Press reports tell of terrible storms from the Atlantic coast to the Rocky Mountains during the first of this week, yet a slightly cooler atmosphere and a few partly cloudy days were all the change that was Rates Reasonable. noticable in this valley. Certainly there is no place on earth where the climate equals this part of New Mexico.

Another deserving man has just received an incresase of pension through the activity of Delegate Andrews. This time it comes right home to the people of this community, as the man is a citizen of White Oaks and well known to most of our citizens, we have reference to Captain John Crowley who just recieved notice of his increase.

Kansas farmers and business men protested against the Santa Fe's rates on coal from Colorado, and the interstate commerce commission ordered the railroad to reduce them. El Paso is absolutely at the mercy of the Santa Fe's wholly unjustifiable rates on coal, and it would be wise for our chamber of commerce to take up this matter with the Washington authorities and stick to the guns until the road were brought down.-El Paso Herald.

The world's sincerest sympathy goes out to Secretary Taft in his deep bereavement. The secretary went abroad on a mission of the highest importance in the public service. He has made a quick trip but it must have been a sore trial to him to know of his mother's dying condition and be unable to come to her bedside Just a few days more and he would have been with her. What a mockery the pageantry must have been in St. Petersburg, with that death shadow hanging over him.

Uncle Sam has established a marriage bureau in connection with a Philippines orphan asylum, and is offering \$150 dowry with each marriage able girl when a young man of good character asks her hand. It has been found by experience that the Filipines will not marry without a dowry, this being their ancient custom. The Philiponoses experiences have mightly broadened our respected uncle's mind and sympathies, but the marriage bureau stunt would give the fathers of the republic something of a shock. We look to see the idea, however, adopted by some political party in this country before many years; it is in line with insurance of workingmen, old age pensions, and a lot of such notions.

A representative of the Department of Labor has been making inquiries in England in regard to labor conditions. It will interest you to know some of the facts he will report. He will tell the department that the average wage for the unskilled male laborer in England is \$5 per week and for the unskilled women laborer \$2.50. He will report that women and girls earn \$1.50 a week making hobnails at 13 cents for every 1150 nails. He will say that altough a machine has been invented which will card hooks and eyes, Birmingham finds it cheaper to employ human hands whose possessors link 384 hooks with 384 eyes and stitch these on a card, for all of which they are paid 2 cents. He will tell of industries at which women work from 3 am. until 11 and 12 o'clock at night. The best thing he will mention will be a proposed bill of Sir Charles Dilkes, which provides that any trade union may ask the appointment of a wage board in its district, and that such labor board will have the power of determining the minimum rate of wages. The worst thing that he will say (if he says the same to the department as he recently said in London will be that there are places in America where the sweatshop conditions are worse than they are in England. But one thing he cannot say—that there are sweat shops of any character in New Mexico and yet we are not civilized enough to be admitted to statehood .


