TO OUR NATIONAL ASSETS The immigration of the fiscal year 1907 exceeded all previous records. It was 17 per cent higher than that of 1906

In each of the three years the number of immigrants exceeded 1,000,000.

We assimilate the newcomers, in a way, but we do not train them to useful employment; we do not try to place them where they are best fitted to work; we make little effort to save the power of this stream and divert it toeconomic use We rather incline to resent the coming of this "horde", and to make it as hard as possible for these people to become

A newly created division of the department of commmerce and labor will strive to direct immigrants to the most promising regions and channels of employment. The work may be effective if it can command the active cooperation of communities, industries, and employers turoughout the country. One object of secretary Straus's plan for or-ganizing the commercial bodies of the country into a sort of central advisory board, is to assist in this tremendous movement of distributing the immigrants. —El Paso Herald.

GOOD ARGUMENT

According to the figures compiled by
Traveling Auditor, Charles V. Safford, the assessment of taxable property in New Mexico for the present year amounts to over \$51,000,000. a gain of over \$5,-000,000, or an increase of eleven per cent over 1906. This, it must be understood, by no means represents the actual value of the property subject to taxation which is estimated by competent persons to be at least four times more than the assessed valuation. An eleven per cent increase in one year is certainly a very creditable showing. No doubt at this time the actual value is much greater as the figures above given were compiled from the tax schedules dated March 1, 1907, and as it is well established that thousands of immigrants bringing much money and property into the territory have come into it since that date and have settled within its limits. The figures given in the statement are certainly a strong basis for a good argument in the present statehood movement. Under a state government the increase immediately after statehood is attained nay be estimatted as double and trebled yearly. The territory of New Mexico is now in the public eye and is attracting many immigrants and much capital. The state of New Mexico would be more so and will be sought for homes by many more immigrants than is the

OREGON STOCK GROWERS WAR ON WOLVES AND COYOTES

The offering of bounties for the scalps of predatory animals has so often failed to accomplish the good hoped for that the bounty plan has lost favor in many localities. The Wool Growers' Association of Oregon has just gone on record at its recent meeting at the Dalls as favoring the abandonment of the bounty system and substituting the system of killing the animals by private effort and employment of profesional hunters. The Association will take up the work and ask assistance from the National

Association. J. N. Burgess, President of the Association, estimates that Oregon sheep owners lost the past year \$250,000 predatory animals, and that the loss of other farm stock, including poultry, would increase the loss to half a million

The United States Forestry Service has demonstrated that efficient work can be done by trained hunters who are sent to the ranges to make a special business of killing wolves, and such other denizens of the forests as prey on flocks of sheep. A number of such hunters are now at work and they are ridding some of the ranges very rapidly of the animals which do so much damage each year. Wolves are tracked to their the pick and shovel as well as the rifle are brought into play,, and the young are found and destroyed. A campaign of that kind strikes at the

root of the evil. So vast, however, is the western country that the work of a few hunters can give only local relief; but if state stock growers associations go at it as Oregon organizations propose to do,the war will soon grow decidedly interesting for four-footed skulkers that have grown fat on mutton, veal, pork and poultry.
