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



STATE NEWS

OF INTEREST TO ALL **NEW MEXICO** PEOPLE

Sixty-Five Indictments Found.

Roswell.-The grand jury returned twenty-six additional indictments. This makes sixty-five indictments to date. Six "no" bills were returned, four of them being two each for Mayor G. T. Veal and City Marshal Roy Woofter, both of whom had been bound over to the grand jury on the charge of malicious prosecution in alleged boot legging cases.

Fire In Mines Is Out.

Silver City.-G. A. Easton, superintendent of the operations on the Pinos Altos mines, reports that the fire in the Hearst shaft had finally been smothered out. As soon as the fire was discovered some two weeks ago, the lower levels were bulkheaded thus effectually smothering it out. Mr. Easton says the shaft and levels are still full of gas and fans are being installed to drive this out, after which work will be resumed.

Apples for Raton.

Raton .- M. M. Chase and son, Mason G. Chase, came up recently from their large apple ranch near Cimarron, accompanying a five-car load lot of apples, which were stored in the cold storage apartment of the plant for safe keeping until next spring, when the market price for the fruit improves. The consignment numbered 3,000 boxes. This celebrated apple orchard of sixty-eight acres stands as a splendid illustrado under the nurting coercion of irrigation. The apples produced this year fell slightly short of 20,000 boxes.

To Vote on Bond Issue.

Deming.-The qualified voters of Deming will have an opportunity on January 10, 1911, to vote on a thirtyeight thousand dollar bond issue, the funds so obtained to be used in putting in a sanitary sewerage system. The rapid growth of Deming in the past year has almost necessitated that some action be taken along this line, and at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the village of Deming, recently, a resolution was passed calling for an election of the qualified voters of Deming to vote upon the proposition of issuing bonds to the aggregate amount of \$38,000, for the purpose of providing funds for the construction of a sanitary sewer system on January 10, 1911.

To Hold Election January 21st.

Santa Fe.-The constitutional convention adopted a resolution to hold the election for the approval of the constitution on January 21st and to refer the constitution, if adopted, to Congress and President Taft early in

It adopted a memorial to President Taft, asking for the immediate survey of the 103d meridian and the boundaries between New Mexico and Texas, which are in dispute.

With the defeat of the proposition providing for state-wide prohibition the constitutional convention disposed of all the propositions before it, and the time intervening until adjournment will be spent in revising the sections already adopted. The report of a special committee on liquor traffic, which commended that the prohibition issue has no place in a coastitution and should be left to future legislative action, was adopted by a vote of 59 to 24 after an hour's debate. Few delegates favored prohibition and the debate was principally confined to a discussion of a proposed local option substitute for state-wide prohibition.

Constitutional Convention Closes.

After five o'clock Tuesday morning. the legislative day of Monday, November 21st, the date of adjournment of the constitutional convention, ended. The hands of the official clock were turned back five hours early in the evening.

The hours after midnight were spent in reading the constitution, as finally revised. It was a tedious job, but A. H. Hudspeth had saved much time, by a motion that the roll call on each section and article be dispensed with and that the ayes and nays be recorded only upon the whole docu-

There was an air of festivity all evening, which opened with the presentation of tokens of esteem to the presiding officer, Charles A. Spiess. The convention had been in session over fifty days.







THE COUNTY SEAT PROVISION

The Provision in the Constitution relating to change of County Seats

Section 1.—The legislature shall L. J. Mudell spent Thanksgiving at its first session classify the counies and fix salaries for county offi-Miss Franks and Miss Tompson cers, and no county officers shall receive to his own use any fees or emoluments other that the annual salary provided by law, and all fees Ed. Kimmons fell from a horse earned by any officers shall be by treasury of the county.

> Sec. 2-All county officers shall elected for a term of four years and no county officer expect the county clerk and probate judge shall, after having served one full term be eligible to hold any county office for four vears thereafter.

> Sec. 3.—No county seat where there are county buildings, shall be removed unless three-fifths of the votes cast by qualified electors on the question of removal at an election called and held as now or hereafter provided by law, be in favor of such removal. The proposition of removal shall not be submitted in the same county oftener than once in eight years.
