quantity of cold fish that has chilled in the ice box. Spread this mixture on crisp lettuce leaves, add a dash of mayonnaise dressing and spread between thin slices of white bread.

Another sandwich that can be made in a few moments' notice is by chopping two large crisp cucumbers very fine, and add to this a little onion juice, just enough to give it a flavor, and a little bit of cayenne pepper. Mix this with a little mayonnaise dressing and spread on thin slices of white bread.

Instead of the peanut butter that comes prepared in cans and has stood in the shops for months, try this: Take a quart of peanuts, shell and blanch them, and then put them through the coffee mill or very fine chopping machine. Salt this to suit your taste, and add to it enough pert wine, sherry, or any home-made wine to make it a soft paste. Spread on buttered white bread.

By now, you may have become tired of the ice tea, and it is too warm for chocolate, and nothing is more refreshing than the following punch served to a friend on a hot afternoon: Put a heaping tablespoonful of good tea in a pitcher, pour over it a guart of boiling water and let it stand quart of boiling water and let it stand for a few moments-covered. Strain this into a bowl or large pitcher, add | one pound of sugar, juice of six lemons and two oranges, and a quart of apollinaris. Be liberal with your ice, and it will also add to the flavor to put in a few strawberries or raspberries, and a cucumber peel. This recipe will make ample punch for a dozen

Fruit Punches.—Take a pint of fresh raspberries and a quart of currants, wash and then bruise them. Pour over these two quarts of waterand a half-pound of sugar (preferably brown). Let this come to a boil very slowly, then remove and strain through a jelly bag. This should be allowed to cool, then set on the ice. It should be served in individual glasses with a large piece of ice.

Another fruit punch is made by first boiling one pint of sugar with one quart of water and the juice of two lemons. Into this grate the rind of three oranges. Let it boil several minutes, then set it aside to cool. Into your punch bowl or extremely large pitcher put plenty of ice, and slice three oranges very thin, cutting the pieces in half. Take six oranges and squeeze only the juice into the pitcher or bowl, and a pineapple cut in very thin, small pieces. Over this pour the syrup that has cooled, and then add any berries you may have.

#### Lamb and Green Peas Salad.

What to Eat gives us a picture and recipe of lamb and green peas salad that looks and sounds very attractive and not difficult.

"Materials-One pint green peas (cooked), half a cup of boiling water, one pint cooking lamb cut in cubes, three tablespoons of sugar, half a cup of celery cut in cubes, five tablespoons of vinegar, one bunch (two dozen sprigs) mint, a quarter of a teaspoon of red pepper, half teaspoon of salt, one-half cup strong stock, two tablespoons of granulated gelatine, mayonnaise, lettuce leaves.

#### Cress Sandwiches.

Wash watercress and dry it, rejecting the tougher stems and all withered leaves. Dip each spray in a French dressing made by mixing a tablespoonful of vinegar with four tablespoonfuls of olive oil, a teaspoonful of salt and a salt spoonful of white pepper. Stir until the mixture is thick and smooth before putting CARRIZOZO, - - N. M. in the cress. Have ready white bread buttered and cut thin, and lay the cress between two slices of bread.

#### Eggless Cake.

Two cups brown sugar, one-half cup butter, two cups sour milk, two teaspoons soda, two cups chopped raisins, one-half teaspoon cloves, one teaspoon cinnamon, flour to make quite stiff. A nice addition to this cheap cake is some chopped hickory nut meats.

#### Popcorn with Soup.

Instead of serving crackers with soup use popcorn. It gives the soup a delicate flavor and does not get pasty like crackers. This looks attractive. which makes it more appetizing.





SHADE FOR THE CANDLE.

Neighbor's Comment in Which There | Pretty and Novel Affair by No Means Hard to Make.

> So many persons find the light from a candle or lamp trying on the eyes that they always insist on shades of some sort.

A pretty and novel affair for a candle may be made of strong wire bent into a rectangular shape, six inches wide at the bottom, with the inner side 12 inches tall and the outer seven and one half. This will give a decided slope to each top.

Make two of these frames and cover them neatly with silk muslin of a very thin liberty silk.

This cover may then be painted or it can be studded in conventional design in sequins. Tie the backs together with bows of narrow ribbon for hinges, and around the top and two shorter sides sew a box-plating of narrow lace.

The candle is, of course, placed between the two leaves when they are opened wide. Extreme care must be taken to observe this precaution, as a fire might easily result from such inflammable materials in close proximity to flame.

KEEPING SHOES IN ORDER. Ways by Which Best Results Can Be

White buckskin should be cleaned

with the best pipe clay, which must be dampened before using.

Patent leather shoes should first be wiped dry with a soft cloth before placing them on the shoe tree, then wiped with a soft cloth dipped in warm soapy water.

A little vaseline should be applied from time to time, especially after a wetting. The shine may be restored by rubbing with a piece of soft silk or black velvet.

Leather nowadays is rendered independent of the ill effect of dampness. Shoes can, therefore, generally be washed with tepid water when soiled, a piece of soft linen being dampened and applied all over the shoe.

Spanish Pigs' Feet.

Take eight clean, fresh "trotters." out each into four pieces; then boil until nearly done. Take the pigs' feet out and lay to one side. Boil in the liquid one pint of tomatoes and one pound of parboiled tripe, cut fine; one small garlic, mashed fine; six potatoes sliced diamond shape, half cupful of rice, half a cupful of Indian curry. When almost done put the pigs' feet back, taking care that they are well covered with the liquid, and let it all boil until the pigs' feet are done. Be sure not to let the pigs' feet fall apart or have the sauce too thin. This is a favorite Spanish recipe.

Beef Tenderloin and Bananas.

Cut beef tenderloin into pieces, two and one-half inches thick, broil and season. Have gravy ready made as follows: One tablespoonful of butter, two tablespoonfuls of flour, one cup of milk, one-half teaspoonful of salt, onequarter teaspoonful of pepper, one heaping tablespoonful of horseradish; boil and strain. Fry in two tablespoons of olive oil two large firm bananas cut lengthwise; be careful not to break. Pour one-quarter of a cup of sherry in and baste over bananas. Place two halves over each piece of meat on platter and pour gravy around.

Care for Soft Corns.

Each morning before putting on the stocking, tear off a strip of the margin of a newspaper, and wrap it around the toe next to the one that has the soft corn on. Get it exactly opposite, so that the corn will rest against the paper. This will keep perspiration from irritating the corn and the natural friction of the toes in walking will grind the corn down until it will entirely disappear. In the meantime you will enjoy life, for you will get the benefit as soon as the paper is adjusted.

Prepare Pineapple.

Cut off top and bottom, first with a large sharp butcher knife, then slice any thickness desired. Lay each slice flat on the table and trim off the edge with a small, sharp and pointed paring knife. Then take up in the fingers and remove what is left of the eyes. This method saves time, trouble, waste and the cutting of one's fingers.

Rhubarb Jelly.

Wash and cook rhubarb until tender. adding enough water to keep from burning. Strain through cheese cloth: add one cup of sugar to every cup of juice; add the juice of one lemon to every quart; boil 20 minutes.

Sardine Sandwiches.

Take one can of sardines put up in oil, mix well with fork, adding enough catsup to make bright red. Mix thoroughly and spread on thin buttered slices of bread. The mixture provides enough for one loaf of bread.

#### MARMALADE MADE AT HOME.

Housekeeper Gets Excellent Sweet at a Small Cost.

The housekeeper who practices economy from necessity and whose family is fond of orange marmalade as well as of the fresh fruit, has solved the problem of making excellent marmalade at a little less than half the cost of the same bought ready made. She saves the peel from the oranges eaten by the family, in an air-tight box, until she has enough to make, when cut in very fine strips, with all the inner pith removed with a sharp knife, a pint or a little over. The oranges are to be peeled dry, that is, all the peeling removed before the inner skin is broken, and these dry skins will keep in a cool place two weeks without molding. When she has enough, six large navel oranges and three good lemons are purchased. This fresh fruit is cut in two and with a sharp penknife the pulp of the fruit is removed without any of the fine inner skin which divides it into sections. There will be some juice left in the fruit, but this is carefully squeezed out and added to the pulp. From the lemon pulp every seed is taken out and then orange and lemon pulp is placed in a deep dish and covered with three pounds of granulated sugar. The peel of the oranges and lemons is now cut into sections, carefully trimmed of all inner pith, and cut in very thin slices or straws. These are added to the pint of previously prepared slices of orange peel, and the whole placed in a saucepan with sufficient water to just cover them. Then they are boiled gently till the skins are perfectly cooked and so tender that a small straw will pierce then easily. It may be necesto add a little more water from time to time. There should be just enough water on the peels when they are cooked enough to barely cover them. To this is added the orange and lemon pulp and sugar and the whole is boiled till a little poured on a cold plate will set. The marmalade must be cooked slowly, and great care must be taken to prevent its setting on the bottom of the saucepan. This quantity will fill six ordinary jelly glasses or a little more, and its cost is not more than 42 cents, an average of seven cents a glass. This is quite as good as the marmalade bought in the stores and very much cheaper, with the added advantage of knowing exactly what is in it.

#### Date Custard.

Line a deep pie tin with a good paste; into this put one pound of dates, cut into small pieces, then separate two eggs; into the yolks add one and one-half cups of milk and one-half cup of sugar, pinch of salt and a little nutmeg; pour over the dates and bake 20 or 25 minutes; beat the whites of the eggs until stiff; add two tablespoons of granulated sugar; pour over the custard and set in the oven to brown.

#### Canned Beans.

To one peck of beans add a cup of vinegar and one tablespoonful of salt, cover with water and boil for threequarters of an hour. Put into glass lars and seal. Before using soak for two hours and cook until tender, pouring off the first water as soon as the beans come to a boil, and boiling until tender in the second water. They are good boiled with ham or beef or cooked alone and dressed with Dutter, cream, pepper and salt.

#### Celery Salad.

Six heads of celery, one egg yolk, one teaspoonful of mustard, a little salt and pepper, the juice of one tomon. three tablespoonsful of water, four ounces of olive oil. Wash the relery and dry; cut in pieces into the salad bowl. Mix the egg, mustard, pepper. salt, lemon juice and water. Pour the olive oil over it, drop by drop; then add a teaspoon of boiling water and pour the whole over the celery.
